

RINGLEADERS ARRESTED. SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 31. Five alleged ringleaders of riots at New Aberdeen a week ago, Sunday, were arrested to-day, and warrants or others have been issued.

BRITAIN AND FRANCE. WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.

Preparations to present publicly the Five Power Naval and Submarine Treaties, at to-morrow's open session of the Arms Conference, were completed in committee to-day, after British and foreign delegates had gone in a sharp exhange over the submarine issue. The Naval Committee, however, approved in short order two treaties to limit capital ships, and impose restrictions on the use of submarines. A tilt between the British and Franch arose, when Ambassador Jusserand of France said Lord Lee in quoting some time ago an article by a French Naval Captain, which seemed to indicate the French policy of unrestricted submarine warfare, had neglected to add that the French captain concluded his article by saying "the Germans argue in this way," and therefore, Jusserand contended, the her situation in Europe. Lord Lee deprecated further controversy, and said the Allies should go forward as friends in the reconstruction of the world. Ambassader Jusserand said he Princess's Gown was pleased by the words of Lord Lee but insisted France was not imposing a submarine burden on the world, and

asked that France be not misjudged.

AN ULTIMATUM. DUBLIN, Jan. 31. One resolution for discussion at the general Conference of Sinn Fein Associations, beginning on February 7 provides that in the event of a major ity of delegates supporting Dail Eireann's ratification of the Treaty, all delegates opposing the Treaty shall either fall in with the views of the majority, or stand aside and allow the wishes of the majority to prevail. The resolutions add "we consider this course of action the only one calculated to save the country from the disaster of a split, which would be ruinous to the best interests of all sections of the people." Already 800 delegates have been nominated to attend this meeting, but it is probable there will be no less than 1,400.

NEW-FOUND-LAND. New-Found-Land, an island of the

f Normandy in 1594; but John Verazzan, who discovered them more particularly, and gave them the name of Terre-Neuve, or New-Found-Land, was the first who took possession of them in the name of Francis I. of France: This Verazzan was afterwards eaten by the savages, as he was going to discover Cape Breton. These Isles are about fifteen or sixteen in number the most considerable whereof are the Isles of the Sand or Bank of Cape Breton, of St. John, and that of the Assumption. The Isle of Cape Breton is on the South of the Gulf of St Lawrence, and is almost cut in two parts by the Gulf of Labrador, (1) The Chief port is that of St. Peter (2) which is defended by a fort. The isle of St. John (3) is on the west of the Island of Cape Breton, and is pro of fir trees, and the shore surrounded by steep rocks. The Isle of Assump tion is also called Anticosti, and lies at the mouth of the River of St. Law rence. (1) Probably Bras D'Or. (2) Sydney. (3) Prince Edward's Island. DESCRIPTION OF CODFISHING.

The Bears Port is the most consid erable of its havens. Between this and the Flat Island, so called, is the chiefest place of fishing for cod. On the East and South East of the Isle of New-Found-Land is the great Bank where cod are also taken in vast quantities. This great Bank is a sand which in some parts is fifteen fathom from the top of the water, but in others much less, yet so that vessels nay pass over it without danger. 


