BAND CONTEST TO SETTLE RIVALRY

Suggested That Two Calgary Bands Hold Competition to Decide Which is the Best.

A band concert to settle once and for all which of the local musical organizations can turn out the sweetest strains of music is suggested by Capt. George D. Bagley, director of the Citizens' band. The question as to which band is the best was raised again at the council meeting last night, when it approved the recommendation of the commissioners that \$1,000 be paid this summer for the concerts of the Citizens' band; \$800 for the concerts of the Calgary Rifles' band, and \$200 for the Fibers.

Ald. Mitchell said he thought the Citizens' band was entitled to more than \$200 more than the Calgary Rifles' band, because it is a tried and trusted company of players, and also the pioneer in that line of entertainment. Ald. George Wood, however, said he thought military bands should be encouraged, as Calgary is yearly in need of music, particularly in the parks in the summer time.

Captain Bagley's Suggestion

It is because of this situation and evident jealousy and rivalry between the bands that Capt. Bagley last night suggested the competition idea.

"Our band would be willing to pay our share toward bringing a capable band here from Winnipeg or Toronto, for that matter, to judge which band is the best," he said. "One band could play one night and one another band could play the next night, and the whole range of selections from ragtime and light opera to the heavy classics. The contest could be held in public, and the whole crowd of players and their not the judges brought in a fair verdict. Our band is the oldest in the city. It comprises 38 pieces and would be pleased to have an opportunity to contest with anybody."

INJURED BALLOONISTS TELL HOW IT HAPPENED

Had an Erratic Trip From the Start and Got Beyond Control

Glasgow, Ky., May 11.—A. Holland Forbes and J. C. Yates of New York, who were injured yesterday in the fall of their balloon, the Viking, recovered consciousness about noon today, and Forbes was able to state briefly his adventures of yesterday. Mr. Yates is in so critical a condition that the physicians will not permit him to talk.

Mr. Forbes says he lost control of the balloon during the afternoon, and seeing a favorable position, pulled the trip cord to effect a landing. He gave it too much of a tug, it appears, the entire tip of the balloon was ripped open, and the big bag descended with too great rapidity.

The men are being well cared for at the home of "Old" Boston, a farmer, near Center, Ky.

ST. LOUIS, MO., MAY 11.—The balloon which was wrecked yesterday, which was piloted by Quincey, Ill., Monday evening at 6:30 p.m. and crashed at St. Louis, Mo., Monday morning.

Early yesterday morning it was sighted at Wentzville, Mo., and it passed over the Mississippi river within the limits of St. Louis. It was next reported in Southern Illinois at Wentzville, Ill., the drag rope touching the tree tops. Ballast was thrown out at North Prairie, and the balloon ascended to an altitude of 2,000 feet, and then slowly settled.

COMMANDING FEATURES OF EASTERN BUSINESS

Every Person is Looking at the Progress of the West

THE SENATOR TELLS OF BUSINESS OF SESSION

No Probability of Election Until After the Census of 1911

"The great development now going on in the west is the commanding feature in the business life of Eastern Canada. All eyes are directed to our great progress and no portion of the west occupies a larger sphere in the public mind of the east than the section of Alberta in which we live."

The above was a statement made to the Albertan yesterday by Hon. Senator James A. Loughheed, leader of the Conservative party in the Dominion senate, who returned on Sunday evening from Ottawa.

In discussing the legislation passed at the recent session of parliament, Senator Loughheed referred to the naval bill.

The Immigration Legislation. Another important piece of legislation was the revision of the Immigration Act, embodying very much more advanced restrictions as to the class of immigrants coming into Canada than that which heretofore obtained.

What is generally known as the "Miller Bill" received considerable attention, its defeat being the result of a compromise bill being passed, which apparently satisfied those interested in legitimate racing.

A question which may possibly interest western people was the granting of an extension of time under the South African veterans land warrants to the end of the present year.

"What about reports circulated in regard to differences between Mr. Borden and the Quebec Conservatives?" asked the reporter.

Reports Probably Exaggerated. "In regard to that," replied Senator Loughheed, "I have simply to say that the reports were greatly exaggerated. Any differences that exist were not at all of a personal character, and were mere differences of opinion in regard to the naval policy."

"These in no sense indicated any want of confidence in Mr. Borden's ability and popularity as leader of the Conservative party. This was accentuated at a later date by the strong expression of confidence in his leadership, and the further fact that a more united feeling exists today in regard to his leadership than at any time since he took that position."

No Sign of Election. In reply to a question as to the truth of the rumors of a probable general election in the near future, Senator Loughheed replied: "Some of the more enterprising journalists gave prominence to such rumors, but they are apparently without foundation. In no reliable quarter did I find any belief in the probability of a general election until after the census is taken in 1911, and the redistribution of seats which will necessarily follow. As to the latter, it is generally expected that Alberta will be entitled to from 15 to 17 members and on that there will be a corresponding increase in the representation from the other western provinces."

"The members from the maritime provinces are expressing serious apprehension of being overwhelmed at an early date, by the representation from the western provinces and are pressing for such amendments to the British North America Act, which will ensure to them a fixed representation based either on their present representation or that, enjoyed by them when they entered confederation. Except those provinces grow as rapidly in population as the province of Quebec, their representation must necessarily become reduced in proportion as they fall behind the Quebec unit."

A Humiliating Transaction. In speaking of the Alberta and Great Waterways contract, Senator Loughheed said that there was only one opinion among Liberals and Conservatives in regard to it. It is highly discreditable and deeply humiliating to the province of Alberta that such a transaction could possibly ever have been sanctioned by the provincial government and crystallized into legislation. It has done serious damage to the interests of Alberta in the money markets of London and New York, particularly in view of the fact that the provincial government 5 per cent bonds to the extent of \$7,000,000 were so recklessly financed as to be placed on the market at par when they should have realized on the London market at least from 110 to 112. Not only has the reputation of the province of Alberta suffered through the transaction, but that of the whole of Canada as well.

"In fact, so inexcusable and humiliating is the whole transaction that it is difficult to discuss it with any degree of patience, coolness or deliberation," concluded Senator Loughheed.

THE WATER QUESTION IN BROOKS SOLVED

C. F. R. Struck Good Flow of Excellent Water at 180 Feet

Brooks, May 12.—The great question which has been causing considerable anxiety lately, as to whether Brooks was to have good water or not, has now been settled. At a meeting of the Brooks board of trade it was decided to accept a proposition of the C.F.R. company, in which they promised to help the town to drill a well. The necessary arrangements were made and the work commenced on May 2. The C.F.R. officials were here today inspecting the work and decided to quit drilling and install a pump. They are now at a depth of 180 feet and have 123 feet of good drinking water, with an entire absence of alkali. Other wells will immediately be drilled and pumps installed in other parts of the town.

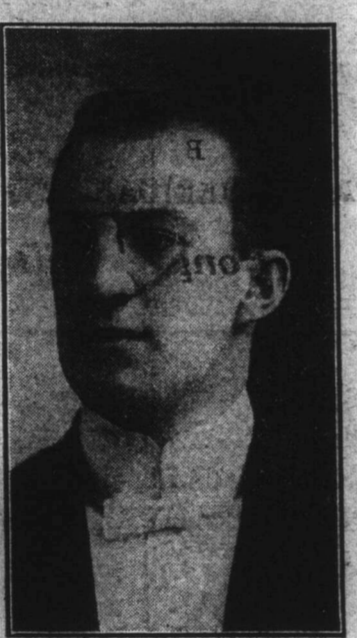

MEETING OF PARKS BOARD YESTERDAY

Reasons For Defeat of Bylaw Discussed—People Did Not Understand Object of Bylaw.

The parks board decided yesterday afternoon to go ahead and employ Prof. Buchanan of Guelph, Ont., as superintendent of parks in spite of the fact that the parks bylaw was defeated Tuesday. It was discovered that enough money had been provided for in the annual estimate to make it possible to pay a salary to the superintendent for the present year at least. City Clerk Gillis was instructed to wire Prof. Buchanan of the decision of the board at once.

Until he arrives and has had time to look over the ground, little park work will be done. In fact, there is no money to do it with. After he has made a report it is probable that another bylaw will be submitted to the ratepayers.

The reasons why the bylaw met defeat was discussed by the board yesterday afternoon. The main reason expressed was the belief that the ratepayers thought the \$93,000 was all to be expended this year, while it was intended to carry out a definite plan that might extend over a year or two.

It was suggested that another bylaw merely providing enough money for carrying out the plan for the St. George's Island and Mewata park might be submitted at once, but it was practically decided to let this rest, also, until Prof. Buchanan arrives. It is thought that Prof. Buchanan will be able to outline a plan of park improvements that will meet with the hearty approval of the citizens at large, and that then the ratepayers will authorize the funds needed to begin work.

It was decided to call for tenders at once for the exclusive privilege of serving refreshments and such things at St. George's Island this summer.

KING OF GREECE A CLEVER MONARCH

Was Threatened with Deposition, But Brought His Subjects to Safer Ideas.

London, May 10.—King George of Greece has once more emphasized his claim to the name of being the most clever and sagacious monarch of the present time. For, while during the past year his position at Athens has appeared so intolérable that his abdication, or else his deposition, was looked for almost daily, and British and Russian warships were kept permanently at the Piræus in order to afford refuge and protection to the royal family, in the event of their lives being endangered by mob violence, he remained at his post, sacrificing his annual visit to the thermal springs of Aix-les-Bains, which the doctors consider so necessary for his health and recuperation.

He was forced to submit to the removal of his sons from the commands which they occupied in the army and navy, and to their departure from Greece, these demands having been formulated by the cabinet and chamber, in deference to the so-called military league, composed of a ring of officers, who, having organized themselves for the purpose of purifying Greek political life and compelling the adoption of much needed reforms, developed into an intolérable and slightly terrorizing all branches of Greek government and life.

Throughout it all the king behaved with the utmost forbearance and dignity, endeavoring by strict observance of the constitution to bring his subjects to safer ideas. Of course, he was supported in a measure by the refusal of foreign money markets to advance any funds to the Greek government as long as the position of the throne seemed so precarious; and it was made thoroughly clear at Athens that if the king were to go, either through abdication or deposition, no more money would be available from abroad, and that the nation could no longer be expected to count upon the protection of its independence from Turkish aggression.

Princes All in Exile. The crown prince and crown princess, Prince George, and Prince Nicholas, with their children, have been living abroad for the past eight months, to all intents and purposes exiles, and just before Christmas the situation seemed to have become so serious that the crown prince had actually caused all his belongings at Athens and at his country seat in the neighborhood to be packed up for transport to Berlin, where he contemplated making thenceforth his home, taking service in the Russian army.

He was forced to submit to the removal of his sons from the commands which they occupied in the army and navy, and to their departure from Greece, these demands having been formulated by the cabinet and chamber, in deference to the so-called military league, composed of a ring of officers, who, having organized themselves for the purpose of purifying Greek political life and compelling the adoption of much needed reforms, developed into an intolérable and slightly terrorizing all branches of Greek government and life.

And now comes the climax. A year ago the expatriation of the crown prince, his elimination from the succession to the throne, and who insisted upon his being deprived, as well as his brothers of all military and naval honours and dignities, are now clamoring loudly for his return, having come to the conclusion that it is only with his backing and the support of the dynasty that they can ever expect to carry through the reforms which they have all along had in view. They do not even venture to ask him to help them toward securing the political reforms which they had contemplated at the time of their coup d'état or proclamation a year ago, but declare that they will be perfectly satisfied if he will only help them to obtain the reforms in connection with the army which are indispensable to its efficiency.

Military League Humbled. It is with this object in view that the king, so powerful but now considerably humbled and discredited, has approached the king, entreating him to immediately submit back to Greece those very principles that it is to save his sons from dismissal from the army and expatriation it had extorted from him last year. The king, refraining from the reproaches which he might justly have addressed to them, promised to comply with their wishes, and as the government as well as the opposition leaders, both heartily sick of the Military League, see in the return of the prince, especially of the heir apparent, a safeguard against any revival of the reign of terror of the Military League, and the restriction of some kind of discipline and order among the officers of the army, have also urged the king to bring back his sons to Greece.

Consequently, the crown prince and his brothers are returning in response to the wish—nay, the entreaty—of all classes of the Greek population. Indeed, the outcome of King George's sitting tight in the saddle and keeping a level head and even temper, undismayed by all thoughts of personal danger, and patient under the most exasperating and humiliating conditions is that his dynasty is more strongly established in Greece than ever.

France Has Cold Snap. Paris, France, May 11.—A severe cold spell is sweeping over France. Heavy snow storms were reported throughout the country accompanied by thunder storms. Great property damage has been done and many cattle have been killed. Spring crops are seriously menaced.

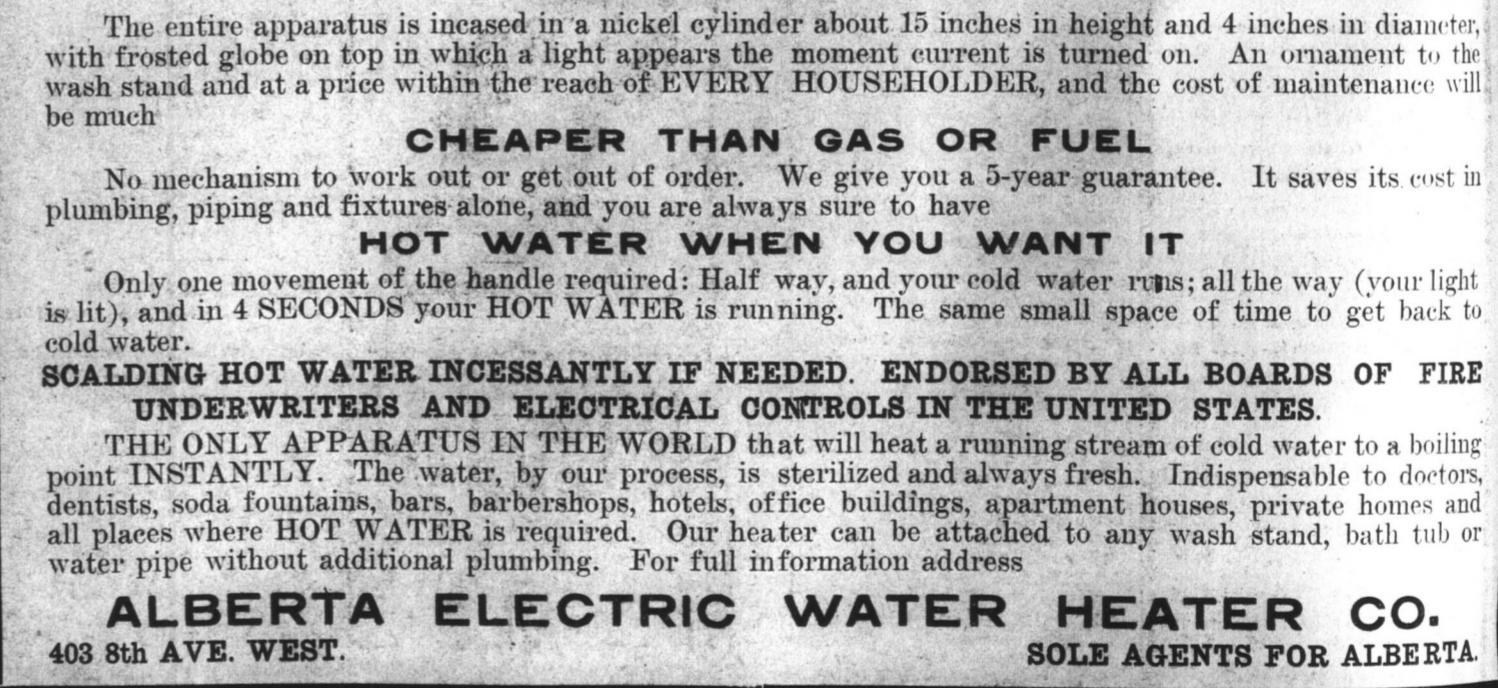

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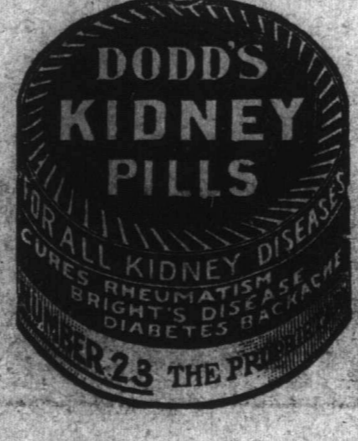

The Masons of the province of Manitoba will honor the memory of King George V. on the day of the funeral by a special session of the Grand Lodge of the province which will convene in Winnipeg on that date.

The exact nature of the ceremony which the Grand Lodge will take part in has not as yet been arranged, but it will be of a simple nature and in keeping with the principles of the order.

The record attendance is expected, and the ceremony will be one of the most impressive ever held by the Masons of the west.

CHARGE OF MANSLAUGHTER AGAINST MORAN DISMISSED.—Tommy McCarthy's Death Was Accidental and No Ground for Charge.

San Francisco, Cal., May 11.—Charges of manslaughter against Owen Moran and others, preferred on account of the death of Tommy McCarthy, following a knockout blow struck by Moran, were dismissed today by Police Judge Condon. 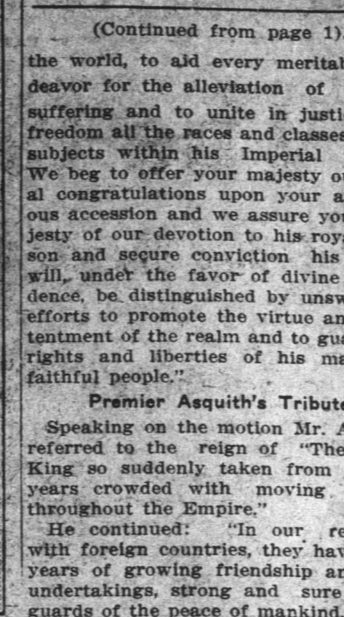

GREAT RESOURCES OF MEDICINE HAT

(Continued from page 1).
set aside in any community, and in dispensing great gifts, nature has indeed been kind to Medicine Hat. The city is right in the centre of the gas yielding area and has beneath it, in its basement billions of cubic feet ready to burst through as soon as the crust of the earth is pierced by steel drills. The part that its immense supply of natural gas, which can be had so easily and cheaply will play in the future of the city cannot be even estimated but that it will have an important influence, no one can have the least doubt. It has already brought the city to the notice of manufacturers in Eastern Canada and the United States, a number of whom are now looking over the situation with a view of establishing manufacturing industries of different kinds here. The high gas to manufacturers for fuel and lighting at 5 cents per thousand feet should be a great inducement for them to locate in Medicine Hat and give it a great place in the race for industrial supremacy in the west. This great natural resource will however never become a great dividend to the city unless the citizens adopt a broadminded and far seeing policy in their efforts to induce manufacturers to locate in their midst. There is not the slightest reason why Medicine Hat should not be a centre for flour milling, tanning, iron works, woolen mills and many other industries.

Work of Publicity Bureau.
For the past three years the Board of Trade of Medicine Hat maintained a publicity department at a great expense in an endeavor to attract more people and more capital to the city, and although the results did not come up to expectations the work done in this line in the past is now about to bear fruit. A more vigorous publicity campaign is now being entered upon with the object of disseminating by means of personal letters, newspaper and magazine articles and illustrated booklets, etc. information in regard to the great natural resources of the city and district and the advantages of the former for the establishing of manufacturing industries. Mr. G. W. H. Shippson, formerly secretary for Superintendent Taylor of the C. P. R., is the recently appointed secretary of the board and publicity agent and has entered upon his duties with enthusiasm and confidence of success. The greatest assets of any publicity department are civic pride, patriotism and confidence. These qualities the citizens of Medicine Hat possess in a marked degree. At home and abroad they talk Medicine Hat and their own confidence in the future of the city cannot fail to inspire confidence in others.

Alberta Clay Products Co.
One of the largest industrial enterprises in Alberta, the Alberta Clay Products Co., Ltd., has been established in Medicine Hat principally through the efforts of the publicity bureau for the manufacture of dry pressed brick, paving brick, sewer pipe, wall coping, hollow building blocks, partition tile, fire proof roofing, etc. The shareholders of the company are mostly Iowa capitalists and the manager, Warren Overpack, states that he was induced to come to Medicine Hat to look over suitable clay for his purposes, chiefly through the existence of natural gas and the assurance of cheap fuel. Mr. Overpack tested clay at different points between Fort William and the Rocky Mountains and found that a few miles east of Medicine Hat especially adapted for the manufacture of the articles above mentioned and commenced building operations last fall. The plant which is located in the centre of the city, will when completed, represent an original expenditure of \$250,000, and will be equipped with the most modern machinery and devices for the manufacture of clay products. One hundred and twenty-five men are employed and over \$100,000 will be expended annually in wages. The dry pressed brick department has a capacity of from 80,000 to 100,000 per day and the sewer pipe presses a capacity of about 1500 carloads per year. In conversation with the manager, I was informed that the company is shipping brick by the carload to Calgary where it has secured a good reputation among contractors and builders. The market for the products is practically unlimited and extends from lake Superior to the Pacific coast, so that the plant will require to be operated for the entire season in order to keep up with the demand.

In order to encourage the industry the city of Medicine Hat donated thirteen acres of land along the main line of the C. P. R., granted exemption from taxation for ten years, bored a gas well, secured an adequate supply of gas and turned it over free to the company.

It is expected that the establishment of this clay products industry and its successful operation will attract other industries to Medicine Hat and the city is prepared to treat any who have a legitimate proposition in a very liberal manner.

Municipal Progress.
The city of Medicine Hat is very fortunate in having at the head of its municipal affairs at the present time such a clear headed, enterprising and cautious Scotchman as Mayor D. Milne, who is ably assisted in looking after the affairs of the city by a very progressive council, and an efficient staff of civic officials.

Although the city has not reached the commission stage in its municipal history, the trend of public opinion is in that direction. In every other department it is up-to-date. Its city hall, fire department, sidewalks, water and sewer systems, etc., would be creditable to cities much larger in size and population and are evidence that the city has been wisely governed in the past.

The following figures will give some idea of the progress that has been made up to the present in civic improvements in Medicine Hat, viz: 14 miles of water works; 4 miles of sewer; 7 miles of sidewalks; 18 miles of gas mains, a well equipped fire brigade and police department and one of the finest city halls and civic offices in Western Canada.

The assessment of the city of Medicine Hat for 1910 is \$4,398,280, an increase of nearly \$600,000 over that of 1909. The rate of taxation is 10 mills in the dollar.

An application has been made to the provincial legislature for amendments to the city charter giving it power to assess land at its full value and exempt improvements to the extent of 50 per cent of their value. The debt service indebtedness of the city is \$508,878.13 or about 10 1/2 per cent of the assessment. Of this amount \$194,060.00 was expended in waterworks; \$178,495.26 in gas plant and \$190,602.18 in general improve-

ments. During the present year it is proposed to expend about \$160,000 in civic improvements, extension of sidewalks, waterworks, sewers, etc.

Cheap Fuel and Light
In every community the cost of fuel and light are very important items of domestic expenditure. In regard to this the citizens of Medicine Hat are especially fortunate and are supplied with gas from the municipal owned wells at 15 cents per thousand feet, subject to a discount of 10 per cent. This means a great saving in household and business expenses during the year. Nor is the saving in this line all. In the year 1909, after paying all operating expenses, debt service principal and interest the municipal gas system netted to the city a profit of \$15,744.50, and the citizens were thus relieved from taxation to that amount. The three municipal wells in operation have a flow of about 12,000,000 cubic feet per day and another 2,000 ft. well is being sunk.

Pure Water Supply
Another important feature in connection with the growth and development of Medicine Hat is the purity of its water supply, which is taken from the Saskatchewan river and before being distributed to consumers is put through a thorough system of filtration and purification. So completely is all bacteria of all kinds removed, that last year there was only one case of typhoid fever originated in the city.

Educational Advantages, Etc.
Medicine Hat has educational, social and religious advantages of a high order, making a desirable place of residence from these standpoints. Families coming here to reside are assured of finding as good schools, churches and a social life as cultured as can be found in any city of like size on the continent.

MR. ROOSEVELT MEETS EMPEROR WILLIAM

Strange to Say There Were no Spectacular Features About it

KAISER MEETS AMERICAN WITH SOME ENTHUSIASM

And Entertained Him and His Family at Luncheon

Potsdam, May 10.—The much discussed meeting of Emperor William and Theodore Roosevelt took place today. The visit of the former president at the New Palace was devoid of any spectacular feature, inconsistent with the court mourning for King Edward.

Mr. Roosevelt, who arrived in Berlin this morning and spent the forenoon at the American Embassy, was escorted to Potsdam this afternoon by General Alfred Von Loewenfeld, the personal representative of the Emperor.

Mr. Roosevelt was accompanied here by Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Roosevelt and Kermit; Ambassador and Mrs. Hill, Captain Samuel G. Sharpe, the military attaché, and Lieut.-Commander Bernard B. Belknap, the naval attaché to the American Embassy.

At Potsdam the emperor and empress treated their guests with great cordiality, engaging them in prolonged conversation in the small dining-room with other members of the royal family before lunch. The emperor, after the other guests had gone, showed the Roosevelts through the Sans Souci palace himself.

Ex-President Has Throat Trouble The emperor has arranged for a sham battle for tomorrow, in which 12,000 men of all arms will take part. It is somewhat doubtful, however, if Mr. Roosevelt can attend, as he is observing the utmost care, so that he will be able to deliver his lecture from the university on Thursday. The throat specialist will examine his throat again tomorrow morning, and will then decide whether or not it will be advisable for the ex-president to visit the battlefield.

Without making any definite statement regarding the condition in which he found Colonel Roosevelt's throat, the physicians explained that laryngitis often followed a long residence in the tropics, and that, in the opinion of the hoarseness in this case was not due to the strain of speaking. He thinks Mr. Roosevelt should be entirely recovered within a week.

No word has yet come to Mr. Roosevelt regarding the possibility of his being named as special envoy to the funeral of the late King Edward.

Oldest Resident of Ontario Dead St. Thomas, Ont., May 11.—Perhaps the oldest resident of Western Ontario is dead at Tilsonburg in the person of Mrs. Margaret Mahoney at the age of 103 years. The old lady could boast the unusual distinction of having lived during the reign of six successive sovereigns.

Carriages Were Late A regrettable incident occurred on the arrival of the Roosevelt party at Berlin from Stockholm this morning, when the royal carriages, intended for their use, failed to reach the station in time, and Ambassador Hill was missing from among the officials who had gathered to meet the ex-president. This was due to a misunderstanding regarding the arrival of the special train. The Roosevelts drove to the United States embassy, and shortly afterwards Mr. Roosevelt kept an appointment with a throat specialist.

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U. S. TARIFF BILL WAS DENOUNCED

Senators Dooliver and Cummins Severely Criticize Action of President Taft

Des Moines, Iowa, May 11.—Ringing denunciations of the tariff bill and the men who passed it characterized the speeches made tonight by Senator Jonathan Dooliver and Albert Cummings in opening the progressive campaign in Iowa by 10,000 progressives. The meeting tonight followed district conferences throughout the day, which steps were taken to reconstruct the Cummins' organization, and to organize the state by counties and precincts. Even President Taft did not escape the accusations of the senators. Senator Aldrich was named as the leader of corporate greed and avarice.

Senator Dooliver referred to the president as the "Tinker leader of the Republican party," which meant, he said, "a man surrounded by people who know exactly what they want."

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HOTELKEEPERS CHARGED WITH VIOLATION OF LAW

Ontario Local Option Law Being Enforced in Owen Sound

Owen Sound, Ont., May 11.—Government detectives have been busy here for the past month, with the result that twenty-three charges have been laid against local hotels for violation of the local option law.

Six to nine separate charges have been lodged against the principal hotels in this city.

CROP CONDITIONS THROUGHOUT CANADA

Census and Statistics Report Gives Interesting Information in Regard to Crops.

Ottawa, May 11.—The census and statistics issued today show the condition of crops in Canada. The reports made at the end of April show that good progress was made with spring seeding in Ontario and the western provinces, but that in Quebec and the maritime provinces little more than a beginning had been made.

Ontario and Alberta are in the lead with spring wheat and oats, the former with 89.34 per cent of the spring wheat and 74.74 per cent of the oats in the

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ground, and the latter with 97.50 of the wheat and 73.13 of oats.

Ontario also had 72.24 per cent of the barley seeded and Alberta only 38.17 per cent.

Manitoba and Saskatchewan had nearly equal, with Manitoba 90.46 per cent and the latter with 82.60 per cent. But both were slow with oats and barley.

British Columbia had a showing of 78.33 for spring wheat sown, of 81.66 for oats, and 39.17 for barley.

Ontario and Alberta are the only provinces with a substantial showing of fall wheat, and whilst in the first named the condition at the end of April was 85.67 per cent, in the second it was only 31.66 per cent.

The condition of hay and clover crops was good in all the provinces, ranging from 81.88 in Quebec to 102 in Prince Edward Island. An excellent report was made for all classes of live stock, their condition for all

Canada at the end of April compared with a standard being 84.49 for horses; 91.09 for milch cows; 89.58 for other cattle; 88.70 for sheep, and 65.10 for swine.

CORNWALL'S INFLUENCE WAS PURELY FINANCIAL

Waterways Commission Will Resume Its Sitting in Winnipeg on May 19.

Toronto, May 10.—The Alberta and Great Waterways Commission held a sitting at Osgoode Hall, yesterday, agreeing to hear the evidence of Alfred Hawes of the London Stock Exchange, who is a member of the syndicate which took over the charter of the Athabasca railway, and which applied to the Alberta government for guarantee of bonds of the Alberta company. Hawes' testimony did not add anything material to the evidence already brought out, save that it emphasized the part taken by J. K. Cornwall in using his political influence upon members of the Alberta Cabinet. Hawes made it clear that his interest in the syndicate was purely a financial one. The commission adjourned until May 18, when the sitting will be resumed in Winnipeg.

ROOSEVELT SEES MIMIC BATTLE

Ex-President Observes Manoeuvres of German Army in Company With Kaiser William.

Berlin, May 12.—Col. Roosevelt, in company of Emperor William today witnessed a mimic battle in which twelve thousand men of the German military took part, in the vicinity of Döberitz. His Majesty and Col. Roosevelt rode over the manoeuvring field of some twenty square miles and observed the working out of the army plan.

The scene of the evolutions was admirably adapted to bring out the resources of officers and men. The topography was varied, open tracts being varied with thick forests and being broken by streams, rough elevations and swamps. It had been feared that the former president would be obliged to forego this part of the entertainment planned for him because of the condition of his throat, which is still somewhat sensitive, but this morning Prof. Frankel, the throat specialist, made an examination and decided that Mr. Roosevelt would suffer no inconvenience through being for a few hours in the open air.

Will Receive Freedom of City London, May 12.—While it will be impossible to carry out in completion the elaborate program arranged for Mr. Roosevelt's visit to the ancient city of London on May 31, it is probable that subject to the consent of the former president an informal reception will be held at Guild hall at which the honorary freedom of the city will be presented to the guest, the address being contained in a scroll. The matter is now under consideration by a committee of the corporation.

LAND SURVEYORS BUSY IN EDMONTON DISTRICT

Over a Million Acres of Land Will Be Surveyed This Year

Edmonton, Alta., May 11.—Dominion land surveyors to the number of twelve have left the city within the past few weeks and will subdivide homestead lands north and northwest of the city. They have contracts totalling over a million acres. One of the last to leave the city is C. C. Farchild, who goes to Athabasca landing.

POLITENESS IN BUSINESS DEALINGS REWARDED

Nurse and Bank Clerk Remembered in Will of Boston Lady.

Paris, Ont., May 11.—The devotion of a nurse and the politeness of a bank clerk were found to have been rewarded when the will of Mrs. Annie Preston Lincoln was filed for probate today.

Miss Nellie K. Isaacs, a nurse in the family for some years, was left \$10,000; to Otto Zerrahn, a clerk in the State Street Trust company, was left \$10,000, because of "his politeness and kindness in business dealings."

Imperial News For Colonies

London, May 11.—Referring to the cheapening of press telegrams to India, South Africa and the West Indies, Sir Barry announced at a meeting of the Eastern Telegraph company that as a result of arrangements with a new agency, 250,000 telegrams would be distributed by way of Aden.

BRITISH RESENT CANADIAN RESTRICTIONS

Prevents Many From Joining Their Friends in Canada

London, May 11.—Resentment against the new restrictions imposed by Canada restricting assisted emigrants is still manifesting itself, the aspect receiving most attention being the prevention of many from joining their breadwinners in Canada.

The Self-Help society, East End fund and Central unemployed body declare that it shows an ungenerous spirit on the part of a country depending so largely for her development upon British emigrants and British gold, to blackball a large class of respectable workmen, who desire to migrate there for their own as well as Canada's good.

Canada is negotiating a \$5,000,000 loan, here, says one newspaper, and asks is the new emigration order a fair return to the Old Country for her willingness to provide five millions of British money for Canadian development?

WEALTHY IMMIGRANTS COMING TO CANADA

U. S. Commissioner Says Systematic Advertising is Carried On By Canada

Washington, May 11.—That systematic advertising of the country in the interests of immigration is carried on by Canada is shown by reports of Daniel J. Keeler, commissioner general of the United States.

The result is that the Dominion gets a large number of farmers from the western prairie. The farmer is followed by the merchant and manufacturer. For the year ended March 31, 1910, 163,788 people from the United States emigrated to Canada and 57,340 came from that country. During the preceding year 148,948 emigrated to Canada from the United States. Only 3,288 persons of the same class came from Canada to this country.

During the same period 2,206 clerks and merchants and 6,601 persons with occupations not classified emigrated from the United States to Canada, while 1,834 clerks and merchants and 22,299 persons with occupations not classified came from Canada. Thirty per cent. of the immigration into Canada during the last year was English, eight per cent. Scotch, 32 per cent. from the United States and four per cent. Italian.

The general estimate is that each emigrant going to Canada from the United States has about \$16,000 in money and chattels.

Weedmark Committed For Trial

Smith's Falls, Ont., May 11.—Weedmark, the confessed wife murderer, was arraigned before Police Magistrate Spurling in the town hall yesterday on a charge of murder. Evidence of Doctor Stammers and Hogar is positive as to the cause of the woman's death. They both swore that it was the result of strangulation caused by throttling. Weedmark was committed for trial, which will be in autumn.

SHIPPING ACCIDENT ON ST. LAWRENCE RIVER

Steamship Gramplan Sweved From Course and Stranded on Rocks

Montreal, May 11.—The first St. Lawrence shipping accident of the season occurred today when the Allan Line steamer Gramplan, bound from Glasgow to this port, went ashore at Cape LaRoche, 50 miles above Quebec. The vessel left Quebec early this morning and at Cape LaRoche swung out of the channel, striking on the rocky bottom three hours before high water. She came off at 4:30 this afternoon and is now reported to be making her way up slowly under her own steam. The Gramplan has a large number of passengers on board and she is expected in port tomorrow forenoon. Messrs. H. & A. Allan have no report of the damage she has sustained but she will be surveyed here on arrival.

OBSTACLES IN WAY OF APPOINTMENT

Favored That Duties of Governor General Would Be Beyond Energies of Duke of Connaught

London, May 12.—A London special correspondent says: "I am assured on high authority that no steps has yet been taken, having in view the Duke of Connaught's succession to Earl Grey as Governor-General of Canada, Earl Carrington was the selection of the ministry and would unquestionably have gone to Ottawa but for his appointment by King George as Lord Great Chamberlain."

On personal grounds, the Duke's appointment would be regarded with the warmest approbation, but serious objections exist. The Times correspondent today suggests that the duties of the Governor-General have become so much heavier in recent years, owing to the expansion of the west and the growth of national consciousness, that however indulgent Canadians desired to be, the exertions of the position would be beyond the energies of the duke and duchess.

An even weightier obstacle is the fact that King Edward's death throws upon the duke and Prince Arthur of Connaught the onerous duties of representing the sovereign at innumerable British and foreign imperial functions which the Prince of Wales has hitherto fulfilled.

A further difficulty, of which much is made in official quarters, is the creation of a precedent which Australia, New Zealand and South Africa would expect to be followed in their cases, and there are not enough royal representatives of the sovereign to go around.

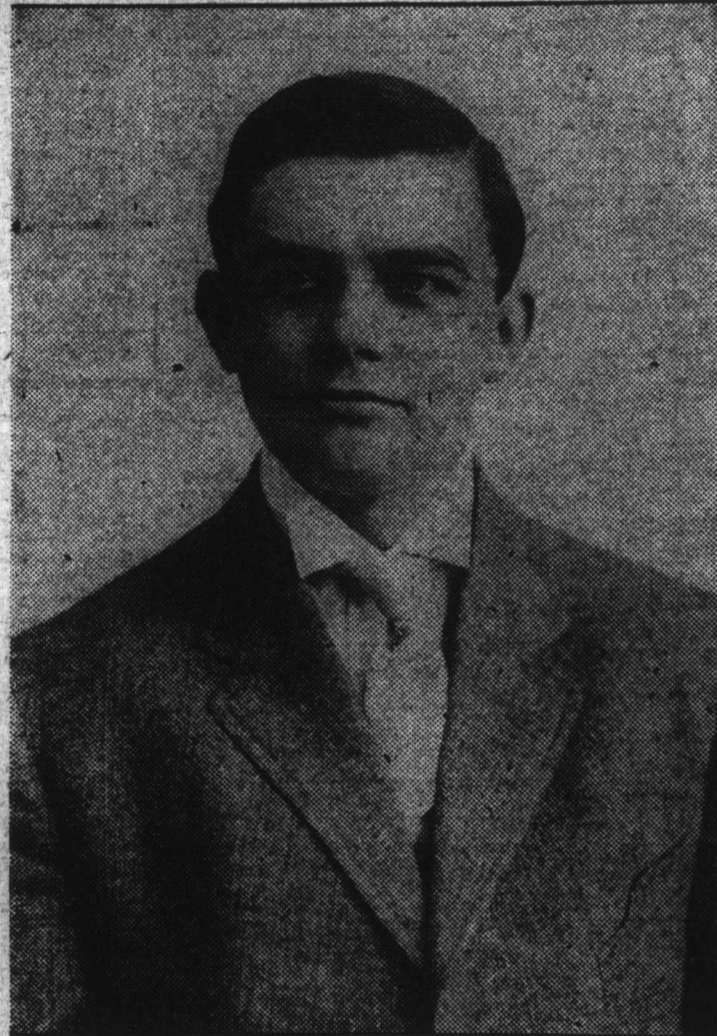

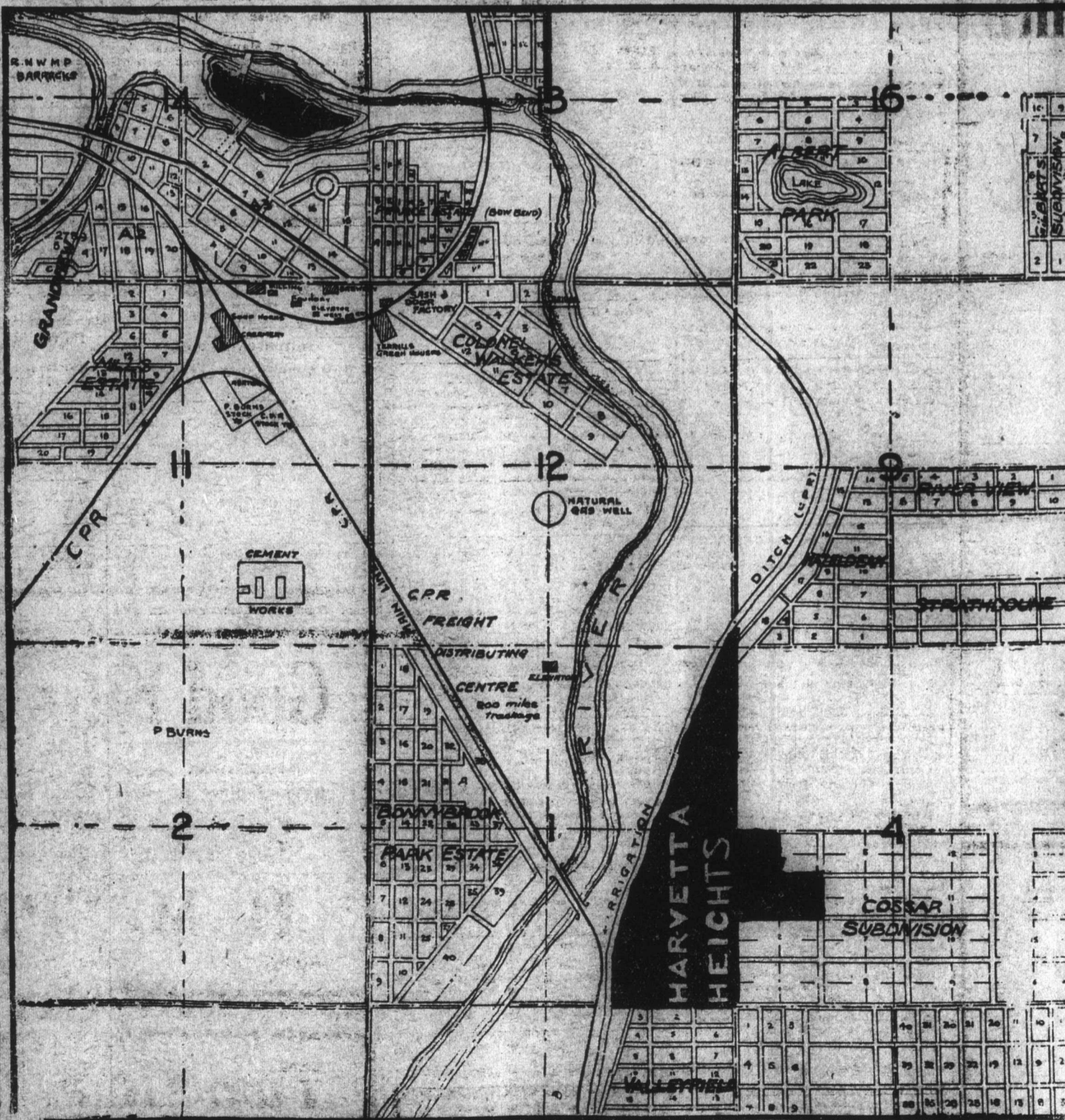
