In our last issue we gave the results of our analysis of the blue book having reference to the chartered banks of Canada.

Next comes the Exchange Bank of Vancouver with a paid up capital of \$247,254, of which no less than \$244,384 is held by Nova Scotians outside of the province.

We come now to the Commercial Bank of Vancouver, which closes our list of Nova Scotia banking institutions.

These banks have a combined capital of \$4,020,000, and it will be seen by the figures that Nova Scotians own shares in it to the amount of \$4,343,440.

It will also be seen that the citizens of Halifax and Dartmouth hold shares to the value of nearly three millions of dollars.

It is also interesting to note that the value of the country shareholders hold, within a trifling sum, one-half of the total amount of the shares.

A further examination of these returns however proved an intense surprise to us and will not doubt be a similar surprise to our readers.
