FACE THE LOSS OF RUINER

Russians Fear the Maladies of Czar and Throne Heir Will End Fatally THEN VLADIMIR WOULD REIGN

Nicholas Becomes Melancholy and Declines to Take Exercise or Air.

London, Nov. 18.—Russian statesmen find themselves confronted with new difficulties. A pressing problem is raised by the succession of disasters to the imperial household—disasters that promise, unless a miracle is wrought to transfer the imperial sceptre to the uncle of Nicholas, the Grand Duke Vladimir.

It is well known in the European foreign offices that the health of Nicholas is steadily deteriorating. His malady, described as fainting spells, indigestion, hardening of the arteries and epilepsy, has not been checked by the special regime laid upon him during the last few years.

Private advisers from St. Petersburg state of mind in the Russian ruler. Always superstitious, his present lent death are now supplemented by prolonged spells of distress induced apparently by causes which are not understood.

Until about six months ago the Czarina bore up splendidly. She was constantly in her husband's society, even attending ministerial councils when he presided.

All a clear-headed and noble-hearted wife could do she has done to dispel the shadows from the unhappy Czar. But her courage and hope seem exhausted.

Despatches from Livadia describe the Czarina as plunged into the deepest dejection and as sitting for hours without uttering a word.

Even the presence of guests will not always rouse her from pleasurable gloom. Her great grief is her failure to bear a son. She believes that were the Czar gratified in this desire, all other troubles would count for little.

As if these misfortunes were not burden enough for the imperial couple, another and one having high importance for the whole empire and for Europe and America, has been added to the distressing decline of the Czar.
