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
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

The numering is the common process: It comes red hot out of a furnace, which hurns the surface of the wire, it plunges immediately into a vat of muriatic acid which cools it instantly, forming a scale, it then passes right through a vat of molten composition for coating. The coating is taken on top of the acsie, and hence you see it must come off with the scale, which very scon follows. This is exactly the process undar which all wire is coated, except ours. This wire is first drawn from the very best quality of charcoal iron, and then nunealed, which leaves it very plinhle and tough. It is then coatad under a new process known only to us. The coating is as deeply and thoroughly influed into the porce of the iron, that it really forms a constituent part of the wire itself. This renders it perfectly proof against the effect of the weather. After puting the wire up, hefore using it the first time, ruh over with a wet cloth to make perfectly leas. O chas are festened with the common clothes pin, which holds equally as well as on a rope line, Put it up same as you do a rope line, and use it in the same way, except wou need not take it in.
