

(a) on a signal made to her by one of Mis Majesty's ships including any vessel under the command of an officer of H= Majesty's navy or full pay, and

(b) on entering or leaving any foreign pert and


(c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering of leaving any British Port.

(2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be flatte te a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; H a vessel hoists no colours and runs away, it is hable to be fired upon.
