





The responsibility now transfers from the awmakers to those who are to enforce the laws they have made; and, which is even more important, to the shoulders of those who drive automobiles; and this includes nearly everyvehicle of a few. It is not a class carriage. The well-to-do and the less so occupy about as much space on the highways. A flivver is quite as much of a problem as an eight-cylinder car. The workmen driving to his work is just as much a source of peril, and is just as responsible, as the youth prancing about in a 10.00 speedster.

We shall not have road safety until every individual starting out with his motor car, whether to drive in town or to go shopping or to take a pleasure trip or to hurry across the state or start on his vacation-whatever he has in mind-shall begin with the thought that on his own individual back rests the whole problem of safe roads.

The causes of many observed accidents on the highways are not touched by laws and regulations at all. If see, or whose cars draw your atten ion, you will probably come to the enclusion that a large proportion of hese accidents occur in one of three ways: Collisions at cross roads, or entering side roads; skidding on curves; collisions caused by taking blind Yet there is no hard-and-fast rule or law that will prevent these accidents. This works all right except when there happends to be another car coming the other way on the right side of the road. When that occurs, either there is a sudden stop or a crash. Nor is the reckless corner-cutting driver alone responsible—though maybe he ought to be. When you approach a blind curve, even though you are on the proper side of the road and undeniably have the right of way, keep in mind the thought that there may be a fool driver around the bend who is



Bombardier Wells-Another Pathetic Knock-Out.

(By TREVOR C. WIGNALL) The most pathetic feature of the big programme of boxing at the Albert Hall, London, recently, was the knock-out suffered by Bombardier Wells in the third round of his 15rounds contest with Jack Stanley, the Deptford ex-policeman.

Neither in appearance, stamina speed, nor boxing ability was Wells more than a shadow of his old self, and it came as no surprise when, after eight minutes of very poor fighting, he was put down for two counts and then deposited in what is now regarded as his customary position-flat out on his back with his arms at his sides and his closed eyes turned towards the roof.

It was an inglorious exit, and it was made the more so by the fact that Wells, for the first time in his career, left the ring amid hoots, much laughter, and only the faintest of faint cheers. He should know now that his fighting days are over.





The old tarpaulin who built up our sea power was a tough soul, who lived as hard as he fought and knew little of domestic comforts. His table equipment was of the scantiest kind, including neither crockery nor knives and forks. Like Queen Elizabeth, he ate with his fingers. The broad-bladed "pusser's knife," which he wore attached to a lanyard and used in his work about the ship, also served to cut up his food.

If he was not satisfied with what it pleased a niggardly Board of Admiralty to serve out to him he had to supplement it out of his own pocket. In some ways officers were not much better off than the men. Until quite recent years naval officers had to buy their own "mess traps," to pay rent for their cabins, and provide their own bedding.

The Navy, preferring old ways to new, went along in this fashion for generations, But with the coming of new men with more pronounced ideas on the subject of personal comfort changes were asked for. And they were made slowly. About a decade ago cups and saucers were issued to petty-officers' messes. Seamen, how-ever, still had to be content with basins. Now tradition is to be finally broken with cups and saucers pro-



No person with even a layman's knowledge of Air developments in the last 10 years, or with any imaginative ability to realize what future developments of the next quarter or half a century may bring forth, will be disposed to accept dogmatic limitations upon the capabilities of the Air arm to take a large, perhaps a predomin ant part in solving many of the prob ems of Imperial defence.

Lastly, it is probable that in the development of the Air arm lies the greatest potentiality of co-operation for mutual defence between different parts of the British Empire.

Provision by the Dominions of aircraft and aerodromes on their coasts, primarily for their own defence against surface borne craft or aircraft, can be achieved at far less expenditure than an equal amount of defence in the form of naval or land forces and in addition would form a reserve of air strength in the event of

Dominions have shown special aptitude for aviation and that their contribution of personnel to the flying services during the war was amazingly high in relation to their population. But I would not close this article without again drawing attention to the fact of the change in the position of these Islands that has taken place since the day that Bleriot crossed the

Channel. It is not too much to say that in the future, the whole population of Great Britain may be involved in precautions and measures of defence which will be imperative if the country is to live and be capable of carrying on its vital services during Air hostilities. And the geographical situation of our home land, and the geographical positions of the centres of population within them, add to the difficulties of the problem, and to the necessity for adequate expenditure an Air.—Pearson's




