ANNUAL MEETING ON 9TH JANUARY, 1856.

The Annual Meeting of the Church Society, being its Fourteenth Anniversary, was held on the evening of Wednesday, January 9th, 1856, in the Lecture Hall, Anne Street, at 7 o'clock, Divine Service having been previously celebrated at All-Saints Chapel.

The Lord Bishop having taken the Chair, the prayers appointed for such occasions were read, when, after some introductory observations had been delivered by His Lordship, the Secretary was called upon to read the Report for the preceding year, which having been done,

1.—It was moved by the Hon. Judge Badgley, seconded by the Revd. E. C. Parkin, and

Resolved,—That the Report now read be received and adopted, and printed under the direction of the Board.

2.—It was moved by the Revd. C. L. F. Haensel, seconded by R. Hamilton, Esq., and

Resolved,—That this meeting devoutly recognizes the good hand of God in whatever of success attended the labours of the Society during the past year.

3.—It was moved by the Honorable Wm. Walker, seconded by the Revd. J. Carry, and

Resolved,—That the thanks of the Society are due, and are hereby tendered, to the Clergymen, who, by commencing their individual claims upon the Clergy Reserves Fund, have enabled it to found a small permanent Endowment for the Church in this Diocese: and that the Society trusts that the liberal spirit thus evinced on the part of the Clergy may provoke a corresponding spirit on the part of the Lay members of the Church.

4.—It was moved by J. Maclaren, Esq., seconded by the Revd. H. Roe, and

Resolved,—That this meeting renews the assurance of undiminished interest in the labors of the Sister Societies in British North America.

5.—It was moved by the Rev. A. W. Mountain, seconded by Lieut. Ashe, R. N., and

Resolved,—That the following gentlemen be elected Life-Members of the Society: Hon. John Ross, Hon. Francis Hincks, Thomas Benson, Esq. G. W. Usborne, Esq.

BY-LAW.

To provide for the management of any portion of the Commutation Fund paid under the provisions of Statute, that may be given in trust to the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and for other purposes.

Whereas according to the provisions of the Statute of this Province, passed during the present Session of Parliament, entitled, "An Act to make better provision for the appropriation of moneys arising from the Lands heretofore known as the Clergy Reserves, by rendering them available for municipal purposes," the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, receiving annual Stipends from the Clergy Reserves Fund, are permitted under certain restrictions, to commute such annual Stipends, and to receive in lieu thereof certain sums of money in full satisfaction and discharge of such annual Stipends for ever; and whereas it may be assumed that the Clergy so commuting will desire to place such Commutation-money in trust, as well for their own maintenance and support during their natural lives, as for the maintenance and support of the said Church in all times to come; and whereas the Church Society was incorporated for promoting among other objects the "encouragement and support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the said Church within this "Diocese (Quebec) and for creating a Fund towards the augmentation of "the Stipends of poor Clergymen, and towards making provision for those "who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, and for the Widows and "Orphans of the Clergy of the said Church in the said Diocese;" and the said Church Society may therefore properly undertake the management of the said Commutation-money, as coming especially within the scope and intention of its organization, and it is necessary to provide for its due administration:—

Be it therefore enacted under the authority of the Act incorporating the said Society, and with the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, that for the purpose of administering any Sum or Sums of Money that may be paid to the said Church Society, either as Commutation-money received from the Government of this Province out of the Clergy-Reserves Fund, or from any person or persons for the general support and maintenance of the said Clergy, there shall be a Committee of the Society, to be called "The Clergy-Trust Committee," who shall administer the said monies as a separate and distinct Fund from all other monies or Funds of the said Society, and shall keep separate and distinct accounts of the same under the name of "The Clergy-Trust Fund."

That the said Clergy-Trust Committee shall be composed of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese for the time being, and Ten other numbers of the said Society, five Lay and five Clerical; the Clergy being elected from the number of those directly interested in the contemplated Commutation; and that the first members of the said Committee shall be chosen immediately after the passage of this By-Law, and shall continue to hold office as such Committee until the annual Meeting of the said Society in 1856; when, and also in every subsequent year, the members of the said Clergy-Trust Committee shall be elected from among the Incorporated Members of the said Society, at a Special General Meeting to be held on the morning of the day appointed for the Annual General Meeting of the Society; and Five of such Committee shall be a Quorum to transact the business of the said Committee.

It shall be the duty of the said Committee to invest all monies received by the said Society for the purposes in the first Clause mentioned, from time to time, in good and sufficient Securities, of a description to be previously sanctioned by the Church Society, or by the Central Board, and to keep distinct accounts of the same and of the changes made from time to time therein.

That the said Committee shall have full power and authority to appoint all such Officers and Servants as they may consider necessary for the proper and efficient management of the said Trust Fund; to fix the amount of Salary they may receive, and direct payment thereof, and to take proper Security from them for the due performance of the duties with which they shall be charged.

That the said Committee shall pay half-yearly, in the months of January and July, the Sums that may be covenanted to be paid by the said Society to the several Clergymen who shall commute their Salaries from the Clergy Reserves Fund, and pay the amount thereof to the said Society, according to the provisions of the said Covenants entered into between the Society and the said Clergymen respectively for that purpose, and that such payments shall be made upon Warrants to be signed by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese for such Clergymen respectively, and shall be the first Charge upon the Funds of the said Trust.

That the said Committee shall lay before the Central Board at its periodical meetings a Statement of all monies invested and on hand belonging to the said Trust Fund, and shall also lay before the Society at its Annual Meeting a full Statement of all Investments and changes in Investments, and all monies received and paid by or on account of the said Trust during the current year.

That any Vacancy occurring in the said Committee from death, resignation, refusal or inability to act, during any current year, shall be filled up by the appointment of a new member of the Committee by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese in writing, and such vacancy and appointment shall be notified by the Lord Bishop to the Meeting of the Central Board next thereafter, and shall be entered in the minutes thereof.

The By-Law foregoing was proposed at a Special General Meeting of the Church Society held at Quebec on the 9th day of March, 1855, and adopted at another Special General Meeting held on the 11th day of April following.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1855.

In reviewing the proceedings of the past year, your Board can scarcely omit all notice of a measure so fraught with interest to the Church as the secularization of the Clergy Reserves.

To enter upon a discussion of the justice, or the expediency, of the measure itself, were obviously as unprofitable as it would be unbecoming. Enough for the devout Churchman to feel that "the powers that ~~be~~ ^{be} are ordained of God," and that the Lord Most High can rule and over-rule all things to the promotion of his own glory.

With the effects of the measure, nevertheless, we are deeply and intimately concerned. How, under the altered circumstances of the Church, we may best awaken the zeal of Churchmen, or how best direct it, when awakened, are questions which ought to come home to our hearts with a thrilling interest. If, as your Board are led to hope, an Investment has been effected by the Clergy-Trust Committee, of such a nature that very few demands, if any, are likely to be made upon the General Fund of the Society, for the support of the Missionaries, who were formerly paid out of the Clergy Reserves Fund: still this evil remains, for which a remedy must be found,—the absence of all provision for the growing wants of the Church; or for any increase to the slender Incomes of the Clergy, at all proportioned to the increased expenses, to which they are subjected by the operation of the very causes that tend to the prosperity of almost all beside.

Various plans have been discussed by your Board for raising a Missionary Fund; and for augmenting the Stipends of the rural Clergy, in such a way as shall not diminish the interest felt by the people of their respective Charges in the decent support of their own Pastors,

and so prove a real injury to them, under the guise of a seeming benefit.

One hindrance to the best concerted plans will always meet us in the habits of thought, and expectations, which members of an Established and richly endowed Body bring with them to this land of their adoption. Your Board would therefore venture to suggest, that means should be employed for making our people in general better acquainted with the condition of the Church in this Diocese, and the resources on which, under God, she must rely for the perpetuation and extension of her influence for good. It is true indeed, too true, that despite of fullest information and every the most constraining motive, many may be expected to persist still in hardening their hearts against the claims of those who "minister in holy things,"—but surely it is at least the duty of the Society to take care, as best it may, that to other pleas, this plea of ignorance be not added.

It is a sad necessity, bound up with what is fondly termed the Voluntary System, that they who bear office in the Church must perforce be conversant with the niceties of Finance, and engage to a perilous extent in the duty of minding earthly things.

The casualties arising from the war in the East have not been unfelt by your Board. We have to record, in connexion with it, the demise of three of the Life Members of the Society—Admiral Boxer, General Estcourt, and Major Mackie, 88th Regiment,—all of whom died in their Country's service: two in the Crimea, and one upon the march, at Varna.

Many of us have mourned them, as friends dear and held in high esteem. All will regret their loss, as firm supporters of the interests of the Church in Canada—but, remembering that, in these times especially, England may well expect that every man shall do his duty, you will bow, sadly it may be, but yet submissively, unto

the orderings of God's mysterious providence, and say,
 " Thy will be done !"

While tendering to the memory of these, our departed friends, the tribute of affectionate respect, your Board may be pardoned if it advert to one, of whom we hope that he may long be spared to prove, if a good soldier of an earthly Sovereign, so also of Jesus Christ.

Amid the din of arms, and dangers of no ordinary kind, amid the stern preparations for the final assault of the Redan, in which he bore so conspicuous a part, Major Ranken yet found leisure and inclination to make inquiries in a letter addressed to a friend in this country, whether a sum of money, collected by him in England towards the erection of a Church at Valcartier, and transmitted to Canada on the eve of his departure for the Crimea, had yet reached its destination: thus evincing, in a touching manner, that the cause to which, when present here amongst us, he had so frequently and so generously contributed, had not lost its hold upon the best affections of his heart.

Many indeed are the claims, which those who follow the Profession of Arms have established upon our gratitude; and we of the Church Society, at least, are forbidden to doubt that among the soldiers of our Queen are numbered not few of the excellent of the earth.

Your Board necessarily experience a measure of disappointment and regret at being obliged to state, that since the last Annual Report was presented, not more than three individuals have respectively subscribed amounts sufficient to render them eligible as Life Members of the Society. In that number it is, however, gratifying to be authorised to include His Excellency, the recently appointed Governor General of Barbadoes who, when leaving Canada, testified to his appreciation of the Society by this graceful token of interest in its welfare.

Your Board beg leave to report, with sentiments of sincere regret, the resignation of the Secretaryship of the

Society by the Rev. Dr. Adamson, consequent upon the removal of the Seat of Government from Quebec, and to state that the Rev. Gilbert Percy was appointed to the office of Secretary and Travelling Agent, at a meeting of the Central Board, held September 19, 1855.

MISSIONARY LABOR.

The Rev. A. W. Mountain having been appointed to the charge of the Quarantine Station, Grosse Isle, in conjunction with the office of Travelling Missionary, left Quebec for that Island on the 3rd day of July last, having been preceded in the discharge of the duties of Chaplain for a period of about six weeks, by the Rev. T. Pennefather.

Mr. Mountain remained at Grosse Isle until September 21st, at which time, the patients in Hospital being all in a state of convalescence, and few Protestant Immigrants, if any, being expected subsequently, he returned to Quebec.

Some Vessels, however, having afterwards arrived, containing Protestants, labouring under sickness, the Rev. Mr. Jenkins was sent down by the Lord Bishop to the Quarantine Station on October 2nd, where he remained until the 12th of the same month.

Mr. Mountain's labours consisted in daily visits to the Hospital; Services in Church twice on Sundays, occasionally a third Service at the Hospital, when there was a sufficient number of convalescents to form a congregation, and Services in Church on week-days, when opportunity permitted, for the healthy Emigrants in the Sheds.

Mr. Mountain twice visited Crane Island in the vicinity, performing Divine Service at the Mannor-house, and administering the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The Rev. Mr. Ross, of Rivière du Loup (en bas) by direction of the Lord Bishop, visited in the month of September last, the scattered Flocks on the banks of the Saguenay. His first visit was to Grande Baie, 60 miles

from the mouth of the River Saguenay, where he remained for two days, and held Divine Service and preached each evening, to a Congregation of twenty persons, in the house of his host, Mr. Blair, the Chief Agent of Mr. Price's Establishment. From thence, Mr. Ross proceeded to Rivière du Moulin, and remained there for the space of ten days, as the guest of Mr. D. Price. Here he celebrated Divine Service and preached upon five occasions, to a Congregation of about twenty-five persons, distributed French and English Tracts, read portions of Scripture and the Service of the Church of England, in the French language, to a few French-Canadian Protestants, and having visited Chicoutimi and its neighbourhood, returned on 17th September, to Grande Baie. Here, on the evening of his return, he read Prayers and preached; and next day went on board a Schooner, with the intention of visiting the Establishment at Petit Saguenay: but, in consequence of the roughness of the weather, the Schooner was unable to put in, and therefore proceeded direct to L'anse-à-l'Eau, at the mouth of the Saguenay. Mr. Ross celebrated Divine Service here, and preached to a small Congregation, consisting chiefly of the family of Mr. Radford, the Chief Agent. Circumstances, over which he had no control, prevented Mr. Ross from visiting the Settlement at Rivière aux Canards on the opposite shore of the Saguenay; and on September 22nd, he sailed from L'anse-à-l'Eau for Rivière-du-Loup, which he reached after a passage of six hours.

The Rev. P. S. Williams, in his Report of missionary duties performed at River David, states that he celebrated Divine Service on Sundays at that Station upon eleven occasions during the past year: upon ten of which the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

With regard to the Fund for contributing to the support of the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, your

Board are still enabled, through the blessing of a beneficent Providence, thankfully to report a continued and steady increase; and to state that, although one ministering Servant of the Lord has been called hence unto his rest, since the publication of the last Annual Report, no new demands have been made upon it during the last year.

Additional Investments to the amount of £185 have been effected since the publication of last Report: making a total of £2,285 invested. There remains in hand, awaiting investment, a sum of £151 7s. 9d.

DEPOSITORY.

Miss Fuller having resigned the charge of the Depository, the Stock was transferred in the month of April last to the care of Miss Wood, John Street.

The Sales effected during the twelve months ending December 31, 1855, have amounted to the sum of £41 10s. 1d.

The following grants have been made by the Depository Committee:—Bibles, Prayer Books, Books and Tracts, for gratuitous distribution, and for the use of Schools, to the amount of £37 10s. Twelve Bibles, and fifty-six Prayer Books (amount not specified) for gratuitous distribution. Eleven Bibles and Prayer Books in the German language to Rev. Mr. Haensel, for the use of German Immigrants. Grants also, to a considerable extent, of Bibles and Prayer Books have been made to Clergymen in the rural districts, for sale, either at reduced rates, or at the ordinary Depository prices.

The Depository received last year from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge a large, and valuable, assortment of Books. But, in consequence, it is believed, of the great difference between the prices of English and American Editions of Books, the sales have not been so extensive as might otherwise have been expected.

Your Board, while adverting to the subject of the Depository, beg leave to express their unanimous conviction, that a larger and much more varied selection of Books is indispensable. Without this, it appears to your Board, that it is idle to expect that the Establishment should flourish, or be enabled on fair terms to compete with others.

EDUCATION.

The sum of £12 10s. has been granted in aid of the School at Portneuf, and a like amount to that at Bury.

At the meeting of the Central Board, held May 16, 1855, a grant of £75 was made to the Colonial Church and School Society, in aid of their Schools, established in this Diocese, in the hope of at once advancing the cause of Religious Education, and of securing to this Diocese advantages similar to those that have been derived from the extension of the educational efforts of that Society to the neighbouring Diocese of Montreal and elsewhere. This grant has not yet been called for: a circumstance which may probably be traced to certain financial reasons, referred to in their last Report, as having caused the Society to suspend, for a season, its organization in more than one Diocese of British North America.

The Board are deeply impressed with a sense of the importance of endeavouring to diffuse the blessings of religious instruction amongst the generation rising up around them; and therefore cannot but lament that, however willing and desirous to respond, in every instance, to the demands that may be made upon them for the furtherance of such an object, they are enabled, comparatively speaking, to effect so little, in consequence of the limited nature of their resources.

Gratuities of £10 each have also been awarded to Clergymen, whose Parishes or Missions have raised a like amount.

Towards repairs of Parsonage at Melbourne, the Board have granted whatever amount may have been raised for the Society in that Parish, during the year.

GRATUITIES TO CLERGYMEN.

From the continued high prices of almost all the necessaries of life, your Board have deemed it incumbent upon them to recur to the system introduced last year,

of granting a moderate Sum to those of the Country Clergy, whose incomes do not exceed £125 per annum.

They have, however, considered it expedient that this Grant should be accompanied by the condition, that a similar Sum shall in all cases be raised for the Clergyman in the Parish, or Missionary Station, in which he officiates. And though, in some few instances, this condition may perhaps be found to work unfavourably to the Clergyman, the Board are unwilling to believe that, even in the poorest portions of the Diocese, the small sum of £10 cannot be raised by the people in acknowledgment of the advantages they receive: more especially since provisions, forage, and fire-wood, &c., may be contributed instead of money. The limited Incomes of the Missionaries have hitherto been mainly provided by the benevolence of Churchmen in England. But that this should continue much longer to be the case cannot reasonably be expected, even by the most sanguine. And it is now manifestly high time that the people should begin, at least partially, to provide for the support of their own Clergy. It is time that they should act up to their professed belief, that "The labourer is worthy of his hire." It is time that they should learn practically to comprehend the meaning of the Apostle's language, when he says, that the Lord hath ordained that "they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel:" and again, "If we have sown unto you spiritual things, is it a great thing if we shall reap your carnal things:" and again, "Let him that is taught in the word communicate unto him that teacheth in all good things."

In furtherance of this object, so justly to be desired,—the augmentation, in these times of difficulty, of the Incomes of the rural Clergy,—the Lord Bishop, at the request of the Central Board, addressed in the course of last Summer a Pastoral Letter to the members of the Church within the Diocese. And the Wardens of each

Church and Chapel in the Parish of Quebec were requested to solicit contributions from the several Congregations towards the same end.

The Church Wardens of the Cathedral, aided by two gentlemen of the Congregation, have complied with this request; and a considerable sum has, in consequence, been collected. But your Board regret to say, that they have not been informed of any other similar effort having been made for the accomplishment of the object contemplated.

Your Board consider it expedient to submit a copy of the Resolution referred to above, which was passed at a meeting of the Central Board, held July 11th, 1855; and also a list of those Parishes which have responded thereto:

Resolved,—"That so soon as the Church Wardens of "any rural Parish or Station, where the salary of the "Clergyman does not exceed £125 per annum, shall "report to the President of the Society that the Congregation has contributed, during the present year, the "amount of £10, either in money or its equivalent, in "addition to any regular payments to which he may be "entitled, the Treasurer do pay to such Clergyman a "corresponding sum of £10."

ST. FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION.

The Annual Meeting of the St. Francis District Association was held at Sherbrooke on Tuesday, October 16, Divine Service having been previously celebrated, and the Holy Communion administered.

Taken as a whole, there is much in the Report presented to the meeting that is encouraging: but somewhat also, as might be expected, of an opposite tendency, "The unprecedented pressure of the times," it states, "and the unpropitious seasons, causing almost a total failure in some portions of the grain crops, have very much curtailed the Subscription Lists in some of the Missions.

Of Upper Durham, the Missionary reports, that the work of the Mission progresses quietly and steadily, the people being ready to contribute according to their ability. The exterior of the Church has been painted during the last year.

The language of the same Missionary with regard to Kingsey is less encouraging. He writes that, while the advantages enjoyed by the members of the Church are greater than those of many others, and their means more ample, there is not the same readiness manifested by them to support the interests of the Church, that is happily seen in some of their less favoured brethren.

From the Mission of Dudswell and Ham, the Clergyman reports, that within the last year the Mission has contributed £12 10s., in labour and material, and about £25, towards payment for the Bell recently purchased for the Church.

The Missionary at Eaton reports the steady improvement of his Mission. And further states that an excellent fence has been put up round the grave-gard, at an expense of about £25, without any suggestion whatever on the part of the Clergyman. At the same time the contributions to the Church Society from this Mission are stated to be of smaller amount than in the preceding year. A result attributed to the damage done to the crops by early frosts.

From Melbourne the report is highly satisfactory : The Missionary states that, notwithstanding the pressure of the times, and the removal to other localities of some

of the contributors, the amount raised during the year exceeds that of the year preceding.

With reference to Bury and Lingwick, the Missionary thus reports: " Things go on in the customary quiet manner. A Church School has been kept during the summer at Robinson, for which the Church Society grants £12 10s. The Congregations are generally good. A monthly Sunday Service is held at Lingwick, (12 miles from Robinson) where there is a Congregation of about thirty persons, who profess adherence to the Church.

The Missionary at Compton writes in the following terms to the Secretary of the Society: " As to subscriptions for the Church Society, I have deemed it useless to set them on foot just now; difficulty (by reason of ' hard times ' it is said) having been experienced in raising even the Clergyman's pittance. The people are very kind, seem disposed to make some effort, and apparently are increasing in their attachment towards our Zion. A happy and primitive scene, confirming this statement, took place two Sundays ago; a whole family, husband, wife, and three young children, (one an infant in arms) were received, before their proper witnesses and God-parents, by public Baptism, " into the Congregation of Christ's Flock."

From the Clergyman at Sherbrooke, the Secretary has had the following communication: " The Congregation have cheerfully subscribed £100 per annum, towards my stipend, instead of £85 15s., which they had engaged to do, in order to make it £175, per annum. This " shows a commendable spirit on their part."

The Missionary at Portneuf states, in a communication addressed to the Secretary, that in his Mission two School Teachers have been appointed, one at a salary of £30 per annum, and the other at £25, with house free, and fuel, in each case. He further intimates, that the members of the Church of England have decided upon building a new School House, (the present one being in a very dilapidated condition) at a distance of ten miles north (in the Bush) from the Village of Portneuf. Last winter, the number of pupils in attendance at this School amounted to 65; and it is confidently anticipated that, when a more suitable School House shall have been erected, it will be increased to at least 80. The other School, in the vicinity of the Church at Portneuf, had an average attendance, during last winter, of 25 children. A night school was also in operation, attended by about 15 young men.

The Clergyman at Valcartier informs the Secretary, that in consequence of the demands made upon the resources of his people, to meet the expenditure incurred by the erection of the new Church, he had feared that the Subscription list would this year have proved a failure. He has however succeeded in collecting the sum of £3 15s.

From Lake Beauport also, the proceeds of a Sermon in behalf of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, are reported, amounting to £1 16s.

The above sums (from Valcartier and Lake Beauport) were reported to the Secretary at a period too late to admit of their being comprehended in the Statement of amount raised in the District of Portneuf.

The Missionary reports that a Branch Association has been organized recently at Rivière du Loup, (en bas); and that subscriptions have been entered into for the year 1856. Referring to this, he writes: "Our Bishop's Pastoral Letter has had a most excellent effect: to it I must ascribe even this measure of success."

The Church at Lambie's Mills, in the parish of Leeds, commenced so long ago, is now reported to be in a very forward state, and to be advancing rapidly towards completion: certain difficulties, connected with the site, &c., having been happily surmounted.

The Missionary at Cape Cove thus writes: "The Church Society, which has hitherto been slightly known to the Church here, is now regarded with increasing interest. And although the Fishery (the main support of the people here) has been a failure, and prices of provisions continue ruinously high, still something has been done." He makes special reference to the House of Messrs. Robin & Co., of Jersey, as the main support of the Church at Percé; and alludes, in terms of grateful acknowledgment, to the unvarying sympathy and assistance, experienced at the hands of the gentlemen connected with their Establishment.

During the last year, a Glebe, consisting of about 70 acres, with a house upon it (now used as a School house) has been purchased. The whole has been valued at £200. And it is gratifying to be enabled to state, that for one third of that amount the Church is indebted to the unsolicited liberality of one of the parishioners, Thomas Savage, Esquire.

A Day School and a Sunday School are in active operation at Cape Cove. Morning Service is celebrated each Sunday at Cape Cove, and Evening Service at Percé. The Mission consists of a narrow strip of sea-coast, 40 miles in length, and contains about 400 protestant inhabitants, all members of the Church of England.

With reference to the state of his Mission, the Clergyman at Gaspé Basin, writes: "We are, I am happy to say, steadily progressing. The number of communicants has increased, and the congregations are large and attentive."

Under date July 14th, 1855, the Missionary stationed at the Magdalen Islands reports two donations of £20 each, and building materials to the value of £60 or £70. "These donations," he writes, "were made by Admiral Coffin, the proprietor of these Islands, and they are to be appropriated exclusively towards the erection of a Parsonage House, in accordance with the request of the donor. The same liberal hand," he adds, "has also given us two very handsome sets of Communion Services."

I give and bequeath to the "Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the seventh year of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, the sum of _____ pounds Curreney, (or _____ Shares of Stock in the _____ Bank of _____ standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank,) or, (if Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust, to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other.

II. *A Bequest of a sum of Money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.*

(Same as the forgoing, only instead of the words in Italics, say) for and towards the encouragement and support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the said Diocese of Quebec,—the creating a fund towards the augmentation of the Stipends of Poor Clergymen of the said United Church within the said Diocese,—and making provision for those who may be incapacitated by age and infirmity, and for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the said Church in the said Diocese.

Or,

For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of Day Schools and Sunday Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the Establishment of the United Church of England and Ireland within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of Parsonage Houses,—the setting apart of Burial Grounds and Church-yards, and the endowment and support of Parsonages and Rectories, according to the said Establishment within the said Diocese.

III. *A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.*

I give and devise unto the "Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the seventh year of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, all and singular, &c. [Describe the Real Estate clearly.] To have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. *A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.*
