





## SWISS INHOSPITALITY.

The philosopher, Bacon, does not appear to have thought half so much of monarchies as republics. The rea-son is obvious. His prospect of such governments took in only Switzerland, and if there can be a model republic it is one. "We see the Switzers," wrote the great man mentioned, "last well, notwithstanding their diversity of re-ligion and of cantons, for utility is their bond, and not respects." Cer-tainly; and they sometimes earry their ideas of utility to the extent of churl-ishness and inhospitality. They have denied Mazzini, the father of Italian Liberators, the privilege of living in their country, and the old man has now started to seek the "home of the brave," the safe asylum of many a political refugee - England. Here, probably, Mazzini may end his dreams of a united Italy, having to the last had reasons to think better of a mon-archy than of a theooracy or a repub-lic. Switzerland, as a nation. has long stood high in the opinion of the world, and it is a pity that it should have given cause for doubting, at the present day, the enlightend liberality of its views. But even when the Swiss were most thought of, a competent authority wrote, "they will de any-thing for momey; nothing without it." This characteristic may have had something to do with Mazzini's jour-ney to London; but it is probable that the Italian element in Switzer-land had still more.
