

ANOTHER RAID.

LONDON, March 13. Field Marshal French's report says one or two hostile airshins attacked the northeast coast soon after 9 o'clock to-night. About 20 bombs have fallen close to the coast. There are no reports as to casualties or damage vet.

PARIS AGAIN RAIDED.

PARIS, March 13. Four German machines were brought down and 15 trained aviators mechanics and pilots killed or made risoners, were the German casualties in last night's attack on Paris. The raid was attempted on a scale hitherto unapproached, nine squadrons participating in the attack. Some machines followed the Rivers Oise and Ourcq, while others came along the Sereil-Paris and Soissons-Paris railways. The percentage of units that succeeded in reaching Paris was small. The aerial defence has improved greatly since the time of former raids, and many of the German machines were forced back and obliged to drop their cargoes of bombs in vacant fields. While the raid was in progress French machines executed a counter air offensive upon the enemy's aerodrome from which the German raiders started. More than three tons of bombs were dropped on the Gothas' landing fields, and the probabilities seem to be that many of them made disastrous landings upon their return.

THE "MAID OF HARLECH."

HALIFAX, March 13. Capt. C. P. Moore, of St. John's. Nfid., and crew of the schr. Maid of Harlech, which was attacked by a German submarine in the Mediterranean Feb. 4th, arrived here to-night and will proceed to Nfid. to-morrow. The Maid of Harlech was on her way to a Mediterranean port with a cargo of fish. She had received her orders at Gibraltar and had only reached the longitude of 02 east when a shot from a submarine whistled across her how closely followed by seven other shots, some of which took effect. As quickly as possible the ship's boat was launched and all hands left the schooner, the submarine continuing to pelt in shells until 32 in all had been fired and the schooner sank till her decks were awash. The submarine came up alongside the boat and the captain was ordered to come oard. Capt. Moore says that they kept him on the submarine for threequarters of an hour while they discussed in German what they had better do. The officers could all speak English fluen.

AEHIAL OPERATIONS.

LONDON, March 13. The official statement of aerial operations says there has been poor visibility, but over 500 bombs have been dropped on sidings and ammunition depots at Aulnoye, southeast of Hauderm, and other depots south of Valenciennes, southeast of Cambrai and south of Douai. In the air fighting ten enemy machines were brought down in flames. Two British machines are missing. In night bombing two hundred bombs were dropped on sidings and an ammunition dump N.E. of St. Quentin. The enemy dropped a few bombs during the night but lost a four-seated machine which landed in our line, the occupants being taken prisoners. On Monday we made the third daylight raid on Germany in four days. On this occasion factories, stations and barracks at Coblenz were attacked and over a ton of bombs were dropped. Bursts were seen on all the objectives causing a few fires and a hit on a building in the southwest corner of the town, created a large explosion. A few enemy machines were encountered. All of our machines returned safely.





PATROL SINKS SUB.

LONDON, To-Day. Near Blacksod Bay, on the western coast of Ireland, an armed patrol steamer was the victor in a fight with a German submarine in British coastal waters. While the steamer was in Blacksod Bay, word was brought that a German submarine was firing on a merchant ship outside Achil Head. The patrol steamer wen right out and an hour later sighted a submarine painted black, about two miles off. When the patrol steamer was about 800 yards off she began to use her guns. All the shots were effective and the submarine attempted to get away, but the patrol steamer maintained its fire. Suddenly a lot of smoke was seen coming from the aft side from the conning tower of the U-boat, and it stopped. Its stern then began to sink and soon the conning tower disappeared, and only the fore part of the sub. was above water. After a moment the sub. disappeared entirely, leaving a large cloud of smoke. The patrol steamer waited St. Leguoris Preparation for Death, about the vicinity for two hours but saw no further trace of the U-boat. Sir J. Fortescue Flannery, member for Maldon Division of Essex, an nounced to-day that he would call attention to the First Lord of the Admiralty, in the Commons, to the remarkable heroism and seamanship the destroyer Parker in rescuing nine survivors, including the unconscious navigating officer, of the hospital ship Glenart Castle, sunk in Bristol Channel late in February.

Marine Enquiry.

(Wednesday's Proceedings.) CAPT. JAMES' CAREER.

Chief Officer William James, sworn and on being examined by Mr. Dunfield, said: I was first officer on the Florizel on her last voyage. I am a master mariner. My certificate is No. 376. I have been in her on different occasions since 1911. I went to sea when 17 years old. In Dec. 1900 1 came out to Newfoundland. I am a 35 years of age. I was sent out by Baine, Johnston & Co., and I then served my apprenticeship on the Lavinia, which lasted 5 years and 3 months. I passed as ordinary mate and got my certificate in 1906. I then went to sea in the s.s. Stord, owned by Revillon Bros., which voyage lasted a little over a month. I went to Hudson Bay and back as chief officer. I next sailed as mate in the Clementine, owned by A. Goodridge & Sons; from her I went to the Cordelia as mate. I next joined the Adventure as chief officer in 1909. I remained on her for one and a half years. I was at the ice in her. She is an ice-breaker. She had a cut away bow and was specially strengthened. I had a lot of experience in slob ice in her. I was sometime in Goodridge's Bella Rose, and the Attila owned by Baine Johnston. I went across in the s.s. Aurora to London when she was sold. I went as chief officer. I joined the Red Cross Line officer. I joined the Red Cross Line and came out in the s.s. Stephano when she was new. I had experience in her in ice coming from Halifax and New York. I was appointed as third officer in 1911 to the Florizel. I was next transferred to the Rosalind. I was in her nine months, till navigation closed on the St. Lawrence. I was again transferred to the Stephano as 3rd officer but after one trip I was again transferred to the Rosalind and remained on her till she was sold in 1912. I was again sent back to the Florizel as third officer and remained on her till 1914. I was then transferrel as second on the Stephano and was on her till she was torpedoed in October, 1916. I was on the Stephano for two winters. I was put in charge of the Neptune in Dec., 1916 for one voyage. In February, 1917 I was in charge of the s.s. Ranger. I was in charge of her till I was transferred to the I'lo izel on her last trip. The Neptune and Ranger were wooden ice-breaking ships. I had experience in the ice with the Neptune.

LONDON, March 13, English troops carried out a sucssful raid this morning against a erman strong point southeast of Polygon Wood, in the Ypres sector, says Field Marshal Haig's report tonight. In addition to losses inflicted on the enemy 37 prisoners and three machine guns were captured. Our casualties were very slight. A raid which the enemy attempted south of Armentieres was repulsed with losses. Hostile artillery has shown considerable activity during the day north of Lens and on both sides of the LaBassee Canal, and also south of the Shrewsbury forest, Polygon Wood and Passchendaele sector.

BAKER'S STATEMENT.

PARIS, March 12.

Secretary Baker to-day made the following statement concerning Monday night's raid on Paris: "It was my first experience of actualities of war and a revelation of the methods inaugurated by an enemy who wages war against women and children as against soldiers. If his objects are to damage property, the results are trifling when compared with his efforts. If his objects are to weaken the people's morale, the reply is given by the superb conduct of the people of Paris. Moreover, aerial raids on towns which are counterpart of nitiless submarine war and attacks against American rights, are the very explanation of the reason why America entered the war. We are sending over soldiers to Europe to fight until the world is delivered from these hor

HUN AIRSHIPS DESTROYED.

Aviation-On March 11th, three German machines were destroyed by our pilots, the fourth was damaged severely. During the night of March 12th three enemy bombing airplanes were brought down by the fire of our anti-aircraft guns.

AMERICAN ARTILLERY ACTIVITY.

With the American Army in France, March 12 .- There was greater artillery activity by the Americans on the Toul sector to-day that at any time since they took positions there. American shells obliterated at least five groups of gas projectors, which had been set up by the enemy in preparation for an attack. Fires back of the German lines also were caused and a number of explosions were heard. Along the Chemin des Dames the crew of a German raider which fell at Clamecy Monday night was made prisoners by American soldiers.




