





He dies, apparently, fools all the people whe see him, and then fools the undertaker who comes to pre-pare him for burial by waking up from a semi-conscious state and protesting stainst being a witness to his own funeral from the fiside of a coffin. Westfall died last week for the sevent time, but revived agrain in time-to prevent the funeral, although the grave had been dug and the coffin or-dered. He is a worker in the oil fields near Jake's Run, and, according to his own story, has frequent attracks of un-conaciousness. He had one of his at-tacks, the family made all the usual tests and he was pronounced dend. The grave was prepared and the under-taker sent for. He arrived at night and asked the undertaker what he was there for and what he was going to do. Westfall found out in a short time that it was proposed to bury him, and he-entered a vigorous protest. Wentfall says that, he has several times been in this condition and has narrowly escaped being buried alive on more than one occasion. He has sometimes lain in the trance for two or three days at a time. During this period he has the most remarkable dreams. Nearly always he dereams he is in heaven, but can give no accurate description of what the place is like. At other times he dreams he has gome in the onosite direction, and when this happens he is always giad to be wakened, even by the undertaker. He is in excellent health and his experience never hurts hm.

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

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
