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judges at their discretion may debar any vehicle which from its construction gives evidence of defects which would render the adoption of its type an unduly impossibility. For the purpose of limiting the contest to the most practical, a preliminary test of all vehicles entered for competition shall be held by the judges on or about Saturday, Oct. 1, under such rules as the judges may determine on, and for such a distance as they may decide. At this test the judges may debar such constructions as in their opinion do not possess features entitling them to further consideration. It is stipulated, however, that all motor vehicles which were prizes or honor mentions in the Paris-Rouen contest of 1894 or in the recent race between Paris and Bordeaux shall not be compelled to compete in the preliminary test, but shall be admitted upon proper application to the first competition on November 27.

BOARDING SCHOOL AND ACADEMY, NEWCASTLE, N. B., under the direction of the SISTERS OF THE CONGREGATION OF NOTRE DAME. This handsome building, on the point of completion, and admirably suited for Educational purposes, will be ready to receive pupils at the opening of the September Term.

The history of our Church during the last half century may be said to gather round the person, life and work of our late revered Diocesan, the Right Reverend John Medley. It was on his advent to New Brunswick that this Province, which had before been only a parish in the Diocese of Nova Scotia, was formed into a Diocese, and the Church entered on that stage of new work in which she had a full equipment to carry out her Divine Mission.

Such abundant labor has long laid fruit. Among the first and greatest works of the Bishop were the building of the Christ Church Cathedral, Fredericton. His heart was set upon the work before leaving England, and through his untiring and untiring efforts, he brought out with him \$7,000 as a beginning. He succeeded in getting the cornerstone laid in the same manner as he had done in the Diocese of Nova Scotia, and the work was completed. Great and insuperable difficulties seemed, at times, to stand in the way. Again and again was the work stopped for lack of funds, and then, at a critical moment, through prayer, the generous and often unknown contribution made all things possible once more. Many had their forebodings that the Cathedral would never be built. Some said it was a money waste; others that it was too costly, or it was too large, others that it was in the wrong place. But, in spite of all, the work was completed and the Cathedral—the first which up to that time had been erected in the Anglican communion since the Reformation—was consecrated in 1853. It is impossible to say what the Diocese would have been without it, but this we know, that what since that date, the noble and sacred pile has stood on the river bank, the monument of persevering energy, of liberal generosity, of triumph over seeming failure, of holy reverence, of devout aspirations, and of a type of ecclesiastical architecture which has need of it. The influence of that work has been great, not only within the Diocese but beyond it.

Next, the preacher said, he would mention the progress made in the Diocese during Bishop Medley's episcopate. On his arrival he found 28 clergy and not one parish self-supporting. There are now 70 clergy and twenty-three self-supporting parishes. In 1845 the grant to this Diocese from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts was about \$20,000. Last year the grant was only a little over \$5,000. The voluntary yearly contributions to the Church in the Diocese were, in 1845 \$87,719; in 1894 upwards of \$18,000, and this sum, he remembered, exclusive of the thousands of dollars raised by the self-supporting parishes for their own maintenance, and the contributions made to missionary work of various kinds in the Diocese and Foreign Field. It is clear that much satisfactory progress has been made in these important branches.

Again, he would note the number confirmed as indicating the growth of the Diocese. In 1845 the number of communicants was 11,200—a yearly average of 373—and the total for the last twenty years was 12,240—a yearly average of 612. The statistical statement of communicants shows that in 1854 there were 2000 in the Diocese, in 1858 there were 7294. There was great progress in church building, for whereas in 1845 there were only about 23 churches and chapels in the Diocese, there are now upwards of 120. So too had there been progress in ecclesiastical architecture, that the buildings erected for the worship of Almighty God might be more worthy of the sacred mystery, as well as in church music and in all things pertaining to Divine Service—as was abundantly evidenced in the beautiful and tasteful work in the choir of this church, the musical service so well rendered this morning and the order and reverence manifested so gratifying a degree.

In recounting the particulars respecting the Church in the Diocese, to which he had referred, we see how much was accomplished under the episcopate of our late venerable Bishop and how great has been the loving kindness of the Lord to this portion of his vineyard. The seed of the Kingdom, which was sown here by our forefathers, has borne much fruit and we are, to-day, reaping what they have sown.

But this is not all we have to say on an occasion like this.—The observation of a jubilee could never mean anything to us unless it were to be a jubilee of our own. To recount the past to find encouragement and inspiration for present duty and receive guidance for the future. What now is the outlook before us? What has the Lord done since the last jubilee? We have taken a glance at the past, and we are, to-day, reaping what they have sown.
