CHICAGO, April 25.—United States Commissioner Mark A. Foote to-day ordered the extradition of Dr. William Beattie Nesbitt, wanted in Toronto for the wrecking of the Farmers' Bank of Canada...

By a Staff Reporter. The testimony taken by the commissioner and the decision will have to go to Secretary of State P. C. Knox for final legislation. The secretary, in accordance with the law, will review the evidence and facts in the case and make the final order for extradition.

Travers Accuses Nesbitt. The evidence offered by the Canadian authorities consisted in the affidavits of W. G. Fitzgibbon, former accountant of the Farmers' Bank; Frank Gibson of the Canadian Finance Department; J. R. Cartwright, deputy attorney-general for Ontario; G. T. Clarkson, liquidator of the bank; Walter Duceau, inspector of detectives at Toronto; and W. R. Travers, former general manager of the bank.

Two Additional Charges. It became known yesterday that two other charges of stealing or receiving, knowing them to be stolen, two sums of \$5,000 from the funds of the bank have been lying against Nesbitt for more than a year. One of these is said to have been handed to Nesbitt by W. J. Lindsay in the bank building, and he is said to have acknowledged the receipt. The other is a sum which he is said to have secured to give to George Wishart.

Knows It Isn't Difficult to Mix in Fight, but is Forced to Do It. NEWARK, April 25.—(Can. Press.)—President Taft to-night renewed his attack on Col. Roosevelt. Carrying on the "fighting campaign into New Jersey," the president spoke to several thousand people in the armory here, declaring that it was with the utmost reluctance that he had decided to answer Mr. Roosevelt's criticism. He did not answer Mr. Roosevelt's charges in detail, but he tried to make it plain that in the opinion of Mr. Roosevelt knew most of those charges to be groundless.

THE HISTORIC PARALLEL. Brutus Killed Caesar Because He Desired the Imperial Honors. President Taft's judgment of his predecessor's aspirations after a third term were aptly anticipated by Shakespeare in the famous soliloquy when Brutus disclosed the reasons that made him a conspirator against Julius Caesar. Brutus owed much to Caesar, as Taft does to Roosevelt, but both pledged the interest of the state in their defence. President Taft, of course, contemplates no physical violence, but he does intend the complete exclusion of Colonel Roosevelt from presidential possibilities.

BRITISH WARSHIPS FOR MEXICO. MEXICO CITY, April 25.—(Can. Press.)—It was learned here on good authority to-day that a British warship is en route to the west coast to look after the interests of British subjects. It is believed here that another vessel will be sent from Great Britain to the Gulf. This action, it is understood, is the result of an understanding of the European powers, and it is believed that other nations with interests in Mexico will follow England's lead.

EL DUNKELMAN HAS ACCUSED GIBSON

Says Man Held for Murder of Rosenthal Accompanied Himself and Friend to Hydro Station, Told Him to Look at the Lightning and Struck Him on the Head.

Bill Dunkelmann, now rapidly recovering at the General Hospital, has made a statement in which he directly accuses Charles Gibson, held for the murder of Joseph Rosenthal, as the man who struck him down Good Friday night in rear of the Strachan-avenue hydro-electric transformer station. Dunkelmann does not yet know that Rosenthal, who accompanied him to the local spot, is dead.

Left Note at House. He says that this man came to his house and left the note on the Wednesday, and that he and Rosenthal went to the bridge just north of the hydro station Thursday night, to buy wire from "Smith." He had only a check to offer in payment, which was not acceptable to "Smith," so another appointment was made for the following night.

He says that he and Rosenthal went to keep this appointment, and that another man was to be there to remove the property which they went to purchase. This man did not turn up. He says that he and Rosenthal met "Smith" at the bridge, and that "Smith" asked Rosenthal to go with him, and that the two went away and disappeared behind the hydro station. Some time afterward Smith returned alone, and said that it was alright and for Dunkelmann to come on. He went with him to a pile of crates behind the station, and when they arrived there he saw the flickering of the lights by the station.

Felled to Ground. "Smith" said: "Look at that lightning." Dunkelmann turned his head in the direction "indicated" away from "Smith," and the next moment he was felled to the ground by a terrific blow on the side of his head. He knew nothing more, he says, until he awakened from his swoon early the next morning, and staggered to his feet. He saw the bloody hammer afterwards found by the police, and which he believed to be the instrument with which he was struck. He never saw Rosenthal after he disappeared with "Smith" and left him, Dunkelmann, waiting at the bridge. He had \$60 on him that night. It was gone in the morning.

Tried to Board Car. Dunkelmann tells a little, very little, of his terrible journey from the scene of the murder to his home at Richmond and Simcoe streets. He says that he got as far as King street, where he attempted to get on a street car, but the conductor would not let him board it and he went away, he scarcely remembering how he reached his home. The story told by Dunkelmann clears away the few remaining open places in the bank of the case formed by the police. The mystery of why men should go to purchase wire with no way of moving it is cleared away by the statement that it was Silverman, the man whom Dunkelmann recognized at the hospital after his injury, who was to have carried the wire away, but who did not turn up. This dispels the greatest obstacle in the minds of some close to the case to the story already formulated.



## The World's Selections

As to make sure of a durable repair and the hole in the outer casing is for dirt and moisture to get in. It is of course considerable trouble to take such care of the tires, but their high costs warrants one doing it. Some users prefer to avoid the need of such trouble by using the protectors, called Woodworth's Treads. These are made of leather, studded with steel rivets, held on the tire by coil spring-rings on each edge. The steel studded leather is proof against injury from flag-nails, broken stone, scrap iron and so forth, which cut and injure the rubber tires, so that the rubber under them is kept absolutely intact and the user is also safe from punctures. The steel studs are excellent to prevent skidding on muddy, wet and slushy streets, and the cost of the device is so low that, considering the long life of the tire when protected from wear in this way, they are very economical.

## How to Reduce Automobile Tire Troubles.

The man who buys an automobile is not long in finding out that his tires are the chief source of trouble and expense. The old car owner is wiser from experience and has discovered that a little care and thought given to his tires will save him money. Some car owners make it a practice to examine their tires carefully at least once a week, and if there are any cuts or injuries in the rubber, they immediately fill them up with rubber cement or dough, so as to prevent moisture and dirt from working in to rot the fabric. Whenever the tire is punctured, they have the tube vulcanized

PATRIOTISM REWARDED AND VINDICATED

"When There's Not Honest Men come to Their Dues"—Old Proverb. When two presidents of the great United States—Roosevelt and Taft—fall out, Canadians come to know the chief reasons for Taft's reciprocity deal with the Laurier government.

Mr. Taft is a big man, and he designed a big program. We know now why he discarded Roosevelt's "policies"—and incurred therefor the antagonism of Theodore. He saw a road to greater glory: in fact, of being handed down to fame and future generations as the man who had enlarged the United States so as to cover the whole of the North American continent. It was on this policy, magnificently conceived, that he hoped to be re-elected. It may yet serve him if he seizes Mexico.

And he proposed to do it by the gradual annexation of Canada, by way of reciprocity, and by a military seizure and occupation of Mexico. The first failed; the second is now under way. The Mexican program has not yet been definitely acknowledged by Mr. Taft, but the annexation-of-Canada project has been unfolded in the most surprising way in the publication by Mr. Taft of the Taft-Roosevelt correspondence. These remarkable and illuminating letters were given out by Mr. Taft at Boston in a speech on Thursday night. Never was correspondence so significant to Canada ever made public.

Taft wanted to destroy Canada's fiscal independence, to draw her business to Chicago and New York, to make western Canada an adjunct of the United States.

Read the letters over again and see what we escaped as a nation in the fight of last year in parliament, and later on in the general election, which culminated in the glorious and substantial defeat of reciprocity.

Where is Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Globe in view of these startling revelations? Are they still for reciprocity at the price set out in Taft's letter to Roosevelt—the destruction of Canadian nationality—and Roosevelt's letter to Taft—the political reason?

And who are "our Canadian friends" mentioned by Taft, with whom the agreement was to be reached?

Undoubtedly Sir Wilfrid and Dr. Macdonald of the Globe?

Did these two Canadians know at that

time why Taft wanted reciprocity, and why Roosevelt favored it?

Reciprocity is not over yet. The Globe is still preaching it. It was because the member of South York said that the people of Canada did not want reciprocity, but that we could freely give the people of western Canada better freight rates than that paper set out to make "a fakir" of W. F. Maclean!

Mr. Maclean and The World have won out on Reciprocity. So they will on Better Freight Rates for the West. The Globe has ruined a party and had nearly destroyed Canada as a nation. We believe it will continue its unpatriotic work.

If ever patriotic men had a reason for their votes, it is these patriotic Canadians—Conservatives and many Liberals—who voted against the reciprocity proposals of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and The Toronto Globe! All honor to them!

ROOSEVELT IN BAD LIGHT

That Mr. Roosevelt, when president of the United States, prevented any legal proceedings being taken against the International Harvester Trust and that he acted in consequence of threats against him by the great financial house of J. P. Morgan & Co., is evident from certain correspondence transmitted to the U. S. Senate by President Taft. This correspondence begins with a letter from Mr. Roosevelt to Mr. Bonaparte, then attorney-general; the latter had prepared and was about to file a suit for the dissolution of the Harvester Company as a trust. This fact was well known to every one and caused Mr. George W. Perkins, then and now head of the trust, to visit President Roosevelt at Oyster Bay. What Mr. Perkins had to say, and he presented no legal argument whatever, is summarized in the letter dated August 22, which concludes with this request, tantamount to an official command: "Please do not file the suit until I hear from you."

Now it will be remembered that Mr. Bonaparte had in his possession evidence which satisfied him that the International Harvester Company was a trust within the meaning of the Sherman Act and he was on the point of enforcing the law by proceedings in the court. Perhaps it was on this account that he was not asked for any legal

MACLEAN "THE FAKIR" AND RECIPROCITY

Remarkable Confirmation of His Diagnosis of the Reciprocity Deal in the Taft-Roosevelt Letters.

From the day the reciprocity proposal was presented in the Canadian parliament, up to the day it was rejected, the main reason why President Taft had it ratified by the U. S. Senate was the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Dr. Macdonald confirmed his attitude. Let us reprint a sentence or two from the Taft and Roosevelt letters.

Confidential letter from President Taft to Ex-President Roosevelt, dated ten days before the latter signed the reciprocity proposal. "Reciprocity" might at first have a tendency to reduce the cost of food products somewhat. Meantime the amount of Canadian products we would be importing would be increased. ONLY AN ADJUNCT OF THE UNITED STATES. It would transfer all their important business to CHICAGO AND NEW YORK. WE WOULD TAKE THEIR BANK CREDITS AND EVERYTHING ELSE, and it would increase greatly the demand for Canadian produce. I see this is an argument against reciprocity made in Canada, and I think it is a GOOD ONE."

"It [reciprocity] will be unpopular in New York because of the wheat. Of course it will be unpopular in Minnesota because of the wheat. TAKE THEM AGRICULTURE AND MAKING IT SUFFER FIRST."

"IT SEEMS TO ME THAT IF YOU PROPOSE TO DO WITH BELIEVE IN FREE TRADE WITH CANADA FOR BOTH ECONOMIC AND POLITICAL REASONS."

Mr. Maclean and The World diagnosed early in the controversy that some extracts that in these days, when The Globe is doing its best to discredit Mr. Maclean, might be of use to him. Here are some of the reasons why The Globe is so vindictive. W. F. Maclean in house of commons, Feb. 22, 1911, on Mr. Monk's States, as there is here, that if our tariffs are a feeling in the United States, and if they are to be made for us in Washington, as in this case, then, on the face of it, the tendency of such a proposal is toward the destruction of the people of the United States, and our gradual absorption into the United States. Hansard, 10,023: "The design of the United States is to absorb Canada by a partial and then a complete system of commercial union, if they can get the people of Canada to go into it."

Hansard, 10,024: "I hope that this question will be considered in its effect upon our national institutions. If the Americans can succeed in controlling our tariff they will wipe out our British institutions. As country and other states of the empire. What are dollars compared with our institutions?"

Hansard, 10,024: "Reciprocity is supported in the United States because the leaders and the trusts there wish to divert the attention of the people from the problems with which they are faced. Another thing is to make their country greater and give it the right to intervene in the affairs of Canada."

W. F. Maclean at Waterloo, Sept. 6, 1911: "Now our American friends have become wise to this new, and what promises to be a greater stream of money between eastern and western Canada, flowing from the western provinces to the Canadian towns and cities in the east, and having once established the benefit of such a trade, they are most anxious to divert their own American cities to the east to that stream of money passing north. THEY WOULD LIKE TO SEE DIVERTED TO CHICAGO, ST. PAUL, NEW YORK AND OTHER BIG CITIES."

"IN OTHER WORDS THE CHIEF AND THE MAIN REASON FOR RECIPROCITY TODAY IS THE KEN DIXON OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE TO DISRUPT CANADIAN LINES OF TRADE AND TO DIRECT THEM INTO THEIR OWN CHANNELS."

"THEY WISH TO MAKE CANADA SUBSIDIARY TO THEMSELVES IN ALL RESPECTS IN THE MATTER OF TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT."

W. F. Maclean at Avon, Aug. 12: "Reciprocity is nothing more than commercial union in disguise. All the press and magazines of the United States, President Taft and Champ Clark, were all thinking and saying that if reciprocity became a fact Canada would be absorbed into the United States."

opinion or advice. On the contrary, the reasons for Mr. Roosevelt's permanent injunction against disturbing the trust are to be found in a letter addressed to him by Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations. It is doubtful if any similar letter was ever sent by a subordinate official to the head of a government and it is hard to resist the conviction that the letter was framed to meet the views and to sustain a course of action already determined on by the president.

Mr. Smith coolly informs the chief executive that the anti-trust law is a foolish one which should not be enforced. "I believe," he says, "that industrial combination is an economic necessity; that the Sherman law, as interpreted by the supreme court, is an economic absurdity and is impossible of general enforcement, and even if partially enforced will in most cases work only evil."

Mr. Smith in his letter repeats all the arguments against bringing the suit addressed to him by Mr. Perkins, including one which should have fired the blood of Theodore Roosevelt, and certainly should have been resented by the president of the United States.

In my interview of August 24 with Mr. Perkins, he set forth a number of considerations which seem to me of great weight. He said that his company had endeavored to obey the law in every respect and had carefully put itself in line with the policy of the anti-trust law, but also the interests he represented, including not only the International Harvester Company, but also the reaching Morgan interests, which had originally favored the creation of the bureau of corporations and which that bureau represents, and that, both in their attitude toward the bureau and in their conduct and management of the various concerns, including the United States Steel Corporation, they had adopted a similar policy of frankness and publicity; that, so far as he was aware, they had not been guilty of any violation of the law, certainly none involving a moral consideration; that, as he phrased it, the law now being laid out in New York by the Standard Oil people, who were saying that he tried to be good and keep solid with the administration, but that now he was going to get the same dose with other people who had not followed such policy.

He concluded, with great emphasis, with the remark that if after his endeavors of this company, and the other Morgan interests to uphold the policy of the administration and to adopt their method of modern publicity, this company was now to be attacked on a purely technical case, the interests he represented were going to fight.

This threat was not presented, the suit for dissolution was not commenced, the Morgan interests did not fight; Mr. George W. Perkins is today one of Mr. Roosevelt's chief supporters. The result of this correspondence upon Mr. Roosevelt's candidacy cannot be too unfavorable.

But the important consideration is the tremendous power lodged in the hands of one firm like J. P. Morgan and Company. It is a power so vast, so far-reaching and so insidious, as to threaten the very existence of the government. The men who possess it are apt to hold themselves above the law and to ride roughshod over all attempts to compel their obedience to the will of the people.

A TITANIC CLAIM

Another incident in connection with the loss of the Titanic which will bring some degree of comfort to the afflicted widow and bring home to many the wisdom of providing against the uncertainty is the fact that Mrs. Frank H. Mayberry of Moose Jaw, Sask., was totally unaware of her husband's death until taken out a \$10,000 policy prior to their going to England, and in her favor. **C. M. HAYS' BODY IS RECOVERED**

Remains of Col. Astor, Isador Straus and Others Identified Also—Mourners Pour Into Halifax. HALIFAX, N.S., April 26.—(Can. Press.)—Halifax is waiting in funeral garb for the arrival of the cable ship Mackay-Bennett with the cargo of dead bodies from the scene of the Titanic disaster. Hotels are crowded with the bereaved, and every train brings additional relatives of the victims. When the floating morgue will reach here was uncertain to-night. Altho 205 bodies had been picked up and 91 identified, according to latest reports, not more than 20 relatives and friends of those who perished are in town to-night. More are expected tomorrow. The cable ship's arrival is indefinite but will probably reach port to-morrow.

Among the bodies identified are those of C. M. Hays, Col. J. J. Astor, Isador Straus, George J. Easton, a buyer for the T. Eaton Co., H. J. Allison, Montreal. R. A. Fortune of Montreal will claim the body of Mark Fortune and Charles Fortune, and Senator McKean, a member of the Dominion senate, will take charge of the body of Hugo Ross, a prominent Winnipeg realtor. No inquiries concerning the body of William T. Stead, the eminent English journalist, had been received here to-night. It is expected that he will be held pending instructions from England. J. W. Ragedale, United States consul here, is prepared to take charge of the body of Major Archie Butt.

Will Prepare Bodies. Notwithstanding that many of the bodies have been embalmed at sea, it is believed that most of them upon arrival will be taken hurriedly to an undertaking establishment, where they will be prepared for inspection before relatives to assist those seeking bodies not only in the work of identification, but in their departure from the city. A wireless message from the Mackay-Bennett picked up here to-night, said she had left the scene of the disaster and was steaming toward Halifax. This should bring her here some time Sunday, but the White Star officials predict her arrival on Monday at the earliest.

**TRIED TO CLIMB INTO TITANIC LIFEBOAT**

Belgian Survivor Was Forced Away by a Sailor Who Pointed a Revolver at His Head, But Finally Was Pulled Into Boat and Protected by Women.

Herded with others by officers in the stern of the sinking Titanic to which the water reached his knees, and then swimming off and keeping going for an hour until he heard singing on the water, is part of the experience of Jules Sap, a Belgian survivor, who reached Toronto last night. But probably the most thrilling part of his experience was when he discovered the singing came from a crowded lifeboat to which he swam and tried to climb into, only to have a sailor stick a revolver in his face.

"I just thought I was going to die and so I tried to get into that boat anyway," was his view as he related his story to The World last night. Eventually one of the women pushed the sailor aside and pulled the all but dead boy into the boat. The other women hid him in the bottom of the boat from the enraged sailors, who wanted to throw him out again. Along with two others who swam away from the plunging ship and were picked up after going thru soul-wracking hardships, Jules is in the city under the care of Julius Somerville of Detroit, and Tom Henry of the Gayety Theatre. His companions and himself have their inspection cards which identify them and give the numbers of their berth, which were in that part of the boat that was first flooded. 
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



### WIDE ADVANCE IN NEW YORK

Sharp Spurt in Reading Was Feature of Active Session—Comprehensive Movement Under Way.

NEW YORK, April 26.—Dealings in the stock market to-day were attended by greater strength, breadth and activity. Unlike yesterday's session, when a very considerable part of the trading was made up of specialties and securities of secondary importance, to-day's business embraced a vast majority of the speculative favorites and other stocks of recognized merit. Reading was again the spectacular feature, rising to 17 1/2, which, with its recent quarterly dividend, brought the stock up to 117 5/8, or 5 3/8 points above its previous record price, achieved in 1910. Sales for Reading for the day aggregated 27,000 shares, or about 25 per cent. of the whole.

The belief gains ground that the company, in the not too distant future, will avail itself of a long-deferred opportunity to confer some form of benefit upon its stockholders.

Harrison Road's Poor Showing.

Earnings of the Harrison lines for March, published after the early rise, were disappointing to those who expected an improved exhibit over the preceding month. Union Pacific net \$180,000 in net, and Southern Pacific \$100,000. This makes the former's net gain less for the nine months of the fiscal year \$3,160,000 and Southern Pacific's \$2,740,000.

The copper and affiliated issues look prominent part in the day's operations.

### WHY WALL ST. ENVIES US

The statement of earnings of the Harrison railroads for the month of March, issued last night, added another pang to the jealousies of Wall Street over the C.P.R. Large decreases in both net and gross were shown by Union and Southern Pacific, which, when viewed in conjunction with the enormous increase in the receipts of Canadian Pacific, were enough to justify all kinds of envy. 
