BRITISH SHIPS TO CARRY U. S. TROOPS

New York, Jan. 22—Nine British vessels with a total carrying capacity of 27,750 men have been placed at the disposal of the American government for the transportation of troops home. These vessels are the Caronia, Adriatic, Minnekahda, Celtic, Canopic, Saxonia, Pannonia, Cedric and Orca.

In addition, it is announced, the Olympic, Mauretania and Aquitania, three of the largest British troopships, will bring additional American troops home during February.

GOVERNMENT TO BUILD HALF MILLION HOUSES

London, Jan. 22—Regarding the government's building programme of 500,000 houses, Sir Eric Geddes declared that 160,000 had already been arranged for on financial terms agreeable both to the local authorities and the local government board, and it was hoped that the remaining 340,000 would come along very fast. It was anticipated that these houses would cause a great deal of comhouses would cause a great deal of competition in subsidiary trades, such as house furnishing and fitting, and Sir Eric hoped that they would be able to assist in the reconstruction of national industrial life.



(Editorial, The Business Review.) The proper rearing and training of hildren—our future citizens—is more children—our future citizens—is more than a matter of sentiment; it is an economic problem of the greatest importance in which business men should be interested. In many countries now child welfare is being studied as never before. The greatest task is to draw the line between what the state should do and what should be left to the home. One of the

what the state state should be left to the home. One of the duties fairly left to the state is the raising of the physical standard. In Great Britain, in the United States and Canada, the percentage of rejections, both under the voluntary enlistment system and in the draft calls was appalling—as high as seventy per cent in the United States, between forty and fifty per cent in Canada. And yet we call the Anglo-Saxon a vigorous race, domiciled for the most part in a hardy northern climate. In the recent election in Great Britain, Lloyd George spoke of this alarming physical deterioration, and offered policies to combat it as a part of his platform. The American Health Association, at its last convention, adopted strong resolutions after the presentation of the United States figures of rejections. In Canada the efforts for child welfare have been largely voluntary. Something have been largely voluntary. Something is being done by the holding of child welfare exhibitions, the adoption of "Baby Week," etc., but beyond the support of the worthy work of the Children's Aid Scaitt, no government feel. dren's Aid Society, no government, federal, provincial or civic, has formulated any comprehensive policy which is designed to improve the standard of the race. Armstrong, showed that branches have been formed in Fredericton with three life members, 812 regular, 292 associate and 571 junior; in Moncton with about 780 regular, 815 associate and 591 juniors; Woodstock, 64 regular, 186 associate and 235 juniors; Sackville, 109 regular and six associate; Sussex has about 100 adult members, and Chatham branch organized, but canvas for members is not yet completed. Total for province, 5,041 adult members and 1,627 juniors.

And the Emergency Home work is just one small part of the work for which the fund is needed. The Salvation Army must provide comforts for the boys over there awaiting transportation home. The Salvation Army Hostels from France to Vancouver must be ready at all times to receive and entertain returned men. The soldier must be helped back to civil life; he needs a job; perhaps he returns to find his wife sick, and a friendly hand needed in the home now and then. The Salvation Army visitors find ample opportunities for service, and they are instrumental in holding many a home together.

The soldier's child has the right to be well born, and there will be many an ex-soldier heartily glad that his wife can benefit by the attention of doctors and trained nurses at the Salvation Army Maternity Home.

Many of the boys will return to happy homes, homes well provided for. Difficult as it may be for even these men to accustom themselves to the old ways of living, their problem is simplicity itself compared with that of the soldiers and their families that the Salvation Army will be called upon to help.

And this help MUST be forthcoming. Our returned men must not be left to drift. 
