# Woman's World.

A properly made "Morris Chair" spoils one for any other sort of a chair.

## LARGEST VESSEL EVER BUILT

White Star Liner Oceanic Has Arrived at New York on Her Fifth Voyage.

OVER 2000 PEOPLE ON BOARD.

Registers 17,000 Tons, Engines 45,000 Horse-Power, Consumes 500 Tons of Coal Daily.

New York, Sept. 13.—The great steamer Oceanic of the White Star Line was sighted east of Fire Island at 8 o'clock this morning. She left Queenstown at 12:45 p.m. last Thursday, and estimating she will reach the lights at 10 o'clock, the time of her passage will be about 6 days 2 hours. It is probable that owing to her great draught she will not attempt to cross the bar at high water, which is at half-past 1 this afternoon, at Sandy Hook, so her appearance in the upper bay can hardly be expected before 2 o'clock.

Good Time Made. The time made by the Oceanic has been reported on the Atlantic coast, and compared favorably with that of the swiftest of the Great Eastern's great steamers. As compared with ocean steamers on the Queenstown route, the Oceanic is a half-dozen hours ahead of her. The best of the latter is the Campania, which makes the passage in 5 days 16 hours and 31 minutes. Next following are the Campania, Umbria, Majestic and Erin.

Largest Vessel Ever Built. The Oceanic is the largest vessel ever built. Her dimensions are 724 feet long, 72 feet beam and 68 feet depth, with draught light of 22 feet and loaded 22½ feet. She registers 17,000 tons, her engines were designed to develop 45,000 horse-power. Her coal capacity is about 6000 tons. She consumes about 500 tons of coal daily. The ship has two funnels, each of 20 feet diameter, and 80 feet above the great. Her passenger accommodation is for 625 cabin and 1000 steerage, and she carries a crew of 450 men. It was carried with her from Queenstown on the present trip that she had on board 2044 souls. So much larger is she than the other White Star steamers that the line built a new dock on the North River to accommodate her. The Oceanic displacement is 30,000 tons.

Compared With Great Easterns. Compared with the Great Eastern, the greatest ship ever built before her, she is 24 feet longer, and with a horse-power over 37,000 greater. The Great Eastern was built on the Thames in 1850, measured 680 feet long, 83 feet beam and draught of 30 feet. She registered 19,000 tons, and her engines developed 7650 horse-power. The North German Lloyd flyer, Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse, the next largest, is 612 feet long, 82 feet beam, and draught of 26 feet. She registers 14,000 tons, and has 30,000 horse-power.

No Attempt at Records. No day's run of knots. The steamer is said to have made no attempt at records, or even great speed. The voyage was pleasant and uneventful. The engines were run through without a hitch, neither stopping nor slowing down. The crew and her builder, the Rt. Hon. W. J. Pirie, who was on board, said that the steamer had come up to his expectations in every particular. The Oceanic is a grand work of marine architecture. There is practically no vibration. It is due to her quadruple vertical balanced engines, which are most powerfully built, and is without question

A SKIN GRAFTING SUCCESS.

Charles Beamish, a Carpenter, Terribly Burned by Nitric Acid, Undergoes Treatment.

HIS OWN CUTICLE WAS MADE USE OF

First Case in History of St. Michael's Hospital Where so Much Was Grafted.

A remarkable skin grafting operation was performed in St. Michael's Hospital a few weeks ago, and the patient is now on a fair road to recovery, although he will be laid up for a month yet.

It will be remembered that Charles Beamish, a carpenter, was terribly burned by nitric acid on July 14. He was carrying the liquid in a large bottle in his coat pocket and was accompanying a vendor of small novelties. He fell on the street, breaking the bottle, the contents running over his left arm and leg.

On Aug. 23 he underwent an operation, which was performed by Dr. Finmore, assisted by Dr. McNally, the house surgeon. Nearly all of the history of Beamish's leg from the knee to the hip was cut off and placed over the raw flesh on his left leg and arm.

His right leg was very painful, but new skin grew on and it also is all right again. The operation has been a great success, and the patient is now on a fair road to recovery.

Mr. Beamish, who is now in the hospital, is a native of Ontario.

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A CYCLONE SWEEPED BERMUDA

Some Houses Were Blown Down, Others Were Unroofed and Damage Was Great.

FIRST A HEAVY FALL OF RAIN,

Then the Wind Blew Furiously—Shipping and the Dock Yard Suffered Severely.

Island of Bermuda, Sept. 13.—A cyclone swept over this island last night. Houses were blown down and others were unroofed.

The storm began with heavy rain, after which there was a slight lull for a few hours, with the wind s.e., and the barometer steadily falling.

The wind then began to blow with force, and was at its worst from 1 a.m. to 1.45 this morning. The wind blew down houses and unroofed others.

Several of the houses were blown down, and the dock yard was severely damaged. The dockyard is damaged \$100,000.

The storm was the worst known here since the hurricane of 1880. In fact, many of the inhabitants say it exceeded the gale of that year.
