The committee took the ground that it was useless to dredge the main channel into the har-bor unless the breakwater were extended to the Island, for otherwise the silt dumped from the scows off Mahogany Island would be washed into the channel again. A small grant was made by the government for this breakwater, but apparently it will all be used for repairs to the existing breakwater, and nothing will be done toward its extension. It was also urged that a breakwater be constructed from Partridge Island eastward to the Island buoy. Such a breakwater is very greatly needed to pro-tect the channel. The dishonest cashie can either fritter his money away at roulete, or pay \$10 and plunge at the bacarat tables upstairs. The impassive croupier, like the bloated British book-maker, cannot be expected to know the numbers of stolen notes. Although it is well known that a thief who has made a successful haul takes the first train to Enghien, it is a significant fact that no arrest has ever been made in the neighborhood of the casino. On the other hand, every train crossing the frontier is carefully watched. In France, they believe in keeping money in the country. How many ruined homes, bankruptcies and suicides the gambling hell at Enghien is responsible for it is impossible to calculate, but hardly a day passes without the papers mentioning it in connection with some unfortunate creature's downfall. Scandal of Great Proportions. The scandal reached such gigantic pro-portions last week that a public-spirited Parisian deputy, George Berry, succed-ed, after many years of effort, in forcing a parliamentary debate on the govern-ment with a view to suppressing the casino. In the course of the debate he produced a report made by a police com-missioner on April 4 last. This report states that the croupiers employed at Enghien are mostly "men with a bad record," and that frequent complaints are made of "irregularities" at the gaming-tables. He further offered to produce a list containing the names of forty deputies who are in receipt of monthy subsidies from the Casino Com-pany. Mr. Berry was not allowed to produce

Mr. Berry was not allowed to produce this document, which would have created a storm violent enough to sweep away the present government. It looked at one time, as if another "Panama" scandal would shake the French parlia-ment to its foundations, but Berry, like Clemenceau, was persuaded to keep the list of compromised deputies in his pocket. After a heated debate, lasting all day, the chamber voted the suppres-sion of the Enghien casino by a large majority. majority.

As the original eighteen years, concession will expire next December, it looked as if the "health resort' days were num-bered, but the minority who voted against the suppression looked so cheer-ful that a deputy of an enquiring turn of minil happened to ask the finance minister if the concession had been re-cently renewed. He was informed that "a few days previous to this debate a further concession of eighteen years was granted to the Englinen casino." As a sop to public opinion a parlia-mentary commission has been nominated to inquire into the charges brought against the casino by George Berry, but by the time they have finished their labors some new scandal is likely to monopolise the attention of the press and the public.

### EUROPE'S TARIFFS

High Protectionist Wave Reported Subsiding

#### A GRADUAL PROCESS

New Revolt Powerful Because Moderate and Opportune-Disgruntled Protectionists Themselves Are Joining in It

#### (Times' Special Correspondence)

Vienna, July 12-Europe's high proectionist wave is subsiding. This conclusion seems hasty at a time when imclusion seems hasty at a time when im-port duties are higher than they ever were, and when Europe's whole conti-nent is bound with export bounties, state-limited production, "import certifi-cates," differential railroad freights, and other devices. None the less, here, as in America, a demand for lower tariffs is making itself felt. The collapse in Eng-gland, after ten years' vain work, of Joseph Chamberlain's new protectionism is not an accident, but is unquestion-ably a reflection of the continental trend towards freer trade. Mr. Chamberlain's initiative came at a most inauspicious time, for it began to tempt England with the delights of continental protec-tion at the very moment when the pro-tected continental nations were them-selves beginning, to doubt the merits of the system. The new revolt against high protec-tion is all the more potent because it is a moderate, opportunist revolt, sharply distinguished from the free trade enthu-siasms of Yves Guyot in France and of the late Dr. Barth in Germany. It is seen that protection has created vast vested interests. It is admitted that it is impossible to abolish in a day the tariff conditions amid which these vest-ed interests have grown because any ed interests have grown because any such drastic action would disorganize business. The new movement demands a gradual and cautious reduction of tar-iffs, with entire abolition only where the industry concerned could certainly bear abolition. 

The number of free traders on principle is small compared with the number of disgruntled protectionists, who condemn high protection because it will not work out precisely in the way they want it to. The argument of each class of producers is that while protectionism is good and desirable, **H** is being applied in a way to benefit others and to injure them. This is the case in Germany and Austria as well as in Russia. High protection in Austria and Rus-


in Russia. High protection in Austria and Rus-sia is undoubtedly in a worse plight than it is in Germany. Austria is suf-fering from a severe crisis, and in Rus-sia, where economic conditions are chronically bad, the anti-protectionist trend is increased by a clamorous agi tation against the trusts which has just led Minister of Trade Timasheff to frame a law putting all Russian trusts Trane a law putting all Russian trusts drastically under government tutelage. In Germany protection is most assail-ed by the producer, by far the weakest political class. Also in Germany the outcry against the trusts is directed ex-clusively against the raw material kartells; and the aggrieved are a minority of manufacturers. But there is another reason why Ger-

man protection is relatively vigorous. It wears a certain ideological armor which guards it against the accusation of be-ing mere class legislation and economic "Continued on page 11, sixth column)





