Germans at One Time Penetrated British Lines at Some Points.

COUNTER-ATTACKS WIN Battles of Saturday and Sunday for Ypres-Roulers Road Furious.

LONDON, May 12, 9:30 p.m.—The official British eye-witness, under date of May 11, gives an account of the German attempts on Saturday and Sunday last to break the British lines around Ypres and the commencement of the Anglo-French offensive north of Arras.

"Pure Killing" of Enemy By British Near Ypres

Five Hundred Germans Issued From Wood Near Town, and Not One Escaped—Enemy Strip British Dead and Don Khaki.

BRILLIANT ALLIED SUCCESS WON IN FEW HOURS' FIGHT

British Slaughtered Thousands of Germans on the Bois Grenier-Festubert Front, Capturing First Line of Trenches, and French Advanced Three Miles in Course of Swift and Sharp Action.

LONDON, May 12.—Writing of Sunday's action on the line between Bois Grenier and Festubert, the British official eye-witness says: "Further south, in the meantime, on Sunday, another struggle had been in progress on that portion of the front covered by the right of our line and the left of the French, for when the firing around Ypres was temporarily subsiding during the early hours of the morning, another and even more tremendous cannonade was suddenly started by the artillery of the allies, some 20 miles to the south."

Italy to Be at War Before Week Elapses

GENEVA, via Paris, May 13, 1:25 a.m.—The correspondent at Rome of the Journal de Geneve says he is able to affirm that Italy's intervention in the war has been absolutely decided on. "The government," the correspondent adds, "will shortly take steps which will leave no doubt about Italy's intentions, and when the cabinet appears before parliament May 20 that body will ratify an accomplished fact."

Russians Drive Austrians From Dniester River Lines

Big Offensive Started at Eastern Extremity of Lines With Complete Success and Enemy in Hasty Flight—Successes at Other Points—All Well in Galicia.

LONDON, May 12.—The Russian answer to the German rush against the lines of the Danube River, in western Galicia, is a counter-stroke in the trans-Dniester region in eastern Hungary, where the Russian troops have made a sudden advance on a 40-mile front stretching from Czernowitz to Obertyn with great success. The enemy has evacuated the whole left bank of the Dniester, and has been ejected from Zaleszycki, 26 miles northwest of Czernowitz.

Warning is Withdrawn Submarines Called Off?

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The German Embassy tonight notified by letter and telegraph newspapers in all of the larger cities of the United States to discontinue the publication of its advertisement warning Americans against transatlantic travel on belligerent ships.

PRESENT SCHEDULE TO COMMISSIONERS

Dominion Alliance Urge Many Radical Suggestions Upon New Board.

REVIVED OLD IDEAS Some Proposals Aired Again After Defeat in Legislature.

The Dominion Alliance presented the provincial license board yesterday with a carefully arranged schedule of temperance suggestions, and at some length amplified the reasons for their immediate attention. Many of them are not new in nature, and some appeared on the floor of the legislature in its closing hours following the announcement of government policy. The first on the list urged the prohibition of sale during war time, and the second along the same line did not go so far, but would prohibit sale in all places where soldiers are concentrated, or where munitions of war are being manufactured.

Close All Bars. The delegates also proposed further action in counties were local option has been voted upon, in those quarters they suggest that a majority of the votes should close all the bars. In all places they would have the bars close at 7 p.m. and at 1 o'clock on Saturdays, as well as all day on statutory holidays.

Racetracks, fair grounds and railway stations were all quoted as centres where no drinking should be allowed, and the bar lunchroom was strongly opposed. They would not allow the provision of any food in bar-rooms. Several of the members spoke at length in urging these changes, but the board stated that although consideration would be granted, it would necessarily be delayed until the year's illness were dealt with.

Harmful Habits

Children often contract injurious habits not noticed by parents and teachers until much harm is accomplished. The bones and muscles of growing children are very pliable, and great injury may be done by forming habits of action which change the natural framework of the body. It is allowed to sit up position for any length of time the muscles of the spine become weakened and make the child in time, rounded shoulders or a sufferer from spine curvature.

Care should be taken to see that the seat and desk are perfectly comfortable and suited to the size of the child. There are graded and adjustable seats and desks in every school room, so that there is no reason for angling legs and tired arms. At home, a box may be firmly on a provided support; and the back of the chair or seat must properly support the child's back. When studying or reading at home, never let the child curl up in a chair or lie on a couch. Faulty methods of standing are injurious. Standing on one foot or throwing the weight from one foot to the other may throw the body out of position so that one shoulder will become more elevated than the other, or one hip be raised higher than it should be. Walking on the sides of the feet, sitting with the legs crossed, sitting with that part turned in are harmful habits which may be remedied by watchfulness. There is no beauty or grace of the body that is not an erect posture combined with an upright body. Ten thousands of boys and girls, especially those of rapid growth, are every year acquiring the dangerous and pernicious habit of round shoulders. In the cramping of the lungs and stomach that this position induces they carry a perpetual menace to health.

Outbreak of Fever in Ten German Prison Camps is Reported.

LONDON, May 12. S. p.m.—Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary, has received thru Walter Hines Page, the American ambassador at London, and James W. Gerard, the American ambassador to Germany, a despatch which says that typhus fever is present in the following German prison camps, where there are British prisoners of war: Zossen, Alt-damm, Scheide-muhl, Gardelegen, Wittberg, Zerbst, Saagan, Cassel, Langensalza and Chemnitz. The cases of Zossen are said to be confined to Russian prisoners and a few of the Indian troops.

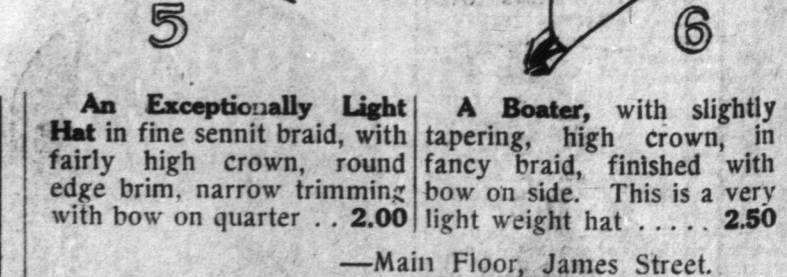

Fern Avenue defeated Earls Court in a Public School League game yesterday by the score of 13 to 4.

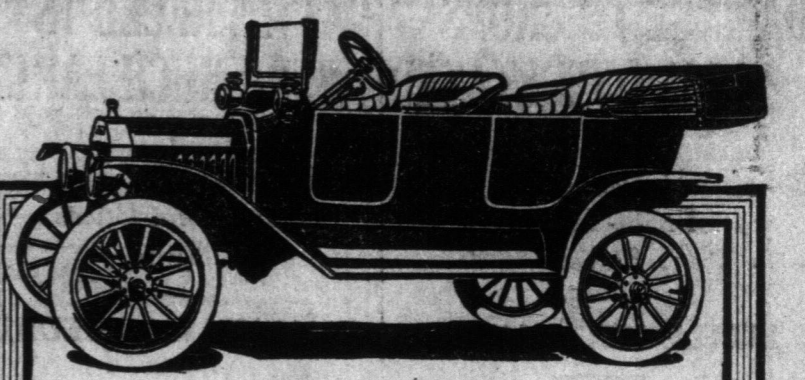
