London, Nov. 10.—The usual banquet given by the Lord Mayor upon his installation in office took place to-night in the Guild Hall, the occasion being the taking over of the chief magistracy of the city by Sir Walter Henry Wilkin, the successor of Sir Joseph Rensell.

These Present. The banquet was presided by a reception in the library of the Guild Hall. As the Ministers, especially Lord Salisbury, arrived, they were loudly and repeatedly cheered.

Lord Salisbury deprecating indulgence in the alibi that some single power would escape the treaty and try to settle the question in its own manner.

STARVATION IN JAMAICA

Six Persons in Awful Distress Owing to Drought.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 10.—Mail advices from Jamaica state that the utmost distress exists in St. Elizabeth district, affecting 6000 persons. The privation is dreadful. One or two deaths have already occurred, and it is feared more will follow.

BUGLARS AT ST. KITZES
