After what I wrote you in No. 16, you will no doubt be surprised to find that the Alpha is now loaded. Since that period we have had such a continuance of dry weather as was carcely ever remembered, which has enabled the planters to get their first fish (although caught very late) in order to ship much earlier than revel I have not yet heard positive eccounts from the different Bays, but from what I have known of this Bay, I am inclined to think that the quanfity caught will not average or be equal to 2-3 of last year's catch, even if bait and fish should be plenty from this time forward. 



Christiania, Norway, June 26 .-"Spitzbergen always formed a part of Norway's dominion," says Charles Rabct, a leading French geographer, in a pamphlet on the subject. "Spitzbergen is not at all a no-man's land as is generally said to-day. This idea is of recent date, and is advocated by writers mostly in good faith, but igally by cabinets docile to suggestions from Germany. Rabot refers to the Norwegian colonization of the land (there are at present 540 Norwegians out of the whole population of 600) to the Norwegian scientific exploration of the land, and finally to the great Norwegian mining industries started in 1907 many years in advance of any other European settlement. The writer describes the German maneuvers to prevent the Spitzbergen question from being settled in 1910, the intention becoming manifest at the conclusion of the Brest-Litovsk treaty with Russia that Germany was prepared to take possession of Spitzbergen for itself. Summing up, M. Rabot says political interest as well as justice and the task of removing any cause for conflict in the Arctic sea should lead the allied powers to award Spitzbergen to Norway.—Charleston American.

How Canadian Sledge Dogs Helped French Army.

At the outbreak of war a wellknown French citizen of Nome City on the Bering Straits took with him dogs of Alaska.

This man was to serve with the French Army, and his idea in introducing the dogs was that they might serve some useful purpose along the fighting line for which he nimself was destined.

The dogs were accepted by the French Army and duly sent to Vosges Mountains, this being the district in which it was considered they could perform most useful

From the very outset the cheme was found to possess possscheme was found to possess possibilities, and during the winter of 1914 the dogs were used in exactly the same capacity as they are used in Alaska and Canada-for sledge

By no means, however, was their usefulness limited to the winter months, for when the spring of 1915 came, the dogs were to draw the narrow gauge railways, so extensiveutilised in the Vosges for transportation of every kind.

The success of the scheme thus having been proved, there was a steady increase to the Lieutenant's kennel. and by 1918, 300 or 400 dogs were to be seen in their forest retreat, which was actually within shell fire

For use very close to the line the scheme was not entirely a success, as the dogs, in their eagerness for work, were constantly giving tongue, often in such volume as to be distincly audible nearly a mile away. Thus, hough the French Lieutenant is to be ongratulated on his enterprise and energy, it is not likley that the Canadian Sledge dogs will become very popular for military transportation. Still the little group of canine adventurers from the north deserve an honorable place among the war's

Certain it is that had it remained in Great Britain's possession its value would have been negative rather than positive. Germany could not then have so completely fortified it before the outbreak f the war, but, on the other hand, Great Britain would unquestionably have lost it soon after the outbreak of activities and it would have been of little actual use.

The fact that Britain of her own ree will gave over Heligoland to Germany a quarter of a century ago is interesting as indicating the lack of fear then existing in Great Britain of the empire across the sea. It was Lord Salisbury, Premier and Foreign Minister, who made the transaction without the knowledge of parliament. It was generally felt at the time in both England and Germany that Great Britain was getting decidedly the best of the bargain in the North Sea for African territories, including the spice lands and fruitful soils of Zanzibar, Wituland and Uganda. Much weight was given to the opinion of Sir Henry M. Stanley, then the eminent authority on all questions relating to the dark continent. He had been consulted by Lord Salisbury about the transaction and publicly declared that Great Britain had secured an entire suit of clothes, indeed a whole outfit of clothes, in return for a mere trouser button."-Ex.



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
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
