

**Making Remorse Useful.**

Regret and remorse are two of the bitterest, the most commonest and the most futile feelings in the world.

To dwell upon the past is to neglect the present, and to neglect the present is to prepare more regrets for the future. "Tomorrow-to-day will be yesterday," is a good motto for those who are apt to think too much about the "it might have been" and ignore the "it may be."

And yet there is one way in which the bitterness of regret may be turned into the sweetness of wisdom. And that is, when you are assailed by the miserable memory of some foolish mistake, instead of trying to blame someone else, or indulging in an energy-wasting fit of the blues, just walk bravely up to that mistake, look it over carefully and try to put your finger on the exact quality in you which caused it. And then, when you have found that quality, stick up a good big danger sign in your consciousness, and perhaps it may do some good the next time you are headed toward a similar blunder.

For instance, once upon a time I wanted to buy a horse and carriage, for which luxury I had been saving for several years. A man who was interested in horses got wind of my desire and hastened to tell me of a great bargain (? I went with him to see it and at once fell in love with the rig and bought it the next day. Before I had it a week I realized that neither the horse nor the buggy was at all what I wanted. The carriage was too light and the horse too spirited. A few months later I sold the horse for one-half and the buggy for about one-seventh of what I paid for them.

Every time I think of that little transaction I am assailed with bitter regrets, the more so because shortly after I bought this outfit I might have had a suitable and reliable rig for about the same price.

Now to say myself with vain regrets or to bitterly blame the man who advised me to buy is absolutely useless, but there is one thing I can do, I can say to myself, "You were advised to wait a bit and look around, but you were sure that was the only horse on the market. It was your impetuosity that made you make that foolish mistake. You know it is always causing you trouble. Next time you have an important step to take, be guided by other people's advice and don't be in such a hurry. When you go house-hunting this Fall, you'll be sure to fall in love with the first pretty house you see, overlook all its disadvantages and think it's the only one in the world. Well, that's the time for you to remember your bad bargain."

If I say that to myself emphatically enough who knows but that I may improve a little?

Irretrievable mistakes are bitter things but then so are some of the best medicines; and like the medicine, they are useless until we have swallowed them.

**Household Notes.**

When fighting the gas, turn it on for a few seconds, then hold the match one inch above the chimney. It is through applying the match too quickly that so many mantles are destroyed.

When cutting material on the bias, it is the part of wisdom to lay the goods smoothly on a sewing table or sewing board. Pin, if necessary, so as to avoid any danger from slipping or pulling.

Lamp chimneys can be quickly cleaned by holding the hand over one end and putting the other end over the spout of a simmering tea kettle. Rub at once with a smooth cloth or tissue paper.

New rope may be made pliable by boiling it in water for a couple of hours. Its strength is not diminished, but its stiffness is gone. It must hang in a warm room and must not be allowed to kink.

Perfectly clear, cold coffee will renovate black silk much better than beer. It is applied to the right side of the silk, which should be ironed on the wrong side, over a heavy blanket, when half dry.

To clean a veil, take one pint of wood alcohol and put into glass jar; drop veil into jar, cover and shake thoroughly for several minutes. Remove veil squeezing gently and allowing the dripping to drop back into vessel. Shake in the open air and draw into shape on a round, perfectly clean stick.

If there are fruit stains on the table napkins, rub with and soak in a little turpentine before washing. For mildew, tie up cream of tartar with the soiled part and boil in clear water or rub with a fresh tomato.

Try several shades of silk together in one needle when mending plaid or checks, using colours to harmonize with the predominating tones of the material. The mended part scarcely will show after it is neatly pressed.

To save chicks, put several stones in each pan or trough in which you keep water for your chickens; then when the little chicks happen to get into the pan they can get out by means of these stones and not drown.

An olive-oil bath is very fine for a pain or fever. Put two table-spoonsful of olive oil at the foot of your palm or fern about once a month, and you have no idea, unless you have

**Novel Method of Tunnel Boring.**

Vancouver, B.C., August 21.—In order to facilitate the driving of the 22 1/2 39-foot double track Canadian Pacific Railway Tunnel, of five miles long, through Rogers' Pass, at the summit of the Selkirk, Messrs. Foley, Welch and Stewart, the contractors, have decided to adopt a new method which will be watched with great interest by the engineering world.

The expedient consists of first, boring a parallel tunnel, 7 by 8 feet, for virtually the same length, and, from this tunnel cross-cuts will be made at short intervals to the site of the proposed large tunnel. This will enable gangs of men and machine drills to attack the work simultaneously at scores of points. Incidentally, the "pioneer" tunnel, as it is called, will also provide ventilation, and will, for a considerable time, provide an exit in removing the rock material.

The railway company and the contractors have figured that it would take too many years to construct the large size bore, starting only from the two ends.

**Principle or Expediency?**

The Morrison organ is engaged in the task of "boosting" Sir Edward Morris. "Spectator" is instilling into the minds of the Morrison readers that a most thorough scrutiny of the long public life of Sir Edward Morris discloses that throughout his career Sir Edward has invariably placed principle before personal ambition, party expediency or political expediency. No doubt, the Hon. Donald Morrison is another man who places principle invariably first and will cordially endorse these pious sentiments, for is not Sir Edward his patron, guide and friend? The Hon. Donald has liberally "forgotten" that he ever thought otherwise. He has probably forgotten that he ever insinuated that Sir Edward placed political expediency before principle. We should however like to recall to his defective memory, that he wrote in 1905 in the Daily News as follows:—

"If my main object in life was what the man in the street called political success, I might have taken pattern by Sir E. P. Morris who is such a warm friend of Temperance reformers and rum-sellers at one and the same time."  
But Sir Edward Morris, of course, always places principle first. It was principle and not party expediency which made him come out in defence of Morrison in connection with the charges in the Coaker Memorial. It was principle and not mere political expediency which induced Sir Edward to assure ex-Governor Williams that it would be ridiculous not to believe that Mr. Morrison forgot the law about licensees being forbidden to cut on adjoining Crown Lands. It was principle and not mere political expediency which induced Sir Edward Morris to assure the people at Berlin that he had built all the branch railway lines out of \$4,000,000. It was principle and not mere party expediency which led Sir Edward to assure the House of Assembly that the total burden on the country of the branch line-building would be \$140,000 a year instead of twice that charge.

After all, however, Mr. Morrison does not meet the substance of the charge made by "More Anon." "More Anon" charges him with uttering and publishing sectarian appeals and furnishes illustrations. What has Mr. Morrison to say to these charges? It is not sufficient to say he will answer the charges if "More Anon" will give his name and profess readiness to answer his queries then. That is a mere evasion of the charge. Surely Mr. Morrison has not forgotten that he did not show any readiness to answer queries put to him by Mr. Strong over his own signature. Mr. Morrison's own organs started the sectarian appeal by falsely charging upon the Liberal Party the policy of establishing "free schools." Mr. Morrison lives in a glass house and he must expect reprisals. We are willing to leave to the public the judgment of which is more disgusting, "stirring up sectarian strife," or the use even by "Watchman" of a coarse expression.



### Kyle Arrives

WITH SHIPWRECKED CREW. The s.s. Kyle, Capt. W. Parsons, arrived back from Labrador ports last night. Favorable weather was met going and returning and the trip was made in quick time. Coming south she went to the scene of the wreck of the s.s. Duchess of Marlborough and look off the crew.

**HOW THE "DUCHESS" WAS LOST.** As already known, the Duchess was stranded on Hussey's Rock, at the mouth of Belle Isle Straits, at midnight on Friday last. The crew of the Duchess assert that the weather was moderate at the time and the only reason given for the mishap is that the ship was kept too near the land. In fact she went well upon the rocks and began to make water quickly. Great efforts were made to get the ship off, but without avail. Engines were reversed but she could not be backed out into deep water. Boats were then lowered and the passengers went ashore in one of them to Battle Harbor. A short while after the crew, excepting the captain and chief engineer, who are standing by the vessel, reached the shore safely, taking their belongings with them. When the Kyle left to come south the seas were breaking over her and it is thought that by now she is broken up. Some of the furnishings were saved by the Kyle.

### Seek Accurate Canadian News.

Toronto, August 19.—With the object of acquiring reliable information first hand concerning the boundless resources of the Dominion, a party of prominent men from Wales are making a coast-to-coast tour of the country, under the guidance of Mr. Sydney W. Pugh, Canadian Immigrant Agent for Wales.

Among the party which arrived in the city yesterday are Sir Thomas Williams, Stipendiary Magistrate of Merthyr-Tydvil and Aberdare; Sir John W. Courtis, former Lord Mayor of Cardiff, and Mr. William Davies, editor in chief of the Cardiff Daily Mail, Evening Express and Weekly Mail, some of the leading Welsh papers.

They desire to gather data regarding the industrial, commercial financial and agricultural possibilities of the Dominion which may be used in the old land for the benefit of intending emigrants. Also to counteract the bad impressions created over there by a certain class of men who are endeavouring to unload Canadian securities of doubtful value upon the investing public.

The visitors were greatly impressed with the city which they described as the most English place they had yet seen. They had a big word of praise for the citizens generally, whom they found were very obliging, dignified and sociable.

### WHOLESALE SMUGGLING.

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 21.—Wholesale smuggling of horses, cattle and grain across the Canadian border, amounting to thousands of dollars and said to involve a well known cattle dealer, has been unearthed by the collector of customs, Judson Lamoure, Jr., of the district of North and South Dakota and Northwestern Minnesota, assisted by special agent Foulkes, of St. Paul, according to an announcement last night. Several arrests along the border have been made. According to information from Hallowell, Minn., near the centre of the smuggling district, the operations have been carried along on the border between St. Vincent and Warrad, Minn. There is no customs port between these two places, which are about 100 miles apart.

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. GLASGOW, To-day.

Co-operation as the basis of the ideal state of the future was the keynote of the address of Earl Grey at the opening of the Congress of the International Co-operative Alliance here yesterday. Co-operation would put a barrier against the tyranny of the trusts, he said, and would reconcile the warring force of labor and capital. Six hundred delegates were present representing Co-operative American and European societies. Earl Grey's views enunciated with much fervor, were warmly applauded. He declared the application of the Co-operative principle in the industrial life of Britain, the States, France, Germany, Denmark, and Ireland were proved by the substitution of organized distribution for unorganized distribution, co-operative buying for individual buying, co-operative transportation and marketing for industrial selling and co-operative use of machinery. The waste of both producer and consumer could thereby be met more effectively, and to the consumer a reduction in the cost of living, and a greater command not only of necessities but of comforts and conveniences of life, and to the producer a substantial increase of amount of net profits available for distribution which meant an increase of fund from which alone could be drawn high wages, all of which are desired for the underpaid workers of the civilized world. The remarkable growth of the Co-operative movement justified the confident expectation that the day of a new social order was at hand. Although the delegates might be separated by differences of race, language and religion, they had met as one people under the flag of a Co-operative fraternity, carrying in their hearts the same motto, "Each for all and all for each."

LONDON, To-day.

Jack Johnson, negro pugilist, says he is going to appear in public music halls, where he is billed for a two days' test to find out if the public want to show if they do he will fill his engagement. The pugilist entered the box last night of a Theatre of Varieties and was loudly cheered. Two performers who had taken a prominent part against Johnson in the controversy that has been waged over his promised appearance were unable to finish their turns, owing to a demonstration in favor of Johnson.

LONDON, To-day.

Two most powerful native ruling families in British India were united yesterday, when a Princess of India, only daughter of the reigning Maharajah Gaskwar of Baroda, was married here to Prince Iskendra, son of Maharajah Caschibhar after a romantic courtship.

It is expected that William Bassard Hall, who has been in Mexico City in an official capacity, will accompany Lind, or leave soon afterward. Rumors persist that General Treviño who has been summoned to the Capital to become Provisional President, but confirmation is lacking of this report. It is offset by another that General Huerta has called out most of the retired officers and many of those report for duty. General Felix Diaz, who is on his way to Japan as special Mexican Ambassador, is also said to have received a summons to return to the capital.

## Boy Gypsies Stole Found After 17 Years.

Special to Evening Telegram.

Known Only His Name was Fred, But Aunt, First, and Then Parents Identified Him.

Watertown, N.Y., August 20.—Fred Brossseau, twenty-four, who was kidnapped by gypsies nearly seventeen years ago, has been restored to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Brossseau, of Sissonville, St. Lawrence County, N.Y., who had long mourned him as dead. On October 14th, 1896, young Brossseau left home to meet his father at the edge of the village. That was the last seen of the boy in Sissonville. About a week ago a young man deserted from a band of gypsies in the Canadian wilds, and took refuge with the monks of Ok, whose isolated monastery is forty miles from Montreal. He could remember nothing of his history previous to becoming a member of the band, except that he had been called Fred and that his former home was in Northern New York. The presence of the wanderer was reported by the monks to the Montreal police, and an aunt of the young man recognized his picture in a newspaper. The parents were notified and went to Montreal, where they positively identified Brossseau by a birthmark. He is being detained by the police as a witness against some of the gypsies who are under arrest charged with kidnaping.

## Algerians Feting British Squadron.

Philippeville, Algeria, August 21.—A telegram received in Paris states that the British squadron, composed of the battleship Inflexible, and the cruisers Dartmouth and Hussar, and nine torpedo boat destroyers are visiting this port. The British vice-consul has paid an official visit to the vessels, and the Anglo-Maltese colony is preparing a number of entertainments for the officers and crews.

**Tempting Food for the August Invalid.**

**Mulled Buttermilk.**  
 Put one pint of fresh buttermilk into a double boiler and stir constantly until ready to boil, then add the well-beaten yolk of one egg and remove from the fire at once.

**Rice Water.**  
 Boil one-half cup of rice in one quart of water until well done, strain through a clean cheese-cloth, and serve very cold. A little salt is necessary for flavor.

**Toast Water.**  
 Toast very brown a slice of bread, break into pieces and pour over it one cup of boiling water. When cool strain, and serve very cold.

**Barley Water.**  
 Boil slowly one-half pound of pearl barley in one quart of water for a half hour, strain and add one quart of water, one tablespoon of chopped raisins, two figs cut in small pieces, then cook one hour. Strain, sweeten to taste and flavor with fruit juice, lemon or orange juice preferred.

**Pineapple Water.**  
 One large, ripe pineapple, one pint of boiling syrup, juice of one lemon. Peel the pineapple and cut it into small bits, then crush. Pour on the hot syrup and lemon juice, mix and cover tightly. Allow to stand for two hours. Strain and add one quart of cold water, chill and serve. The syrup is made by boiling one cup of sugar with one pint of water.

**Watermelon Cocktail.**  
 Cut ripe, juicy watermelon into small dice, sprinkle with sugar and add a little lemon or orange juice. Serve in a tall glass, very cold.

**Mutton Chops.**  
 If meat is allowed in the diet, a tender and well broiled mutton or lamb chop is very appetizing and nourishing. Remove all the skin and fat. Season with butter and serve very hot with a slice or two of ripe seasoned tomato.

**Beef Tea.**  
 Chop fine two pounds of lean beef, and put into a glass fruit jar. Scrape on the cover and put the jar into a kettle of cold water. Boil three hours. Pour off the juice and serve hot or cold.

**Lemonade—for one Glass.**  
 Mix the juice of half a lemon and two or three teaspoons of sugar together until the sugar is dissolved. Fill the glass with cold water. When there is no ice at hand, the glass should be made very cold by holding it under running water.

**Smallpox Scare in Australia.**  
 London, August 22.—The Sydney N.S.W. correspondent of the Daily Mail, says that owing to the presence of smallpox in that city several members of the British Parliamentary party have refused to call at the Australian metropolis. Many of them notably Will Crooks, have refused to submit to vaccination, and in the absence of this they would have been detained indefinitely in New South Wales.

The Federal ministers are greatly perturbed by the outbreak. It is stated authoritatively that Sydney traders are losing £120,000 daily in consequence of the scare, which has become so acute as to prevent visitors from coming to the city from the outlying districts and from other States. Further, goods from Sydney are refused elsewhere for fear that the disease will be communicated by this means.

**Pail Mail Gazette Letter a Swindle.**  
 Berlin, Aug. 22.—The Vorwarts, the organ of the German Social-Democratic party, characterizes as "A plain audacious swindle," the letter which appeared in the London Pail Mail Gazette, Thursday, and which purported to have been written just before his death at Zurich, last week by August Bebel, the German Socialist leader. The non-Socialist newspapers, even including Monarchist organs, also express the belief that the letter was a forgery.

The letter said in part that the German Emperor had seen during the Balkan war, that his army had completely gone to pieces, that the officers were incapable of commanding and the material absolutely impossible, that if France had wished to attack Germany, she probably would have been successful, for Germany was not strong enough at the frontier. It added that the Emperor knew that the military element from Germany that helped the Turks was to blame for the defeat of the Turks.

### Heathe Gregory

SANG BEFORE QUEEN VICTORIA AND KING EDWARD.

Star of the Boston and Metropolitan Opera Companies to Sing Here With the Grand Opera Festival Organization.

Heathe Gregory is the leading basso who will be heard here during the Grand Opera Festival by noted stars of the Boston Opera Co. when they come to the Casino, on September 5th, for a stay of three days. Heathe Gregory has been famous as a soloist ever since he was six years old, and the story of his success reads like a fairy tale. When but six, he was found to have a very good soprano voice, and entered the famous boys' choir of St. Mary's Church, Brooklyn, New York. His fame immediately became quite general and at the age of seven, he was secured by the Cathedral in Exeter, England. There he had his first "command" performance, and appeared before her late Majesty Queen Victoria, when but eight years old, at Sandringham Palace. He stayed in England for another year, and then returned to the United States, becoming soloist of the Church of the Advent, in Boston. From that time on, he devoted much of his time to concert work, and one of his most remarkable feats was the creation of the role of Marguerite in "Faust" at an operatic season in the old Boston Theatre. This is the only time recorded in musical history when this part has been sung by a boy. Shortly after this occurrence he became the star soloist of Trinity Church, in New York City, where, except for his summer tours, he remained until the changing of his voice at the age of seventeen. His range when at his prime, when of soprano voice, was three octaves, and he actually was able to sustain F above high C with perfect ease. In his concert work he sang such arias as the Polish one, "Je suis Titania," from the opera, "Mignon," the "Romeo and Juliet" waltz song, and the mad scene from "Lucia di Lammermoor."

After the change in his voice, he was a basso, and immediately won recognition. He was a member of the celebrated Maurice Grau Opera Company when but twenty years old, and when that organization was anta-

gated with the Metropolitan Opera Company he stayed and made a great triumph in New York City. When he made his first public appearance as a basso it was with Mme. Schumann-Heink, with whom he toured until signing with Grau as his leading basso for a term of years. After the expiration of this contract he gave up opera work.

He sang just enough in opera on both sides of the water to maintain his reputation, and he won distinct favor in Berlin, Dresden, Munich and Paris.

In 1902 he sang at a musicale in honor of his late Majesty King Edward, given by Mrs. George Cornwallis-West (Lady Randolph Churchill). Three months later, by special command of King Edward, he sang at a dinner, given by His Majesty to the officers of the Queen's Own Oxfordshire Hussars, and was personally commended by the King. His third appearance before the King was at Buckingham Palace, and Miss Fritzi Scheff was the assisting artist.

With Miss Alice Neilson he shared the honors of a command performance given for Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall, with the famous composer, Tosti, as accompanist. To honor the composer, Mr. Gregory bought and learned his "Good-bye," and Tosti played it for him, and with that centrality for which he is noted, refused to accompany Mr. Gregory in any numbers, written by other composers. Miss Neilson, after singing several Tosti numbers, sat down and played her own accompaniment to either songs, and Mr. Gregory was finally relieved from the awkward situation in which he was placed by the offer of Mrs. Lawrence Townsend, wife of the American Ambassador at Belgium, to play for him.

Mr. Gregory is sure to be one of the big hits of the Grand Opera Festival here. His voice has a sweetness quite unusual in a basso, and many critics attribute this to his early experience as a soprano. In which, with Earle Gulek, he shared the honors of the world.



### Quebec Has Spicy Case of Blackmail

Quebec, Aug. 22.—The Quebec police-court has now under investigation a case of considerable interest. Last spring Ernest Atell, engaged in the lumber business, sold twelve hundred ties to the Quebec Harbor Commission. Before their delivery he got into financial difficulties, and during his absence in Montreal to consult with his creditors, the ties arrived at the port of Quebec. The schooner captain, not finding Mr. Odell, went to J. E. Letellier, one of the three harbor commissioners, who purchased the ties for 42 cents each, and it is alleged, afterwards sold them to the commission for sixty cents. Mr. Odell came back to Quebec, and learning of the transaction, approached Mr. Letellier for a share of the profits, and not receiving any satisfaction, wrote a letter to Mr. Letellier, threatening him with exposure to his chief. The latter immediately applied for a warrant and had Mr. Odell arrested on a charge of blackmail, and the case has been in the police court for nearly two months. In the meantime Mr. Odell was approached for a settlement by making an apology, including the admission that he had lied. This Mr. Odell refused to do, and the case promises to go for trial, if not dismissed after investigation in the police court.



**Cable News.**

ROUEN, August 25.  
The French aviator, M. Moulaitet and a passenger, M. Metrier, were killed to-day by the collapse of their aeroplane.

BUCHAREST, August 25.  
It is reported here that the European Powers have selected one of the Princes of Germany, for the Albanian Throne.

PARIS, August 25.  
The French Foreign Office has cable instructions to the French Minister in Mexico, to support the policy of the States toward Mexico strongly, by making friendly representations to Provisional President Huerta.

NEW YORK, August 25.  
Thousands of longshoremen employed on the docks of the Hamburg-American liners, went on strike this afternoon. They demand the restoration of the pay check system recently abandoned.

LONDON, August 25.  
King George and Queen Mary has announced their intention of being present at the Braemar gathering with the Princess Royal, at Park Braemar, Sept. 4th. The gathering of the Clans was not held last year, owing to the death of the Duke of Fife.

PARIS, August 25.  
Following a military parade, and after the troops had marched back to Belleville barracks, anarchists and syndicalists paraded the Belleville industrial district, smashing shop windows, discharging revolvers at street lamps, and attempting to derail trains. Entering a cafe they bombarded a group of patriotic demonstrators with glass siphons and chairs.

SHERBROOKE, N.H., Aug. 25.  
W. K. Jerome, formerly Assistant Attorney of New York, who has been appointed special deputy attorney-general, in connection with the attempt to extradite Thaw from Sherbrooke, arrived here to-day, on his way to Sherbrooke. Jerome has followed the route taken by Thaw after his escape from Mattawan, and will be reached Sherbrooke. He is of opinion Thaw will be extradited.

LONDON, August 25.  
Rumors of a truce between militant suffragettes and the Government which have been current, seem to find support in a letter written to-day by Mrs. E. Pankhurst, advising them to take a holiday for the present. She writes: "I am gaining strength for a renewed battle when the holiday season is over, and I hope every one will take advantage of the present lull in political activity. Take the rest you all so richly deserve." Another indication that an agreement has been reached is the cessation by the authorities of the Cat and Mouse Act.

LONDON, August 25.  
Labor unrest in many forms is evidenced by the fact of half a dozen strikes being now in progress here. Thousands of men are already affected, and there is still threats of further trouble. The trouble in almost every case is a demand for higher wages, although the question of trade union recognition figures prominently in some disputes. The building trade is mostly affected, and at any moment 50,000 laborers may adopt the "down tools" policy, which action would involve 150,000 skilled artisans. The laborers are asking for a code of rules, an increase of wages and the same treatment as accorded skilled workers. The renovation of Buckingham Palace, it is understood, will not be delayed, as there is no grievance against the contractors who have the work in hand.

An interesting football contest also takes place between the Scotia and Dominion footers. The firemen's tournament will in itself be quite a treat and being novel to Newfoundland ought to be a drawing card. It will be held on the same lines as the Provincial tournaments in Canada, and will be something similar to the big tournament which takes place at Sydney, N.S. on September 1st—Labor Day. A dance in Wabana Hall with Myron's orchestra will conclude the day's sport.
