# \$200,000,000 In Silk Is Destroyed

## Wins 7-Year Fight To Teach Again

Lena M. Zipfel. Dismissed and Adjudged Insane, is Re-instated.

New York, Sept. 15—Miss Lena M. Zipfel, a teacher in Public School 85, who in June, 1916, was dismissed on charges of misconduct and was adjudged insane, has won her seven years' battle for vindication and reinstatement when at a meeting of the Board of Education her appointment to Public School 19, Manhattan, was approved. The appointment dates from today.

Gets \$16,661 Back Pay.

Miss Zipfel was a familiar figure at Albany, where year after year the Legislature acted adversely on her petitions for reinstatement. Finally, last July a bill was passed and signed by Governor Smith which authorized review of the case by the civil courts. The Board of Education was then instructed to pay her \$16,661.88, salary with interest since dismissal.

"Justice at last," said Miss Zipfel when informed of the board's action. "People laughed at me because I did not have enough money to retain a counsel and fought my own case. I have been working in a publishing house trying to make enought to live on. I was 'railroaded' to the Poughkeepsie State Hospital without a fair trial. Now, however, I am satisfied that my character has been restored and no question of my mental ability remains."



London, August 80.—Mr. Neville
Chamberlain is to be the new Chancellor of the Exchequer, and Sir William Joynson Hicks succeeds him at the Ministry of Health with Mr. Davidson, the Chancellor of the Duchy, giving such parliamentary assistance as may be necessary to the treasury. One of the many disturbing factors in the present industrial depression would seem to be the non-renewal of machinery. In pre-war days a big firm as a matter of sound policy would automatically set aside six to eight per cent. of its machinery costs for renewals and additions. Up to this amount out went old machines, no matter how serviceable, and in came the latest inventions. Then the reachinery was kept up to date and British manufacturers could face the most modern competitors.

A big industrialist assures me that this allocation has disappeared, and that British industry is now working almost wholly on old machines. Taxation being what it is, he says that there is simply no money available for the old machinery replacements and additions, and manufacturers are simply compelled to abandon the old sound policy although they recognise that it is equivalent to living on capital. A pertinent comment on this is contained in three half-yearly industrial company reports published yesterday. Not one of them declares a dividend. Ingenious American Manufacturers.

American manufacturers are expressing great surprise that their British rivals are not properly grateful at the recent proposals that the latter should "take over" the surplus reders which the Americans find themselves uncble to fill. In particular steel and Jocomotive manufacturers in the U. S. have accepted orders greatly in excess of their capacity to deliver, and they thought they would be conferring a favor on British manufacturers by offering to pass on the surplus. British manufacturers, however, fully realised that if they fell in with the arrangement they would be merely helping America to keep customers who ought to come to England for their goods, and they knew that these customers would ultimately have to come here. The American industrialist is now finding a new line, and is declaring that it is a "world necessity" that the British workmen should receive as ligh a wage and live as well as the American. This is hardly the warm-hearted philanthro Wireless in Crime.

Its value in this respect was proved at the last Derby, and the success achieved then has encouraged the organization of a permanent installation. Scotland Yard is never behindhand in calling in the aid of science. It already possesses or has at its command a laboratory equipment which a university would not despise. ## WHEN WAR OF 1812 CAME TO AN END

How the News was Received in Halifax and Boston.

The treaty of peace between England and the United States was concluded at Ghent on Dec. 24, 1914. The news did not reach American in time to save the British forces from disaster at New Orleans. "Occasional," in the Halifax Recorder, gives the following

Halifax Recorder, gives the following historical review:—
All was now peace at Ghent, and the plenipotentiaries were shaking friendly hands, but the war was still raging with great fury in America, and the enmity was becoming greatly intensified. Up the Mississippi the British fleet, with great bodies of troops had passed early in December, with a view to entering the southern country and destroying the chief cities. On the 5th of January, 1815, an attack was made on the Americans, about 12,000 in number, who were entrenched near New Orleans. The British were repulsed with terrible loss, and Sir Edward Packenham, the Commanding General, was killed. In the same issue of the Recorder in which is published full details of this serious repulse of the British forces—being the official communication of General Andrew Jackson, Major-General commanding the U. S., to the Secretary of War at Washington—the first inkling of the important fact that the terms of Peace had been agreed upon, was conveyed to what must then have been in Halifax a somewhat distracted community. These few lines appeared under the "Ship News" heading:

"Thursday, Feb. 23, arrived H. M. brig 'Charybdis,' Capt. Clephane, from New Orleans, last from New London The 'Charybdis' left the squadron off New London on the 18th inst. Intelligence of the treaty between Great Britain and the United States had just been received from the shore. It is said to have been signed at Ghent Dec. 24th.






