OTTAWA, Feb. 3.—(Special.)—The conference which Premier Roblin and Hon. Robert Rogers of Manitoba had with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. W. Fielding to-day regarding the extension of the boundaries of Manitoba ended without an agreement having been reached. When the conference was over, Sir Wilfrid Laurier was asked if he had any statement to make. "We are negotiating," was his reply. Premier Roblin was more communi cative. He said Sir Wilfrid had pro-

mised to make a formal proposal to the province within thirty days. He added that the federal representatives had refused to consider any proposal by which Manitoba would get the same financial treatment as Alberta and Saskatchewan. The Ottawa ministers also refused to any agreement which would allow Manitoba to have the control of all the lands within its boundaries, and so place it on an equality with Ontario, Quebec and other provinces.

"From what we saw to-day," said Mr. Roblin, "it is a million dollars to one cent that we shall not be able to come to an agreement with the present admindstration at Ottawa."





Nasmith, city bacteriologist, has been conducting a series of experiments with the city's ice supply, and the conclusions arrived at are that if the water is allowed to freeze in the natural way, there is little danger from the ice. The ice formation creates a calm surface, which aids sedementization and tends to purify the water. The city health department has notified those harvesting ice, however, that the cutting of holes in the ice and letting the water flow over it in order to get an additional thickness, as this prevents the impurities settling any further than the coating of ice which covers the water. covers the water.





Transparent Metals.

For many years it has been known that thin sheets of gold and silver, mounted on glass, may be made transparent by heat. Within recent years study has been undertaken of the conditions under which transparency may

be produced. A sheet of gold one three-hundredhousandth of an inch thick becomes transparent when heated to 550 degrees centigrade. The transparency is ascribed to the gold aggregating and allowing white light to pass thru the With silver one one-hundred-and-

with silver one one-hundred-and-twenty-thousandth of an inch thick no transparency is produced so long as the atmosphere is a "reducing" one—such as hydrogen or coal gas. But in the air the transparency begins at 240 degrees, and is remarkably complete at 190 degrees.

At the lower temperature the light is a brilliant green, but as the temperature rises oxidation takes place, and the color changes thru olive and dark red to black.—Harper's Weekly.

A Dialect Map of China.

A new map of China was recently published by a German house which undertakes to transcribe the names in the exact forms which they assume in the dialects of the respective provinces as well as the commonly accepted form. In this way the fifteen chief dialects are represented. The commonly accepted form is printed in dark green, the dialect form in black. Thus such unfamiliar forms appear as Taetsiu for Taichow, Fupe for Hupel, Fulan for Hunan, Hokkong for Fukien, Ssjutschon for Suchow, etc. Other features which make the map valuable are the thoroness with which it treats Mongolia and the Kokonor country north of Szechuan-regions which in most maps are left more or less blank





You will notice that our profits for the year are the largest in the history of the Company, and amount to \$194,477.67, as compared with \$167,044.04 for the preceding year. In addition to paying to the Shareholders a dividend of 8 per cent, and a bonus of 2 per cent, making 10 per cent, in all, we have added \$100,000 to our Reserve Fund and \$31,776.56 has been carried forward.

World shipments promised a big failing off, but traders were in too bearish a mood to give much attention to anything that would impede the downward slide of the market. The tone at the close, however, was steady. May fluctuated from \$64c to 95%c, with last sales 4c to 5c off at \$5%c.

Signs of unsettled weather, indicating light receipts and loadings in the southwest, helped to strengthen corn. Smallness of shipments from Argentine formed an additional aid, and so did continued unfavorable corp conditions. May ranged from 49%c to 50%c and closed at 56%c, a net gain of 4c. There was considerable covering of short cats to-day, principally for local people. The effect, tho, was offset in the main by selling from influential sources. May varied between 25%c and 23%c, closing a shade up at 23%c.

Provisions weakened by unloading by packers after the hog market failed to maintain an early slight advance. The outcome was a net decline of 7% to 12½ in pork and 2%c to 5c for both lard and ribs.


