FIFTEENTH YEAR

JAPAN IS WATCHING RUSSIA

BECAUSE OF A THREAT OF INTERVENTION.

The Russian fleet suddenly becomes a Japanese target.

London, Aug. 7.—The Tien-Tsin correspondent of the Central News says: A Chinese cruiser has captured a Japanese trading ship and taken her to Taku.

The Central News correspondent in Shanghai says Col. Von Kow Shung has made still another affidavit concerning the sinking of the Kow Shung.

Col. Von Kow Shung says that after the demands of the Japanese officers and the replies of the English and Chinese had been made, the Japanese launched two torpedoes and fired six guns at the Kow Shung.

The transport was struck amidst flames and sank quickly. The Europeans jumped into the water before the transport was completely submerged.

A copy of a Japanese edict, issued since the declaration of war, has been received by the Central News correspondent in Shanghai.

It is said that the Japanese are watching very closely the movements of the Russian fleet.

The Russian newspapers are abandoning their ideas of an intervention between England and Russia with respect to Korea, and are publishing anti-English articles.

Chinese Army Well Trained. Captain Lang, a former director of the Chinese army, and supervising the building of many forts, said in an interview: "The Chinese are well trained and excellent marksmen."

There are, however, scores of U. S. officers who have already signified their interest in accepting service with the Japanese, taking chances on the enforcement of the law against them.

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FREIGHT RATES ON FLOUR

THE PRINCIPAL TOPIC AT THE MILLERS' CONFERENCE.

The Claim Made That the Railways Give Better Rates on Wheat Freights Than on Flour is the Disadvantage of Canadian Millers—Officers Elected and General Papers Read.

From all over the far Dominion the men who convert Canada's golden grain into flour met in annual convention at the Board of Trade building yesterday.

The reports of the secretary-treasurer and auditors were read and a mass of figures quoted to show that the business of the Dominion Millers' Association has reason to be proud of the success of their organization.

There were men who handle grain in many parts of the country, and they represent one of the most important industries of the Dominion. Many were the questions of importance to millers which were discussed by the association.

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CHINESE WARRIORS.

THEY HAVE ANTIQUATED WEAPONS, BANNERS WITH DRAGON PICTURES.

The Word "War" on Each Man's Back—The Famous Tiger Guards, With Monarchs Painted on Bamboo Shields—Chinese War Junk.

The Chinese have not yet gone to war with modern firearms and fought according to modern western methods.

They fought the English to win the opium traffic their arms were not dissimilar to those the English had used 200 years before.

But their equipment was at least picturesque. They carried banners bearing representations of green dragons and other terrible creatures, and also huge umbrellas.

The military policeman, says a British writer, wears a placard on his breast inscribed "robustness citizen."

M. Huc, who has left a very interesting record of his labors as a missionary in China between 1840 and 1850, describes a review of the Chinese army which he witnessed.

"This grand military display was to take place outside the town on an immense sandy plain to which the warriors were already hastening in little groups, according to the banner to which they belonged; their arms, which did not trouble themselves to gleam in the sun, were also in great variety; there were guns, bows, pikes, spears, pinciforks of that insect. The Hawk's Beak was made at each end like a hawk's beak.

The men were usually supplied with rattled shields with figures of warriors, the heavy troops wore cuirasses of quilted cloth covered with iron plates, and helmets of polished brass.

The matchlock was of wrought iron worked like a fowling piece. The match was a cord of hemp or coil, and the pan had to be uncovered with the finger which was used in wet weather.

A French historian writes of the Chinese arms of 1844: "Their arms are archbuses, pikes, staves with iron and antimony. Every man, without exception, had a pipe and a fan. As to the umbrellas, that did not seem to be strictly according to regulation, for those who carried umbrellas were in a minority."

Another writer says of the navy: "The greatest ships they have are called Junco, which are very great and are made for the wars with castles very high on the poop and prow, like to the ships of the League of Nations. There are many of these that it is easy for any general of the season to gather in a little time a navy of from five hundred to a thousand of them of the same making and greatness."

Other terrible creatures, and also huge umbrellas. Many of the soldiers had colored pennants attached to their persons.

The Chinese army of the present consists of three divisions. The first is the eight banners, comprising "all living Manchou and descendants of the Mongolians and Chinese soldiers of the conquest."

The second is the provincial army of the "Green Standards" comprising the land and marine forces. This numbers about 500,000 men and is used principally for garrison and police duties.

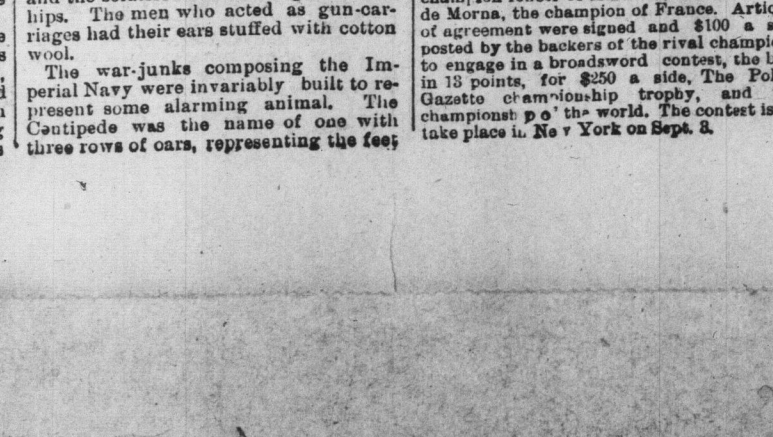
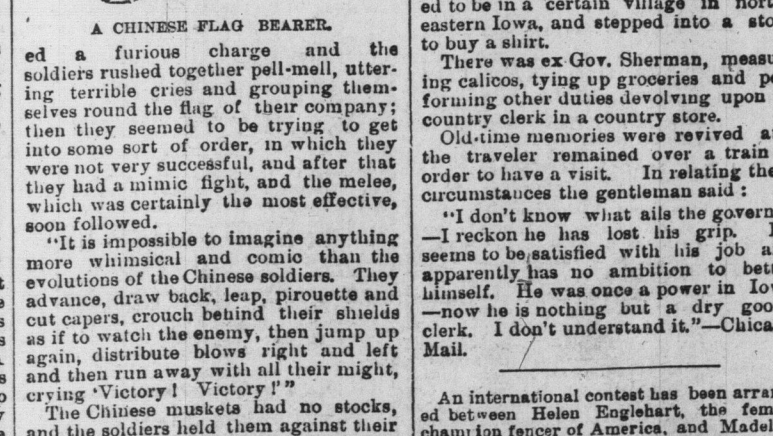
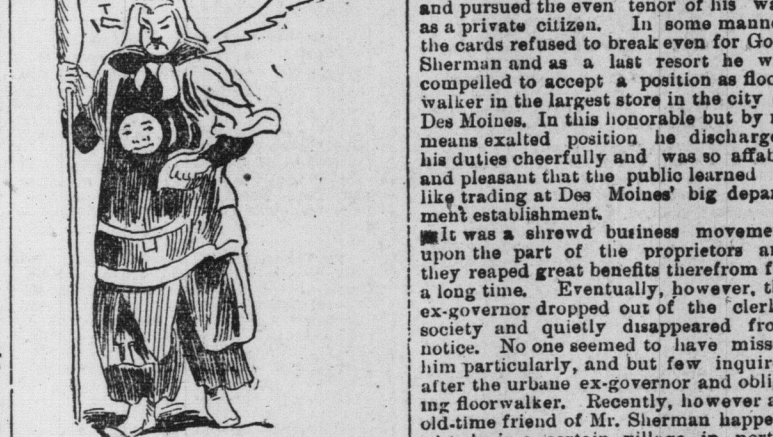
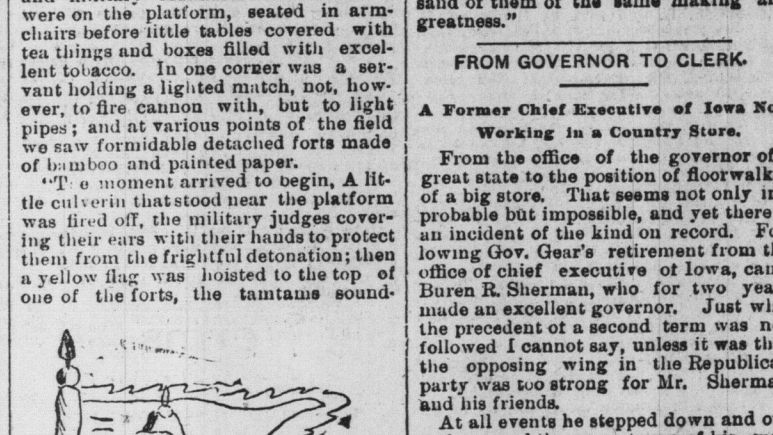
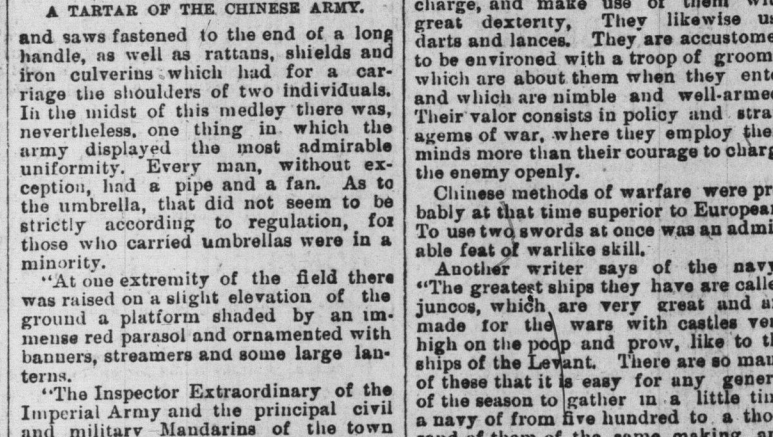
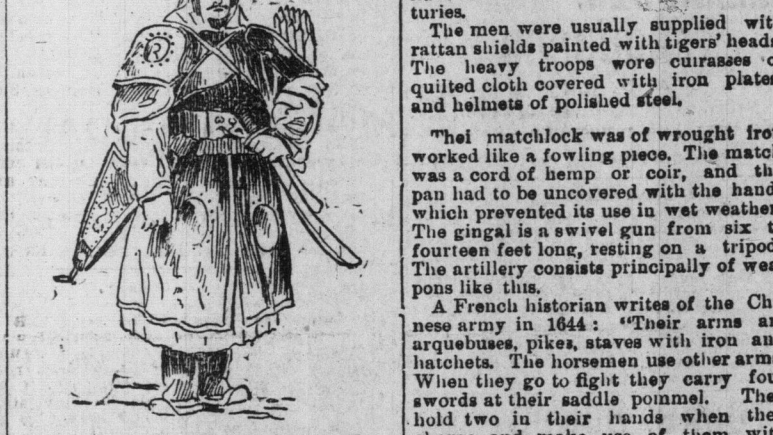
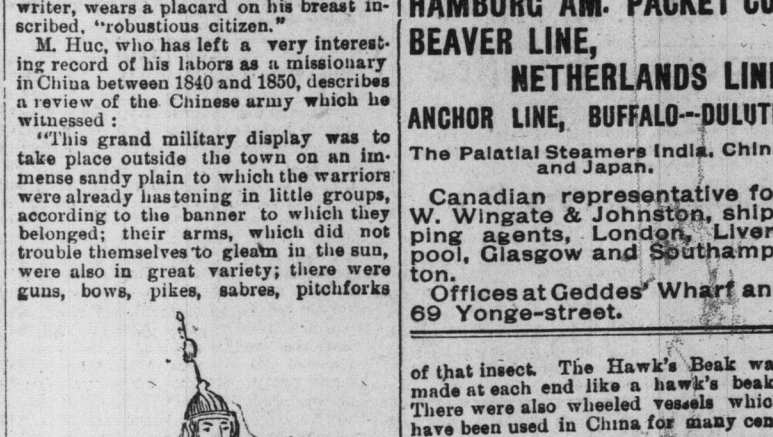
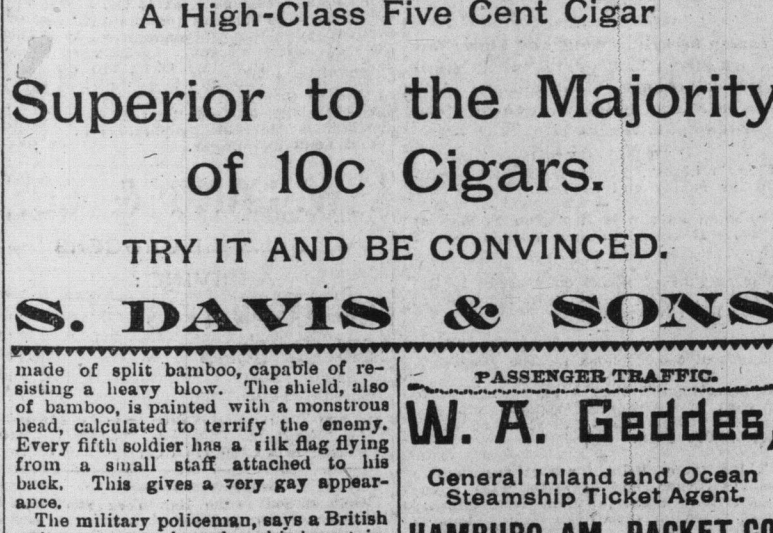
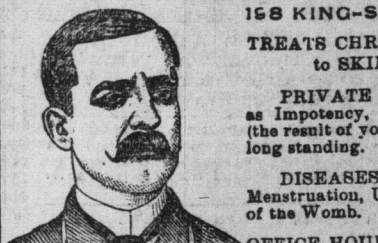
The Chinese soldier wears a uniform similar to the dress of the Chinese laborer in America commonly worn. He has a conical bamboo hat, and on the front of his coat the service to which he belongs and on the back the word "warrior" are inscribed.

A system of examinations for officers in the army is in use. Their physical attainments only are tested, lifting weights, swordsmanship and archery are the subjects of examination.

It is impossible to imagine anything more whimsical and comic than the evolutions of the Chinese soldiers. They advance, draw back, leap, piroouette and capers, crowd behind their shields and in the enemy, then jump up again, distribute bows right and left and then run away with all their might, crying "Victory! Victory!"

The Chinese muskets had no stocks, and the soldiers held them against their hips, the men who acted as gun-carriers had their ears stuffed with cotton wool.

The Imperial war-junks composing the Imperial Navy were invariably built to represent some alarming animal. The Centipedes were the name of one with three rows of cars, representing the feet
