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

All Deliveries Declined at Chicago. But Late Options Rose at Liverpool-Paris Wheat Lower-Flour Off at Chicago-Ontario Trade Dull-Corn and Provisions Lower Fruit and Vegetables-

Thursday Evening, June 16.

Wheat accomplished a further small raily on the Unicago board at the opening this morning and a few transactions were made at a cent above Wednesday's close. The strong feeling of yesterday was, however, absent and the increasingly favorable crop and harvest reports caused nearly everyone to take the bear side. The fact that next Monday's statistics are considered sure to show another big decrease in the American visible supply does not seem to be a factor in making prices. At the close the June delivery showed a loss of 2c per bushel for the day, July a loss of 4c, september 14c.

At Liverpool to-day wheat opened strong, but later spot declined 2d to 4d per cental and the July delivery went off 14d. At the same time, however, the September option sold 3cd higher than at yesterday's close, and the December futures 4d higher. In Paris wheat closed unchanged to 40 centimes lower than yesterday.

There is, practically nothing doing in wheat as Toronto and prices are unchanged from yesterday.

Corn, oats and provisions were all weak on the Chicago board.

Lumber Trade.

The Canada Lumberman thinks that the good crop and good prices for wheat will lead farmers to undertake building, and that this will mean an increased home consumption of lumber. That journal, referring to the transatlantic trade, says: The latest reports from the British market state that white pine deals are being meglected, and very few contracts are being mede. There is a good demand for spruce and as a result stocks are becoming reduced, but the supply of nearly all Canadian woods is heavier than usual. At London there are 2576 standards of pine deals and 6998 standards of spruce more than were carried at same time last year, in the face of which buyers are not disposed to contract. The stock at Liverpool is not so heavy, although quite large consignments have just arrived. A feature of the timber trade is the improvement in birch, which is in better demand and commands a higher price. The market is bare of red pine, and fresh arrivals will meet with ready sale. It is said that some heavy contracts of Canadian red pine deals have, been closed, and that the present large consumption bids fair to become still further extended in the near future.
