RADICAL CHANGES EXPECTED WHEN CITY'S "ELECTRIC" BILL COMES BEFORE LEGISLATURE

Provision Will Be Made for Separate Votes on Street Railway and Toronto Electric Light Purchase, as Well as Stipulation That Hydro Power Be Used for Operation of Street Cars-Toronto Already Has Power to Acquire Electric Light Company—Details of Expenditure May Have to Be Given.

It is a matter of doubt at the present moment whether the special Toronto bill now before the legislature, even if it passes third reading, will accomplish the purpose for which it was designed. On its expected appearance before the house this afternoon, it is understood that several radical amendments will be moved. These may be of a nature materially to change the situation, as it is generally understood to exist.

Whereas the bill on its introduction stated plainly its provision for the joint purchase of the Toronto Railway Company and the Toronto Electric Light Company by the vote of the people, one of the amendments is understood to ordain a separate vote on each proposal.

A SEPARATE VOTE.

When Mayor Hocken's proposal to purchase the street railway came before Sir William Mackenzie, it is believed in some quarters that he preferred the joint arrangement so as to be delivered of the control of the electric company, and hoping to take advantage of the desire of the city to get control of its own transportation facilities. The submission of the joint proposal would probably make the purchase of the Electric Light Company more agreeable to the citizens, but opponents of the deal hope that it would be lost on a separate vote. It is, of course, to be remembered that the city is asking for Sir William's terms, and if they are to insist on a joint vote it may be that Mayor Hocken's negotiations will

come to nothing. ALREADY HAS POWER.

A fact apt to be overlooked is that by legislation passed two years ago the city already has the power to take over the Toronto Electric Light Company, so that its insertion in the

bill appears unnecessary.

There is little doubt, either, that one of the restrictive amendments which may be tacked to the bill since its first appearance will rule that only hydro power be used for all municipal concerns. This will naturally include the running of the railway, as well as all lighting and power propositions, and rule out any thought of competition within the corpora-

DETAILED ESTIMATE.

It is thought also that a clause will deal with the amount of expenditure involved, giving a more or less detailed estimate of the total outlay.

PRIME MINISTER MAKES CLEAR THE GOVERNMENT'S POSITION

Cannot Deal With Episode in Public Accounts Committee Until Report is presented -Mr. Hanna Accepted Campaign Fund Contribution From Geo. C. Taylor.

The position of the government in regard to the action which occurred in the public accounts committee on Friday last, in which certain questions preferred by the opposition and containing insinuations against a minister of the crown were expunged, was made clear to the house yesterday afternoon by Sir James Whitney. Some light, too, was cast upon the incident to which reference had been made. The whole burden of the explanation was that as far as the action of the committee went, the government could not deal with it until a report had been made. Further, it was a fact that in 1908 a subscription towards a compaign fund had been accepted from Geo. C. Taylor, by Hon. W. J. Hanna, in connection with the settlement of his claim for non-fulfilment of contract. The matter had arsien in committee, but in that connection the premier desired to make a thoro explanation.

MODERN MEAT EMPORIUM

Interesting Outline of the Down town Swift-Canadian Meat Warehouse.

The Toronto World Live Stock Commissioner made a very interesting in-spection of the branch of the Swift Canadian business at the St. Lawrence f revenue Market yesterday

was started some short time ago. On the ground floor, which, by the way, is ideally finished for the purpose of handling all kinds of meat products, are located the offices and shipping branch of the husiness. On the same branch of the business. On the same floor also is the cooling department for beef and other carcases, the capacity of this cooling chamber being upwards of 250 cattle, to say nothing of sheep and calves. By the most modern process of cooling arrangements a continuous and fresh supply of air is circulated around the hanging carcases, thereby acting as a natural preservaculated around the hanging carcases, thereby acting as a natural preservative and at the same time giving that tone to the meat products which can only be brought about by a reasonable

length of time of hanging.

Some idea of the extent of the operations of this branch plant can be obtained when it is stated that the output is now already in the neighborhood of 225,000 pounds a week.

On the three floors above, which are not yet quite completed, it is the intennot yet quite company to provide for tion of the company to provide for taking care of large supplies of eggs, butter, cheese and poultry, which are intended to be handled and protected by the cooling apparatus which has been installed for that purpose. A ra-ther unique feature of the business will be operated on the top floor of the building. Here it is intended to ultimately carry a large number of various varieties of live poultry to be for a short period before killing. and then to be dressed and cooled off in the chambers below.

The same class of business which as been so successfully tried in the U.S. by the swift firm is being adopted n Canada. Two of the firm's specialin Canada. Two of the firm's special-ties are what are named the Brook-field Brands. Under this system but-ter is put up in cartons of 1 lb. each, and eggs in cartons of one dozen. 





TEAMSTERS' STRIKE **ENDS IN INCREASE**

Men Went Back to Work Yesterday—Contemplate Union Organization,

The grievances of the teamsters have ended and the men resumed duties at I o'clock yesterday, as the result of a compromise with the companies. The men have returned on an increase of \$4 a month, making their wages \$54 a month, making their wages \$54 a month. They are paid on a grading principle based upon their experience and knowledge of the district. It is the companies' intention to devote their entire energies towards making deliveries of inbound freight until the congestion is cleared up. It is suggested that shippers continue carting their outbound traffic under the arrangement previously advised as to the cartage companies refunding the regular cartage charger billed for-ward on "collect" shipments. Ship-pers should keep a record of all such

shipments.
Credit for the settlement of the strike must be given to Wm. Harper, who for the past several days has been working to bring the men and the com-panies together. Yesterday morning he met a committee of the men, and after talking with them, advised them to agree to a compromise, and the men wisely took his advice, with the result that the men returned to work at noon.


WIFE MURDERER SENT TO ROCKWOOD ASYLUM

SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND

REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old. May homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, or certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father; mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acra.

Dutles—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.





RATE CASE IS DELAYED

Government Intervention Appeared to Come as Welcome News.

NEW YORK, April 21.-After several ours of aimless trading in which prices moved, the stock market became strong, ending the day with substantial advances for the leading issues. During the forepart of the session the market was unusually narrow and trading dwindled to insignificant proportions. The bidding up of stocks in the late hours of the day was accompanied by an increase of business, but the volume of trading was not large and there was no indica tion of an urgent demand such as might have been expected had the upturn re-

presented merely a successful drive at the short interest.

Trading seemed to be stimulated by the announcement that the courts had granted an extension of time for effecting dissolution of the Harriman properties. Government intervention in the railroad rate cases now before the supreme court was taken to mean that final decision in these cases would be postponed indefinitely.

Elimination of the rate cases and the Harriman merger tangle from the speculative situation as disturbing influences for some time to come encouraged buil traders and in the rise of the afternoon, operations for the long account were carried on more confidently. A noticeable feature was the scarcity of stocks, some issues rising sharply on comparatively small buying.

There was some further selling of bonds today, but the general tone was better.

Money market conditions were studied closely in view of the large requirements of new capital, which are progressing. Recent indications of a slowing down in some lines of business, in the opinion of bankers may point to a lessening of requirement for funds in commercial channels, with a consequent increase of available capital for imperative new financing.

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


