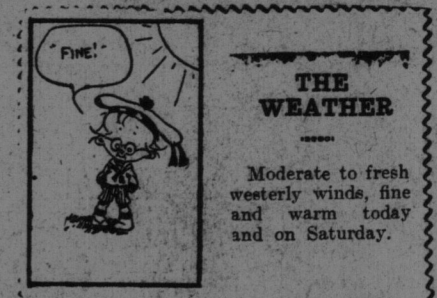

hove down again and took them off. Then they were in no great hurry to go, except the director, who was awaiting news from the region of the Dry Lake.

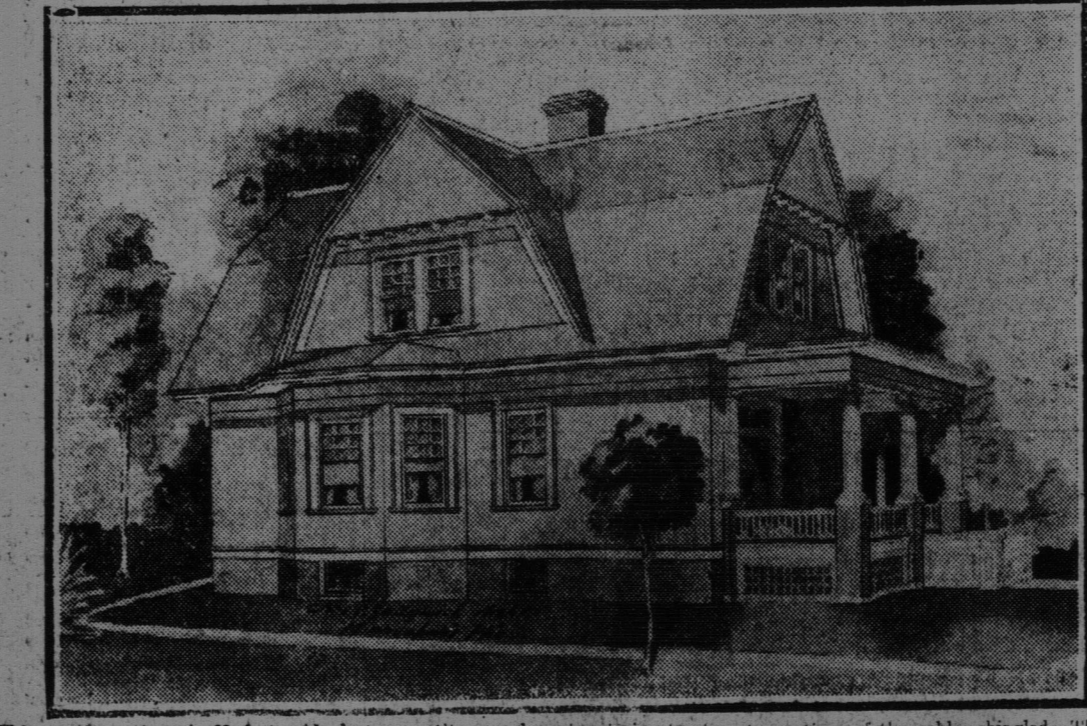

AT MILLIDGEVILLE The eye of man could see no fairer scene to gaze upon than that which was spread before those who sat upon the verandah of the R. K. Y. Club house at Millidgeville yesterday afternoon and evening. Not even in the lake country of Scotland, said a Scot who had seen both, can one behold a more charming picture than is presented at Millidgeville, as one looks out over the haven of the yachts to the islands and river, and the irregular contour of the wooded hills beyond.

B. C. MINERALS The report of the British Columbia department of mines for 1908 has been issued. Reviewing it the Colonist says: "From the tables it appears that the value of the mineral output was \$23,351,277 during 1908. This is a little more than two millions less than the value of the output of 1907, and a little more than one million less than the value of that of 1906. The decrease is chiefly owing to the low price of copper. Thus in 1906, 42,989,488 pounds of copper were worth \$8,583,565; in 1907, 49,822,720 pounds were worth \$5,105,544; while in 1908, 47,274,814 pounds were only worth \$8,240,549. If the price of copper in 1907 had been sustained in 1908 the value of the output of this mineral would have been more than \$3,000,000 greater than the returns show, and this would have put the mineral yield of the year at \$27,000,000, which would have been much the largest on record. Coal shows a decrease in both tonnage and value, but the combined value of coke and coal shows only a little fluctuation. In lode gold there was an increase corresponding to the increased output of copper. Silver and lead both show decreases although they are not very serious in either case."

Earl Grey is quite right in stating that Americans make good settlers and good citizens in the Canadian west. Many of them were born in Canada, and many others in northern Europe, or are the sons of Europeans who emigrated to this country. There is no reason why they should look back with longing to the institutions of the country they leave behind. They come to Canada to make homes for themselves and children, and they find a form of government, even more democratic than that of the greatest republic, which becomes citizens of the greatest empire. They have nothing to regret, they suffer no loss of liberty, they come to a land of great opportunity, and they are wise enough to appreciate the advantages.

Mr. Bentley, the opposition candidate for St. John county, is a Nova Scotian, says the Standard. The editor of the Standard is also a Nova Scotian. Mr. Bentley is a citizen of St. John county, with large business interests in the county, and it is proof of his merit as a man and a citizen that the Standard can find no fault in him greater than that he was born in Nova Scotia.

St. John may be represented this year at the Canadian athletic championships. The Times has frequently in the past few years contended that this city could produce the men if the citizens would encourage the sport.

The Standard thinks it has discovered a valuable journalistic ally in this city, in addition to the Globe. The Standard's standard of value is rather low.
