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NOTICE

To Owners and Masters of **British Ships**

The attention of Owners and Masters of British. Ships is called to the 74th Section of the "Morchant Shipping Act, 1894." 75.-(1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the

(a) on a signal made to her by one of His Majesty's ships. including any vessel under the command of an officer of H: Majesty's navy or full pay, and

(b) on entering or leaving any foreign port and

(c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering of leaving any British Port.

(2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel hoists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon.

All bills, duly certified, payable by the above Departments (b.c.d.) should be rendered not later than the mornings of the day preceding pay day.

- (2) All cheques, drafts and other documents, representing money, in payment of Fees or Dues of any kind whatsoever to any Government Department must be made out in the name of the Department and not in that of any individual official thereof.
- (3) The several Public Departments and their subsidary offices in the Outports have been directed to refuse to accept, in payment of amounts due the Government, any cheques which are not properly endorsed and stamp-ed and which have not been certified by the Bank on which they are drawn, or the paying Bank in the case of cheques drawn outside of Newfoundland.

(4) In view of the lack of general compliance with the law in respect of stamping receipts as provided for by the Stamp Act (Consolid-ated Statutes 3rd Series, Cap.28), the atten-tion of the Public is drawn to the following provisions thereof, viz:

"Receipts for any sum of money exceed-"ing ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be stamp-"ed with adhesive or impressed stamp of "the value of two cents.

"An instrument shall not be duly stamp-"ed unless the stamp affixed thereto is "cancelled."

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
