Brantford, Sept. 1.—(Special)—Considering the great heat the public ownership meeting to-night in Y.M.C.A. Hall was a decided success, and about 250 heard the address from W. F. Maclean, M.P.

Mr. Maclean desired to go right to the question in a plain way. He would try to find an underlying principle in favor of the policy. Briefly it was to try to increase the number of public utilities and public conveniences and to distribute them to the greatest number of people.

Kuropatkin Abandons Liaoyang Kuroki's Move Forcing Retreat

Russian Army Now on Right Bank of Taitse River, but Further Move North Stopped by Cutting of Railway Communication Between Liaoyang and Mukden.

Yesterday's news from the seat of war closed with the receipt of two despatches, giving information of a most significant character, and bearing on the domination of Manchuria at the close of the present campaign.

The first from St. Petersburg said that Gen. Kuropatkin had withdrawn his whole army to the right bank of the Taitse River so as to meet Gen. Kuroki's flanking movement.

Nothing to confirm this was received until several hours later, when a despatch from St. Petersburg, dated Sept. 2, said that "the news of the withdrawal of the Russian army to the right bank of the Taitse River," had caused intense excitement and disappointment.

The second despatch which may have a significant bearing on the campaign is that filed at Mukden at 3:27 p.m. Thursday, stating that the train service between Mukden and Liaoyang was interrupted, and it may mean the evacuation of railroad communication, which would deprive Gen. Kuropatkin of an opportunity to retreat to his more northern base at Mukden.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 2.—(1:26 a.m.)—The news of the occupation of Liaoyang and the withdrawal of the Russian army to the right bank of the Taitse River reached only a small section of the people of St. Petersburg at a late hour and caused intense excitement and disappointment.

FOR SPECIFIC PERFORMANCE WRIT SERVED ON COMPANY

New Rule re Red Tickets Put in Force, But Little Progress Made.

Hamilton, Sept. 1.—(Special.)—This afternoon City Solicitor Mackelcan served a writ on the Street Railway Company calling for a specific performance of its agreement with the city.

It was in March, 1892, that the agreement between the city and the company was made. The aldermen put up a fight for a three-cent fare good at all hours, but all the company would do was to agree to issue six tickets for 25 cents and to issue limited workmen's tickets at eight for 25 cents.

The feeling is so strong against the company that few sales were made either at the office or at the factories. In spite of the instructions of the company two conductors put W. Blaisdell, a wealthy contractor, off their cars because he wanted to ride on a limit ticket.

The agreement between the city and the company gives the city the right to fix the service that the company shall give.

Clause 14 says: "The company shall place and continue on its railway good cars with all the modern improvements for the convenience and safety of passengers, and shall require as the public convenience, may require under such direction as the city council may from time to time prescribe."

Clause 15 says: "It is hereby reserved to the said city council to make such further rules, regulations, orders and by-laws in relation to the operation, construction, repairs and operations of the said railway as from time to time may be deemed necessary to provide for the safety, welfare or accommodation of the public."

The aldermen are a unit for taking advantage of both these clauses. They say they will insist on a better service on the street cars running two to York-street, which is entitled to a 7-minute service. The rolling stock is far from being what the aldermen and the general public think it should be.

John Grace, Mike Cody and George Carmichael, three charmen, have been summoned on the charge of refusing to serve the first person wishing to hire their cabs, which is a violation of the cabmen's by-law.
