An annular Eelipse of the Sun, October 20th-conjanction in right ascension at 2 h .46 m . 42s. forenoon, apparent time-invisible in America-central and annular through parts of Guinea, Ethiopia, and Madagascar-at the Isle of France-in the Indian Ocean, and Western parts of New Holland; and visible throughout most of Africa, Arabia, the Indian Ocean, and Australia.

## Revised Constitution of Miss'y Society of the W. M. Church.

Article I.-This Institution shall be designated the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society in Canada.
II.-The object of this Society is to excite and combine, in a plan more systematic and efficient than has been heretofore accomplished, the exertions of the societies and congregations (and others whe are friends to the conversion of the heathen and the extension of the Gospel) in the support and enlargement of the Indian and Domestic Missions which are carried on under the sanetion and direetion of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada.
1II.-Every person subscribing and paying, annually, the sum of one pound

or upwards, and every benefactor presenting a donation of ten pounds and upwards, shall be deemed a member of this Society, and entitled, as such, to a General Annual Report.
IV.-All Methodist Missionary Societies which have already been formed, or which may be formed, for the several Districts in the Province into which the Methodist Connexion is divided, shall be entitled "Auxiliary Methodist Missionary Societies" for the Districts in which they have been, or may be, formed. All Methodist Missionary Societies already formed, or hereafter to be formed, in the particular circuits of any district, shal! be entitled "Branch Methodist Missionary Societies" for the circuit in which they are or shall be established. And Sabbath School and Juvenile Christmas offerings are also earnestly recommended, where exertions of that nature are likely to be advantageous.
V.-The Chairman of each D:strict shall be, ex-officio, Secretary and Treasurer of the Auxiliary Society of his District : and every Superintendent of a Circuit shall, by virtue of his office, be Secretary and Treasurer of the Branch Societies of the Circuit over which he presides.
VI.--The money raised in any Circuit for the Methodist Missions by Branch Societies, or other local associations, and all other moneys, in whatever way collected for the same object, stall be regularly paid once every half-year, or oftener, into the hands of the Treasurer of the Auxiliary Society for the District in which the said Circuit is situated, with the deduction only of such sums as may have been disbursed for the incidental and local expenses of the Branch Society. And the Treasurer of every District Society shall remit to the Treasurer of the General Society in Toronto, semi-annually, or oftener, all sums so received by him from the varions Circuits in his District, deducting only therefrom the necessary incidental expenses incurred by the Auxiliary Society.
VII.-The Secretaries of every Branch Soclety, or other local association, shall forward, annually, to the Secretary of the Auxiliary Society of their District, an alphabetical list of all the benefactors and subscribers during the preceding twelve montis, with an account of their respective contributions. And the Secretaries of every District Auxiliary Society shall also forward annually to the Secretary of the General Society in Toronto, a similar list of all the subscribers and benefactors in all the Circuits of their Districts, an abstrant of the accounts of the Auxiliary Society, showing its gross receipts, its local payments, and its remittance to the General Treasurer.
VIII.-All benefactors of ten pounds and upwards, and all subseribers of one pound and upwards, annually, to any of the Auxiliary or Branch Societies in connexion with this Institution, shall he deemed, in right of such benefaction or subscription, memhers of the General Society.
IX.-Ail persons who collect to the amount of three pounds and upwards, annually, for this Institution, or for any of the Auxiliaries, Branches, or Associations, shall also be members of the General Society, and entitled to receive a supply of each Annual Report.
X.-An annual public meeting of the memhers and friends of this Society, connected with such religious service as may be deemed expedient, shall be held at the place of the Session of the Conference, on the first Monday after the meeting of the Conference, at the hour of balf-past six o'clock, P.M. At this annual meeting the officers of the Society shall be appointed.
XI.-A General Committee shall be annually appointed by the Conference, to whom shall be intrusted (in the intervals of the annual assemblies of that body) the superintendence of the collection and dishursements of all moneys received for the Missions which are now, or may hereafter be carried on under its sanction, and by the Ministers in connexion with it. The Committee shall consist of the President and Secretary of the Conference for the time being, and of twelve other members-seven of whom, at least, shall be members of the Methodist. Church in or near Toronto. At any meeting of the Committee, seven shalt be a quorum for the transaction of business.
XII. - The Conference, at each of its annual meetings, shall appoint a Com mittee, consisting of the President and Secretapy of the Conference, the Chairmen of Districts, and five others, whose duty it shall be to audit all the accounts of contingent expenditures during the previous year, and recommend fas far as may be necessary) the appropriations for the support of the missions during the ensuing year.
XIII.-The Chairman of Districts shall have authority to draw upon the Treasurer quarterly for any sums, within the amount specified, which the Missionary Committee shall judge necessury for the support of the mission and mission schools under their care. The chairmen shall require regular quarterly communications to be made by each of the Missionaries on their respective Districts to the Corresponding Secretary of the Suciety, giving information of the state and prospects of the several missions in which they are employed.
XIV.-It shall be the duty of the General Missionary Committee to furnish the General Treasurer of this society with a schedule setting forth the number of missions and mission schools, the place of location, and the amount appropriated for their support respectively, and the sum total of appropriation for the current year.
XV.-This Constitution shall not be altered but by a general meeting of the Society, on the recommendation of the Conference and Committee.

4. Centenary Fund-Nearly $£ 10,000$ were subscribed in the Province for the formation of this Fund, payable in four years. The subscriptions of many, however, flow into the treasury so tardily, that not quite $£ 4000$ have as yet been received. The Centenary Fund is appropriated as follows: Five-tenths for the formation of a Permanent Superannuated Fund.
Two-tenths for assisting the General Book Concern.
Two-tenths for furnishing Parsonages.
One-tenth foz Missionary or other connexional purposes.
5. Chapel Relief Fund. - The necessity of such a Fund has long been felt in the Wesleyan Methodist Church ; and, at the last Conference, preparatory steps were taken in order to secure the establishment of so desirable a Fund. When the sanction of the Quarterly Meetings shall have been obtained, the Fund will at once go into operation. The following are the Resolutions adopted by the Conference :-
Resolved, 1st-That a Committee, to be called The Chapel Fund Committee, be appointed, consisting of five preachers and five laymen, who shall reside in or near the City of Toronto, to be nominated by the President and appointed by the Conference, who shall meet quarterly, and five of whom shall form a quorum. The President and Secretary of the Conference to be, ex-officio, members of this Committee, and the Book Steward the General Treasurer.
Resolved, 2ndly-That when a Circuit or Station proposes the building of enlargement of a Chapel, the Superintendent, before giving such proposal his sanction, shall submit to the Chapel Fund Committee a full and particulat statement of the necessity, the material and style, and the expense of such Chapel or enlargement, and of the subscriptions and other resources for meeting the expenditure.
Resolved, 3rdly-That no Chapel shall be built or enlarged without having obtained the previous consent of the Chapel Committee ; nor shall the Committee sanction any such proposal, unless the requirements of the Discipline have been obeyed.
Resolved, 4thly -That a fund shall be instituted in our connexion, to be called the Chapel Religf Fund, the supplies of which fund, it is recommended. shall be raised in the following ways:-1. By every travelling Minister paying. 5 s . or upwards annually, 2. By every Trustee of all the Chapels belonging to our connexion being requested to pay 5 s , or upwards annually. 3. By private subscriptions among our friends. 4. By public collections in all our Chapels and Congregations, to be taken up by the Preachers in the first and second weeks in Aug, of each year. 5. By legacies, which it may be hoped our more wealthy members and friends will feel it their duty to leave to this fund. 6. By anything that may be received from the "Clergy Land Fund," and which the Conference may think advisable to appropriate to this purpose.

Resolved, 5thly-That the moneys which are thus raised shall be appropriated from time to time by the Chapel Fund Committee for the relief of Chapels deeply in debt, and greatly needing assistance. And that the particular state of each Chapel requiring relief, as to debts, resources or income, expenditure, \&c., be laid before the Committee in writing.

Resolved, 6thly-That all the doings of the Committee shall be annually reported to the Conference, and subject to its revision.
Resolved, 7thly-That all the Superintendents, as soon as practicable after going to their Circuits, shall call the Trustees of the several Chapels on their Circuits together, and lay the plan of the Chapel Religef Fupd before them, and use every suitable means to obtain their concurrence therein; and that a general circular letter, stating its objects and necessity, be forthwith published in the Christian Guardian.
Resolyed, 8thly-That the Superintendents shall receive all moneys raised for this fund on their respective Circuits or Stations, and they are required to forward the same on or before first January in each year to the Treasurer.
