The brethren engaged in the work at London are meeting with encouragement in their Sunday Gospel Meetings, and the Cottage Meetings. They have need of a room for the prosecution of their work.

MR. W. J. Orr, Secretary of the Railway Y. M. C. A. at St. Thomas, informs us that they are constantly meeting with encouragement. They have doubled their room capacity, and now have a ground floor where the men may secure all their meals, also bath rooms and hospital for the sick and injured, and various other facilities, thus meeting the wants of the men in their various conditions. One thing which speaks well, is that their late assistant has been called to fill an important Secretaryship in a R. R. Y. M. C. A. in the United States. Mr. W. Jex, late of Cobourg, is the present assistant.

DESCRIPTION OF THE TROY R. R. Y.M.C.A. ROOMS.

Extracted from the Troy Daily Times of Aug.
13th.



N Broadway, just above the depot, stands the new building of the railroad young men's Christian association. It has been in use since the first of last January, and it is continually increasing in popularity. The membership in Troy now numbers over 300. Theodore Voorhees, superintendent of the Delaware & Hudson railroad, is the leading official. The building cost more than \$10,000, and is finished in fine style. There are seven rooms on the ground floor, including the secretary's office, reading room, game room, toilet and bath rooms and kitchen. The library consists of over 600 volumes, and is continually increasing. The reading room is used by about fifty railroad employes daily. It has on its tables all the leading periodicals and the Troy daily papers. The bath room is in constant use. In the game room are appliances for playing chess, checkers, dominoes, and games of that character. Back of the building is a plot of ground which is being leveled and prepared for tennis and croquet. On the upper floor is a handsome lecture room, where services are held every Sunday afternoon. A monthly entertainment is given in this room consisting of literary and musical exercises. These entertainments are free to members of the association. Outsiders are charged a small fee for admittance. The building is in charge of A. Munro, general secretary, and one assistant. The rooms are open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 9:30 o'clock at night. The building has been visited by railroad men from all parts of the country, and all are pleased with its appearance.
