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CONTRACT PRICES ARE MADE PUBLIC

Minister of Public Works Replies to Questions Concerning the Construction of Buildings.

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KING CARLOS WAS THE SACRIFICE

Revolution in Portugal Stayed by Assassination. Downfall of Dictatorship.

Lisbon, Feb. 5.—The terrible tragedies of Saturday, it is believed, have resulted in the flight of Premier Franco, who is said to be a British cruiser anchored off Cascaes, and will seek refuge in Gibraltar or England.

He believes now the possibility of a revolution is passed with the assassination of the late King. The shock seems to have been felt by the public and a better element of people are flocking to see the new king. There is no question of the downfall of Dictator Franco. The police are experiencing the greatest difficulty in unravelling the details of the plot which led to the assassination of the late King.

LEOPOLD OF PRUSSIA FOR LISBON

Berlin, Feb. 5.—Prince Frederick Leopold of Prussia left for Lisbon today with condolences for the widowed Queen and to act as the Kaiser's representative at the funeral.

SUPPOSED ASSASSIN INnocent

Paris, Feb. 5.—A special from Lisbon says the Maria Costa, who was killed as one of the assassins of the King, was innocent. He was employed by a jeweller, who swears he dispatched Costa to purchase some postage stamps at the time the royal carriage was passing. The man became involved in the general stampede and was shot by a stray bullet.

RUMORS ARE DENIED

Lisbon, Feb. 5.—There is no truth in the rumors current in Berlin of the attempt made on the life of the Minister of War Jose de Mattias Lages, whose appointment was slated in the first cabinet reorganization. The new cabinet, which ought to have been formed long ago, has not yet been announced.

MANITOBA LEGISLATURE

Debates on the Motion to Go Into Committee of Supply in Progress. Winnipeg, Feb. 5.—In the legislature yesterday the debate on the motion to go into committee of supply was resumed. The leader of the Opposition, Hon. C. J. Meikle, claimed that the government was entitled to little credit for its financial administration.

LISBON CENTRE OF EXECUTIONS

Monarchists Institute Desperate Reprisal Measures to Break Revolution in Portugal.

Madrid, Feb. 4.—The execution of suspects in connection with the assassination of the King and Crown Prince started in Oporto today. Scores have been arrested, while hundreds of refugees are pouring across the Spanish frontier. Every indication is that ex-Premier Franco is virtual dictator. Serious outbreaks and shootings are reported from Lisbon.

Rome, Feb. 4.—Italy is announced that if the situation in Portugal grows any worse, Italy will send a warship to Lisbon. It is also announced that Italy will dispatch a warship to that port, if the Dowager Queen Amelia expresses a desire to leave the country.

His Majesty's Ally and Friend. London, Feb. 4.—Many rumors are current respecting the sending of British cruisers and a British Atlantic fleet from Gibraltar and Vigo respectively, to Lisbon, in view of the assassination and the consequent unrest. It had been partly fixed that the British fleet should visit Lisbon.

Hungary Refuses Conciliatory. Buda Pesth, Feb. 4.—The Hungarian chamber of deputies today refused to vote on the motion, submitted by the royal family of Portugal on the death of King Carlos. The motion of the chamber however voted in substance as follows: "The views of the Hungarian parliament on freedom are such that the House could not dedicate a resolution to the King who had abolished constitutional government and instituted a dictatorship."

Disorders in Lisbon. Paris, Feb. 4.—Among the alarmist reports received here to-night from Portugal, is one that Premier Franco is striving to flee into Spain. It is further stated that the revolutionists have broken out in Lisbon, and at the time of the sending of the telegram heavy firing was heard in the direction of the harbor and the city of Lisbon.

Something Yet Untold. London, Feb. 4.—The Mail displays the following from its correspondent: "Impossible to send news," and editorially comments that this is significant that there is something to conceal that is yet untold, and the truth cannot be known till the uncertainty is removed.

King Heavily Injured. London, Feb. 4.—The King became known today that King Carlos carried a line of two hundred thousand dollars life insurance, with a permanent British insurance company.

Revolutionists Executed. Madrid, Spain, Feb. 4.—The censor's lid has been clapped tight on all news despatches from Lisbon, but the news reaches us by the movement of hundreds of revolutionists throughout Portugal and of the execution by shooting of many ringleaders at Oporto, while other information shows that former Premier Franco, in fear of his life, has either left the country or is in hiding.

Premier Franco is Blamed. Madrid, Feb. 4.—Although Premier Franco has retired from the Premiership, he will probably remain near the young King as an advisor, and it is thought his influence for reprisal will be surely followed by more bloodshed. Already it is evident that efforts are being made to bring the Republicans and the Regentists. Premier Franco is considered a most reactionary man and is solely blamed for the tragedy. Details of the plot appear to show the most cunning ingenuity.

Parliament Reconstructed. Charlottetown, P.E.I., Feb. 3.—The provincial government was reconstructed Saturday. J. D. McInnis was sworn in as a member of the executive to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Premier Peters. F. J. Hazard is Premier.

FORMAL OPENING OF NEW Y.M.C.A.

The formal opening of the spacious new Y.M.C.A. building, which has recently been erected in this city took place last evening, and was attended by a large number of enthusiastic citizens, including not a few ladies who, by their presence, expressed their sympathy with the work for the betterment of young men, which is being carried forward in Edmonton.

Several excellent speeches were delivered during the evening. The views of the organizers and the optimistic trend of the addresses by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Hulett, by association workers from Montreal, Winnipeg and Calgary, and by several leading local men, marked the occasion as a memorable one in the history of the Y.M.C.A. work in Edmonton.

WILL NOT REMOVE EMBARGO. British Opinion Says Such a Thing Would Be Detrimental. Montreal, Feb. 3.—A special London cable says the movement among 200 members of parliament here to repeal the embargo on the sale of goods to Canada, which was imposed after the Fenian raids, is not being supported.

PORTUGAL'S KING ASSASSINATED

Together With Crown Prince Louis, Nation on Verge of Revolution.

Lisbon, Feb. 2.—King Charles I. of Portugal, and Crown Prince Louis were assassinated and the king's second son, Emanuel, wounded by revolutionaries late Saturday afternoon.

The royal party were returning from Vila Vicosa, the country estate, where they had been sojourning. The carriage had just passed through the gates of the city.

The queen bravely sprang to her feet in the carriage and tried to shield the crown prince with her own body, but it was too late. The king fell back at the first shot, and at the same moment, the crown prince was struck in the lower jaw and one arm.

Assassins Were Killed. Lisbon, Feb. 2.—The government issued the following statement: "The king, queen and crown prince were in the first carriage. Prince Emanuel with the officers of the royal household, were in the second."

Nation in Revolt. Lisbon, Feb. 2.—Badajoz, correspondent of Paris writes that the king in full revolution and the position of Premier Franco is said to be precarious.

Nation is Staggered. Lisbon, Feb. 2.—The assassination of King Charles and the crown prince here in the streets today has created consternation bordering on anarchy.

Prince Emanuel Made King. Lisbon, Feb. 2.—Under the title of Emanuel II, Prince Emanuel Marie Philippe Charles Ambraco, was proclaimed king of Portugal today.

JURY'S VERDICT IN BRUSHA INQUEST

Finding Places Responsibility on Herman Kroone. Alleged Morinville Murder.

"We, the jury, empaneled to enquire into the death of John Brusha, and that the deceased came to his death from a gunshot wound inflicted at the hands of Herman Kroone."

This was the verdict of the coroner's jury at the inquest into the death of John Brusha, who was shot at the farm of J. I. Sprinkle, two miles from Morinville, on Friday afternoon.

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NATAL ACT HARMLESS.

Winnipeg, Feb. 3.—If the Imperial authorities do not make any objection it is quite possible that the Dominion authorities will not interfere with the Natal Act, which has been passed by the British Columbia legislature, but which has not yet received the lieutenant-governor's assent.

That being the case the provincial Natal act cannot apply to the Japanese colonies, but the thing that can do is to prevent Hindus from coming in, and they have been shut out by the immigration regulation.

It has been recognized also that the province can not enforce the Natal Act as it has no machinery to guard the long boundary line between British Columbia and the United States on the south and between the province of Alberta on the east.

Winnipeg, Man. Feb. 2.—Egged on by the local branch of the Dominion Alliance, who have been agitating for closer Sabbath observance, the Winnipeg police today raided, or at least took the names of over thirty persons accused of breaking the provisions of the Lord's Day Act, and the local enforcers not only shut down tight the Sunday lid, but jumped on it until no respectable citizen dared to be seen walking on Main street.
