

Ossining, Oct. 23—A hammer and a chisel used by an employe of Sing Sing furnished what he terms "psychological heat" in the absence of steam in the prison and stopped complaints made by persons in the prison about the cold. Sing Sing is conserving fuel. During the daylight hours the heat has been shut off in the prison. A complaint was received from the office of David M Vail, Deputy Controller, who keeps the prison's funds and accounts, that it was too cold to work there. Prisoners also complained.



She Says She Will Spend the Rest of Her Life Seeking Her Husband's Slay-

Trenton, N. J., Oct. 23—A writ of error, acting as a stay, was taken out in Supreme Court here on behalf of Mrs. Ivy Giberson, convicted at Toms River of the murder of her husband and sentenced to life imprisonment. The appeal for a new trial acts as a stay, and Mrs. Giberson will remain in the custody of the sheriff of Ocean county until a decision is reached, which may take at least one year.

The writ was obtained by W. H. Jeffrey, attorney for Mrs. Giberson, who said he was prepared to take the case to the United States Supreme Court. Several constitutional rights were involved, he said.

The assignment of error detailing just which points upon which the case is appealed to the Supreme Court will be filed later. Arguments will be held at the November term of the Supreme Court. If the Supreme Court dismisses the appeal, the decision, under the present proceedings, may be reviewed by the Court of Errors and Appeals, the highest in the state.

Mrs. Giberson slept well in her cell after hearing the verdict.

"You can say that I am disappointed at the verdict, but I am not downcast," she said. "I have just begun to fight. I will spend the rest of my life in an attempt to find the murderers of my husband. In the event that I am finally compelled to go to prison, my attorneys and detectives will still be busy in my behalf, and eventually the guilty person will be brought before the bar of justice."

FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

Lesson No. 136. POINTS TO REMEMBER.

Remember that there is no advantage in using a plate voltage in excess of that for which the tube is rated. If the tube is highly evacuated and has a tungsten filament an excessive plate voltage may not injure the tube, but if used as a detector the results will not be as satisfactory.

A pale blue glow in a tube denotes iorization of the gas contained in the tube. In this condition the tube will not operate properly as a detector. The remedy is to reduce the plate voltage until the tube functions properly. Regeneration is produced by feeding back oscillating energy from the plate circuit to the grid circuit. Of the many arrangements of circuits to produce regeneration the two in general use are the "tuned plate" circuit and the circuit employing the "tickler coil."

In a regenerative circuit employing the "tickler" coil the relative polarity between this coil and the secondary coil must be correct in order for the radio-frequency plate current to increase the strength of the oscillations.

Oxide-coated filaments should not be worked above a dull red heat while tungsten filaments may be heated to a degree of incandescence which corresponds to the normal value of the filament current.

If a tree is used as a support for the antenna it is important that the wires be kept clear of the tree, for otherwise the tree absorbs the electric waves and conducts them to earth.

The use of alternating current to heat the filament of tubes employed in transmission increases the length of life of the filament about four times, owing to the fact that the filament partially cools between reversals of current. The cooler the filament is operated the longer it will last.

Carbon bisulphide is excellent for cleaning the surface of crystals. It should be put on a surface cloth and rubbed over the surface of the crystal.

Indisputable testimony to the invaluable work of the Red Cross in war time and peace was given yesterday afternoon in the Imperial Theatre by men who know from experience what the society means in the life of the country and there is no doubt that those who listened to the tributes came tway better informed as to the part

played by the international society in the world's work. His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley was chairman of the meeting and the other speakers were:—Dr. H. I. Abramson, provincial pathologist; Rev. H. B. Clarke, pastor of the Portland street Methodist church; J. B. Dever and R. T. Hayes, M. P. P., president of the provincial Red

and humanitarian work, no society had so strong an appeal as the Red Cross Society which was now coming before the public with a campaign membership. Its noble deeds in war had thrilled the people, and that same spirit of self-sacrifice was leading it on in humanitarian work after the war. He could say from the bottom of his heart whatever was given to the Red Cross Society was given to the cause of humanity, and whatever was done to aid its work was done to the glory of God.

Dr. Abramson dealt with the origin of the society telling of its formation to care for those wounded in war. He related how, at the Geneva conference in 1907, it had been suggested that it function in peace as well as in war to help in the case of a mine disaster or some like occurence. It had not been until after the great war that the work had assumed the proportions which it now maintained. The Red Cross, he said, was non-political, its only action with reference to governments being to urge them to action in the interests of mankind. Another good work done by the society, he said, was to help to obliterate misunderstandings between nations which the society was in a good

Rev. H. B. Clarke, who saw service overseas, said the Red Cross Society had done more for the alleviation of suffering than all the other organizations operating in war time. He considered the work of the Red Cross stretcher bearer the most glorious of all war records. Now that the war was over the Red Cross had a great work to do in combatting the ravages of disease and educating the public as to preventive measures. He said the membership fees of the society were used to provide comforts for the soldiers in the Lancaster, East St. John and River Glade hospitals, helping the families of the returned men and maintaining the depot of the society in St. John. It was easy to understand why the society was deserving of loyal support. He hoped a membership of 5,000 would be rolled up in St. John.

R. T. Hayes, as president of the provincial branch, thanked those who had taken part in the programme and announced the remaining events in the week's campaign in St. John, the pageant to be given on Thursday night in the Imperial and the commencement of the membership canvas on Friday. F. A. Dykeman was to have charge of the canvas of the business section and Mrs. Frank S. White to have charge of the canvas of the residential section. Mr. Hayes gave special thanks to W. H. Golding, of the Imperial theatre, for his generosity in giving the use of the Imperial for the meeting and for the pageant.

Meanwhile the men entered the barn from one end, and as they emerged Mr. Craig noticed flames inside the building. Aid was summoned but the barn burned to the ground. Provincial police officers spent today in an endeavor to trace the two men, but without success. Mr. Craig was unable to give a clear description of them.







WHAT'S DOING IN THE MONEY AND STOCK MARKETS TODAY OPTIMISTIC IN

Labor and Capital Spokesmen Both Cheerful

Wages Trouble Out of the Way Until the End of 1923R—Reports from the Coal Mines — Operations in the Steel Works.

Sydney, N. S. Oct. 23—(Canadian Press)—Spokesman for both labor and capital in Cape Breton appear to agree that the industrial situation on the island which passed through a long period of unrest which reached a climax in the Nova Scotia coal strike of August has at last entered upon a period of quiet and prosperity.

The agreement precently signed between the British Empire Steel Corporation, controlling the mass production of the coal mines of the province, and the Nova Scotia district of the United Mine Workers of America, provides for continuous work under a mutually agreed wage scale until the end of 1923, the longest period of quiet which has seemed apparent in the Nova Scotia fields for many years.

True there have been murmurings from sections of the miners against the new agreement and some of them protested against the wage schedules falling below those of 1921. This was accentuated when 1921 rates were granted to the United States and Alight agreed wage rate under moral compulsion of the summers. It was argued by dissenters from the agreement that the Nova Scotia miners submitted to the 1976 lower wage rate under moral compulsion and with armed troops in their sign and with armed troops in their 1814 presence. They alleged from this that the agreement could not accordingly be binding. The general impression hower come from a comparitively small, if loud spoken, group. A report credited to represent company opinion concerning the industrial situation in Cape Breton reads as follows:

"A feeling of much optimism is in evidence here because of performances now being obtained at the steel works. Never in the history of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company have these been bettered. Two of the blast furnaces are in operation producing iron with a smaller consumption of coke and limestone than any time in the past. An average production of more than 700 tons daily has been maintained by two blast furnaces over a period of weeks and all previous records for the furnaces in question-have been beaten by recently obtained tonnages. The performances of the open hearth furnaces since they were re-started recently have been equally remarkable, in furnaces each producing more than 100 tons daily with twelve hour heats. "Regarding the coal mines the outputs are uniformly good for the number of men employed. The pits have gickly recovered from the ill effects of the strike and the men are working steadily.

"It is reasuring to all concerned to have the troublesome wage question definitely out of the way for fifteen months. This agreement covers all the operations of 1928 and enables the management of the coal companies to plan a programme of sales and mine operation.

months, This agreement covers all the operations of 1928 and enables the management of the coal companies to plan a programme of sales and mine operation.

Prospects for work during the coming winter are reasonably good. The Dominion Coal Company has sold some coal for winter delivery in the United States and the management anticipates being able to stock at least as much coal during the winter against St. Lawrence deliveries as was done last winter.

"It is further expected that at least two blast furnaces will be in operation during the winter so that the outlet of coal will be greater than has been the case for some years past.

"While the condition of neither the steel nor coal trade could be regarded as thoroughly satisfactory, it is believed that the worst of the depression is past and there is reason for greater optinism than at any time since the depression which followed the war period set in."

Ottawa, Oct. 23—Weather conditions were favorable for fishing on the Atlantic coast during the month on the Pacific coast and larger catches of fish more landed.

The total of sea fish landed on both coasts during the month was 1,317,935 cwts, with a value, to the fishermen, of \$2,906,527, while during September, 1921, there were 1.026,553 cwts. landed, valued at \$2,520,047.

The Lunenburg banking fleet arrived during the month from the Grand Banks with a good catch. There were 57,789 cwts. of hake taken, compared with 19,998 cwts. in September, 1921.




