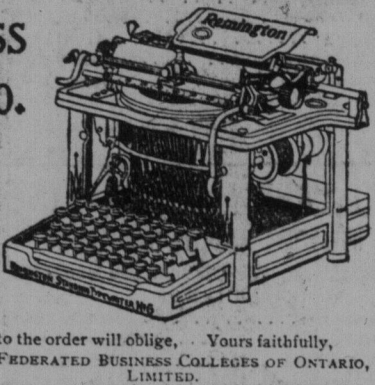

Chicago, March 18.—The London correspondent of The Record-Herald says: Cecil Rhodes' influence for good was paralyzed by that monumental blunder, the Jameson raid. "The Napoleon of the Cape," as his admirers called him during the first half of the last decade, met his Waterloo when the raiders were captured. A man who had brought himself to believe that Dr. Jameson and a thousand men could revolutionize the Transvaal a man who later spoke of that "greatest of unpriced bubbles, the Boer monetary power," never figured in history as a far-seeing statesman.

His achievements during the years since the raid will not be regarded by posterity as important for good or evil; and the political effects of his policy, which were long ago discounted in Rhodes' career that of gold is unquenchable. He never believed the Boers to be a nation, but rather that his friends in London, they would rather be bought up. He looked upon the burghers as men who regarded money as he did himself. He made Chamberlain and the whole party of militant Britons take the same view.

The Salisbury government listened to his argument—the logic of the London counting-house, and not of the hills and veldt of South Africa.
