CONSTITUTION

OF THE

New Brunswick Baptist Association. Eastern

Article 1. This association composed only of Ministers and Delegates, who shall be members of the Churches which they represent ; shall be styled "The

Eastern N. B. Baptist Association."

Art. 2. The Association shall meet Annually, at 2 o'clock, P. M., on the second Saturday of July, at such place as they shall appoint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The meeting shall be opened with Social Conference, after which the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meetrence, after which the Omcers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjournment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by Prayer.

Art. 3. Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate or more; but no Church, however numerous, shall be entitled to a greater number

than five, in addition to their Pastor.

than five, in addition to their Pastor.

Art. 4. At each meeting of the Association, the Delegates shall deriver to the Clerk of the preeding year immediately on their arrival, the letters from the Charches; a list of the Delegates having been prepared by the Glerk, their names charled the shall take their places. The Moderator of the preeding shall be called, and they shall take their places. The Moderator of the preeding year shall call the vote for a Moderator, and the person who shall be chosen by a majority of the members present, shall, upon his acceptance lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, to preside ing the transactions of the meeting nominate Committees, and maintain due. ing to the choice of a Cierk. It shall be the duty of the Medérator, to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain errors are members. It shall be the duty of the Cierk, to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the Press.

Art. 5. It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Messengers a letter than the Association strings are accounted in section.

Art. 0. It shall be the cuty of each under to send by its messengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the additions and diminution within the last year; and generally of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It shall also forward money for the printing of the Minutes.

Art. 6. When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, application must be made by Letter and satisfactory evidences farnished of their faith and must be high done and world recognized taken the Money to the life.

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CIRCULAR LETTER.

TO THE CHURCHER COMPOSING THE EASTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

DEAR BRETHERN,—In preparing for your perusal this Annual Epistle, we hope it will not be offensive should we call your attention to a few thoughts in connection with the duties of Churches to their Pastors.

The relation existing between Churches and their Pastors is of a most sacred character, and therefore cannot be lightly esteemed without sinning against God and hindering the prosperity of His cause. A scriptural regard for this subject on the part of the Church is therefore of the highest importance; although it is often entirely lost sight of; hence much of the dearth, darkness and deciention of which we so often complain. That no Church can be prosperous while proper attention is wanting in this respect, is evident both from reason and revelation. For the character, labours, and inflaence of the Christian ministry are God's primary means for enlarging, instructing, and guiding the Church. The minister is God's mouth to his people; he is sent of God to them; in this belief they have chosen him as their spiritual teacher and guide : For all or any of them, then, to neglect, oppose, despise, or traduce/him, beomes at once a sin of a withering, blighting character. And though he may have the piety of the sainted, the tongue of the learned, the talento the gifted, and the zeal of the successful, in warn will be toil and for naught will be labour, while he is embarrassed with the prejudice and trammeled with the unbelief of a non-co-operating or sympathising people. If God's means for building up and blessing a people by them is opposed or despised, who then shall appoint means that will be rendered effectual. Brethren let us not fight against the Lord, for it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God ... It is the duty of every Church to respect the feelings and guard well the character and reputation of their Pastors As wfaithful Minister sets himself in opposition to all error and sin; and is the open advocate of truth and virtue, he is liable to assault from the wicked and erring, and even from many professing godliness; and as a man's worst foes are often those of his own household, so the worst enemies of ministers are often professing Christians, and in many instances the very persons they have most sought to benefit. Christ came to his own and his own received him nots He was crucified by the people he sought to save. The ministry is called a " good

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fight ;" and it well expesses to opposition, persecution and reproach, and to all the fiery darts that fill the quivers of the wicked; and often the more faithful, the more assailed; and the more faithless and timeserving the more they are saluted with hosannas. There are frequent instances when the rulers crucify Jesus and release Barrabbas. But it is the plain and imperative duty of the Church to interfere and defend the character and reputation of their Minister when unjustly assailed, whether by the ungodly or by those of their own communion. But instead of this being done, in many instances a Minister is opposed, maligned and misrepresented amongst his people; and the peace, harmony and fellowship of the Church broken up by a few pretenders to piety—self-willed, self-opinionand, Diotrephes like characters, whose motto is "rule or ruin;" who regard not the character, claims, or necessities of their Pastor when they no longer can use him to accomplish their carnal designs. And not content with refusing him the help which it is their duty to give, they will do all in their power to destroy his influence, hinder his usefulness, and prejudice the minds of their children and neighbours against him; and then raise the complaint in the Church that he is no longer of service to the cause for which they feel so deeply concerned; and too frequently the churches tolerate their sin, whereas it is their duty promptly to protect him from those self-willed, jealous envious, tattling persons, who track him as did the Scribes and Pha. rises the Saviour to find faults in him, and when they find none can readily manufacture them. For a Minister is prevented by the sacredness of his calling from resorting for redress to the law of the land. He is in the condition of the Christian man who is insulted by the heartless duellist, knowing that he can send him a challenge with impunity because it will not be accepted. We have known instances of such persons circulating the most baseless reports to the prejudice and detriment of their own Pastors, and when proved to be utterly baseless, yet repeat them. We know of no sinners more wicked than these more worthy to be cast aside, as Paul did the viper. By tarnishing the fair name of God's ministers and obstructing their usefulness, they serve the cause of the enemy far more effectually than do the infidels, drunkards and the profune; and the Church should in all such cases interpose its shield to catch all the fiery darts aimed at his character. And not only so; they should make all such persons feel that the command " touch not mine annointed and do my prophets no harm," has some force and meaning; and that its violation is worthy of the severest discipline. We would not be misunderstood, however; we have no cloaks for false prophets, or fellowship for an impious ministry—no excuse for indolence, worldliness or neglect on the part of a Minister ; but we

would have a true ministry guarded on every hand from assault on its character or hindranesto its usefulness; swhether done by the ungolly or those professing godliness; and to do; this is a duty which every Church owes to itself and to its Minister. We would send a Judas to his own place, and we would send the peace disturbers of the Church, who villify Godle ministers; after him. They are alike graceless and guilty.

But there is often a tatal error committed among our Churchesin reference to this matter. Whenever any of these self-willedde. signing members, turn against their spator and forsake his midistrations, neglect the conferences, withdraw from the communions. and absent themselves from the prayer-meetings; and refuse to cooperate with the Church in giving him a liberal supports and then use as a cause for complaint (the effect they have produced) that his labours are not appreciated and the cause is going down, and he is not supported; and, in fact, it is time he was sent away and they had another in his place , the Church instead of bringing them to an account for their conduct, knowing well where the principal difficulty lies, will overlook the affair and conclude upon the whole they had better give them their way and that perhaps a change in the ourtorate will remedy the exil. So that no matter what are his pecuniary embarrassments, his family afflictions, or the sacrifices attendant on his removal, together with loss of reputation as not being successful; their poor oppressed and discouraged, (and often penniless) pastor, is forced to resign. The Church meanwhile hop that a new minister will be the means of reviving the cause; but not unfrequently they meet with disappointment; and the reason is obvious; they have done violence to the known command of the Almighty in reference to the one they have already deposed; and according to the Bible, the frown of God rests upon such a com-The sin that cursed Israel and made them a reproach and byeword among the nations, was that they had killed the proph and stoned them that He had sent unto them. Their house to this day is left desolate unto them, because that when Christ by the prophets himself and apostles would often have gathered their children together as a hen doth her broad under her wings, these rulers would not let him. And we are persuaded that in many instances of religious declention, and the loss of the visibility of Churches is where God is visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation; while in other cases he is showing mercy unto thousands of them that fear him and obey his commandments. In vain may we look for the hissess of God while we do violence to his laws, by maltreating his sevrants. No, Brethren, God has a peculiar regard for the character, beings and interests of his ministers. He regards the treatment given them

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as given to himself; and has said of them, he that despiseth you desoiseth me; and he that despiseth me shall be lightly esteemed. He that toucheth them touches the apple of his eye. A church once guilty in whole or in part of evilly treating their pastor, must repent of their sin, confess and forsake it, before they can possibly expect the blessing of God. In conclusion, Brethren, we would exhort you as individuals and as Churches, by all that is lovely, honest, and of good report, if you would be in a healthy, working condition, prepared to accomplish the work assigned you the world's conversion, fyou would have peace in your homes, peace in the Churches, your children converted, sin destroyed, your influence good, religion abound. God glorified, and heaven peopled; co-operate with your pastors in all that the scriptures enjoin. See to it that he has your prayers, your sympathies, and your scriptural submission, seteeming highly in toyo for his work's sake and where it is possible make for him a comfortable provision, give attendance to his ministrations; let him see and hear you at the conferences, in the prayer

meetings, and at the communion seasons; in a word, hold up his

Is this Annual Report permit your Board, first of all to seview briefly the segment of the Society, they represent, from its commencement.
The Society was preparated in the Rapties Chapel of Brussels Street, Sarch 21st, 1852. The first Annual Seport of the Board of Management was recented to a meeting of the Society held in connection with the Rastern Ac-

sociation at Cambridge, July 10th 1854. From that and the succeeding Reports we gather the following information regarding the progress of the Society. It may not be in all respects perfectly accurate, owing to the lack of minute reports on the part of some of the Missionaries; but in all its essential features we presume it is reliable.

AMOUNT OF SERVICE PERFORMED. Twenty-four years in all.

In August last he organized a Baptist Church at Black River, Glenels, which has since been charged by baptisms till it now numbers 22. At the same place we have been engaged in building a Place of Worship. The effort has thus far been crowned with success. The building is nearly completed outside and spart of the materials for its entire completion is on the spot. The Committee have funds in hand to enable them to must their liabilities.

"In addition to the regular labours of your Missionary he has performed several extensive Missionary tours. Some of these deserve a notice in this Report. In October last he visited Tabusintac and preached a few times with encouraging indications. Another visit to the same place was made in the

following month which was equally encouraging.

In January last he made a Missionary tour up the South West Branch of the Miramichi as far as Ludlow. That visit he learns has resulted in the completion of the Baptist Meeting House at Doaktown and otherwise advancing

In February a visit was made into Albert County on behalf of the Building Committee of Black River Chapel. During this visit £18 was raised for the

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During the year three visits were made to Restigouche which have been evidently crowned with God's blessing In April last, assisted by Rev. W. A. Crandal, your Missionary organized a Baptist Church at Durham, Restigouche. As he has already published full accounts of these visits he need here only remark that in Restigouche he was permitted to participate in one of the most remarkable revivals ever enjoyed in this Province.

The Congregations during the year have been generally large in the Miramiehi field. A protracted meeting was held in Newcastle in April and May. the attendance was large and the Meeting unusually solemn, and it is believ-

ed that some were hopefully converted.

Several Meetings have been recently held at Nelson, 4 miles from Newcastle, and your missionary has rejoiced in the hopeful conversion of a number of interesting young persons there.

The number of persons baptized during the year is as follows:-Little South West 3; Whitney Settlement 2; Black River 4; Durham 12; Bathurst

Baptist principles are evidently increasing in those Northern Sections of the Province, and should your Board judiciously continue its operations there still more enlarged success may be realized than has been enjoyed in the past.

In conclusion your Missionary feels impelled by a conviction of duty to close his labours in the Miramichi Field. He would record his unfeigned gratitude to God for the many mercies wouchsafed during the two years he has laboured there Although sorrows and trials have been experienced in an enlarged degree, the Saviour's gracious presence has been enjoyed and His "exceeding great and precious promises" realized.

From the above Report it will be seen that Brother Wallace has laboured most indefatigably and with encouraging success; but your Board regret to say that in consequence of the enfeebled state of Mrs. Wallace's health he has decided to leave the North in the hope that a change of climate will restore her. THE V. JAMES BLANKING WINSTON, who yo beliques wou This faithful Missionary continued to labour under the direction of your Board, in Blackville, Blissville, Ludlow, Doaktown, and adjacent settlements, up to the 20th March last. He was then compelled to leave the field in consequence of ill health, from which, we regret to say, he has not yet recovered. He at present seems prestrated in body and in mind. Your Board would

commit him to the prayers and sympathies of the denomination, trusting that

it will please God to restore him to his place upon Zion's walls.

His last reports cover a period of seven months, during which time he travelled 1197 miles, held 133 religious meetings, made 235 visits, distributed 4,277 pages of religious reading, baptized one person, and collected in support of his mission £34 14s 3d. Long may he be spared, if it be the Master's will, to call sinners to repentance and edity the Church of God.

MISSION TO RICHIBUCTO.

Rev. E. McInnis spent three months in the service of the Board in Richibucto and adjacent settlements. He entored upon his work late in the Autumn; Rev, G. F. Miles kindly provided him with a horse and waggon free of expense to aid him in the prosecution of his mission. In his report he says:—"My labors were chiefly confined to Kingston, Richibucto, Bass River, Mooley's River and Nicholas River. I usually preached three times on the Sabbath, and three times during the week. Attended prayer meetings also, and visited from house to house, and in rendering this service my soul was much refreshed with the love of God. My meetings were very encouraging. A large number of the people up the Rivers are Presbyterians, but they treated me with great kindness and hospitality, and seemed deeply interested in my administrations. An effectual door is open in all that region for Baptist preaching, and could a missionary be stationed there much good would result.

I travelled during my mission 246 miles; attended 78 meetings; made 165

visits, and collected for the Board £8 1s. 6d."

TABUSINETAC MISSION.

Rev. D. McPhail spent a few weeks under the direction of your Board in this place, preaching the Word publicly and from house to house. He reports having preached in Newcastle, North Esk. South West, and Black River, and t labusinate 43 sermons; visited a number of families, found many of the young people anxiously concerned for their souls, and some expressing a lively hope in the Redeemer. He met some who had lived in that region for years without having heard any preaching that they could understand. These were Gælic people, and he was enabled to declare unto such, in their own tongue the truth as it is in Jesus. His collections in aid of the mission amounted to £1 8s. 6d.

MISSION OF BRO. JOHN CURRY, JR.

Your Board as a general rule, seek to employ ordained Ministers in the mission field, but from representations made to them they were induced to a point brother John Curry, to succeed Elder Blakney in the Mirimichi district, for a few weeks. Under date of June 25 he says:—I arrived in my allotted field of labor May 30th, and up to date I have travelled 228 miles, preached sixteen times, attended five prayer and two Conference meetings, visited 60 families, and collected for the Board £3 2s. 6. He says many of his meetings have been full of interest, and he trusts good is being done. It is expected that Brother Curry's mission will be nearly, if not quite, self-sustaining:

Brother J. F. Goldrup spent several months in the service of the Board at Loch Lomond, Wade Settlement and the Stackhouse Settlement. His labors were well received, and useful in their influence among the people is now supplied by the ministry of Brother Washbura, who will receive a small compensation from the Board in addition to what he receives from the

people.

Your Board have received from him one monthly report since he entered upon the mission. This indicates that his labors are well reserved, and that good is being done.

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GENERAL MISSIONARY AGENCY. By the united action of the Missionary and Union Boards, Rev. Thomas Todd was appointed some months ago as the General Missionary of this Board, to present its claims to the churches, to collect for its funds, and in every possible way aid in carrying forward the mission work. He has already travelled extensively in the Western District of the Province, and his mission has met with the cordial approval of the churches. He visited the Tobique and the Grand Falls in the winter with special reference to securing provision in that inviting district for a permanent missionary. The people entered heartily and nobly inte his propositions, and a sum supposed to be equal to £146 per annum was pledged by the people at the two places for the support of such a missionary as the Board might select for them. Your Board was given to understand that an efficient man was required. They were exceedingly desirous te obtain a suitable person, and made application first to Rev. A. D. Thomson of Saint Andrews, and afterwards to Rev. J. Newcomb of Moncton, but neither of those brethren could accept the appointment. Subsequently your Board was informed that Rev. S. March, of Saint George, was open to a call, and they gave him a letter of introduction and commendation to the people with the understanding that should his visit be mutually satisfactory he would remain amongst them. He has gone up the River, but your Board are not yet informed regarding the result.

The success of Brother Todd's General Agency is quite equal to the most sanguine expectations entertained by your Board, and promises to exert a most wholesome influence upon the whole missionary movement. This statement is confirmed by the following interesting report from his own pen.

DEAR BRETHERN.—Having been appointed some months ago as your General Missionary Agent, in conjunction with the Financial Agency, I have endeavoured to give some attention to that department. During my travels I have visited some very destitute places where no Baptist Churches are organized, but where there is a strong, and urgent desire for Baptist preaching.—Then we have a number of small churches who are struggling for life and visibility; these present inviting fields of labor and christian usefulness. I also find a large number of churches without Pastors, and many of our Ministers without churches. I have received a most cordial reception from Ministers and people wherever I have travelled.

There is a strong feeling in the minds of christians towards missionary operations. I think I can say with all truthfulness, that if our Mission funds have been limited during the few past years, it is not owing to the parsimonious or covetous hearts of the Baptists of New Brunswick; want of system thorough financial organization and system, is the sole cause. It is not necessary for me here to say anything regarding the utility of the union plan to supply that one deficiency, this I will note at the proper time. Suffice to say that in connection with the Financial Agency, for the past sight months at have attended 220 religious meetings, travelled about 3,500 miles, obtained in collections for Home Missions £63 12s. 104d. This being exclusive of the Union.

"Travelled 255 miles; preached 22 sermons; delivered 2 'Temperance Lectures; organized 2 'Temperance Societies,' also 2 'Sabbath Schools;' made 62 visits; laboured 40 days in the field, and collected £1 0 0 for the Missionary Society.

On motion the Report was accepted.

The following Resolutions were then adopted, viz:

1st.—Resolved, That the salary of Elder William Pulcifer, Missionary,

be £100 currency per annum.

2d .- RESOLVED, That we recommend to the Board of the Parent Society, the continuation of the service of Elder William Pulcifer, Missionary, in the same field, during the ensuing three months, and that provision to remunerate him therefor be made by this Board.

HENRY H. McLATCHY, Sec. P. S. At a subsequent meeting of the Board, held on the afternoon of the

same day, the following Resolution was adopted, viz:

RESOLVED, That in adjusting the accounts of Missionaries who may be connected with this Board, 360 days shall constitute a missionary year.

Other denominations are making laudable efforts to meet the spiritual wants of these people, but the Baptist element is scattered among them and calls for culture and extension. Four additional men at least are required for the Northern section.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

N. B. BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Article 1. This Society shall be called the New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society.

Article 2. The design of this Society shall be to promote the faithful preaching of the Gospel of Christ, and to spread Bible Christianity throughout the

destitute sections of New Brunswick.

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Article 3. Any person may become a member of this Society, by contributing is or upwards annually to its funds. Seven pounds ten shillings paid at any one time shall constitute a life member; and any person paying a sum, which in addition to previous contributions shall amount to twenty five pounds, shall be a director for life; and any Baptist Church or Association or Auxiliary, which contributes annually to this Society, shall be entitled to be represented by one delegate for every five pounds so contributed.

Article 4. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Auditor,

who shall be annually appointed by the Society.

Article 5. The Society shall appoint an Executive Committee, exclusive of the officers above named, residing in the City of St. John, and its vicinity. The officers above named shall be members ex officio of the Executive Committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum at any meeting regularly convened This Committee shall have power to call its own meetings, form its own rules of business, and fill any vacancies which may occur during the year, and convene special meetings of the Board and of the Society, shall appoint Missionaries, and instruct them as to their sphere of labors, shall expend the funds for the objects of the Society, providing that all amounts contributed for any specific object, shall, as far as possible, be faithfully applied in accordance with the wish of the donors; shall employ such agency or agencies for the collection of funds, and for all such purposes, as the interests of the Society may demand, and shall make an annual Report of their proceedings to the Society.

Article 6. Every Auxiliary Society, who shall agree to commit all its funds to the direction of this Society, shall be entitled to receive missionary labour in such field as it may designate to an amount, at least equal to its contributions;

provided such designation be made at the time of payment.

Article 7. The officers of Auxiliary Societies shall be ex officio Directors of this Society, and their members shall be members of this Society.

The annual meeting of this Society shall be held at such time and

place as shall be determined upon at a previous annual meeting.

Article 9. No alteration of this Constitution shall be made without an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present, at an annual meeting.

FORM FOR THE CONSTITUTION OF THE AUXILIARY.

Article 1. This Society shall be called the -Missionary Society-Auxiliary to the " New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society. Article 2. The object of this Society shall be to aid in supplying the destitute

with the blessings of the Gospel.

Article 3. All persons contributing 5s. per agnum shall be members of the Society, and every person paying £2 Ics. at any one time, shall be a Member for

Article 4. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a Board con-

sisting of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Managing

Committee, seven of whom shall form a quorum to do business.

Article 5. The Society shall meet annually, at such time and place as may be agreed upon at a previous meeting, when the officers for the ensuing year shall be elected, and such other business transacted as the requirements of the Society

may demand.

Article 6. The secretary shall keep up such correspondence with the New
Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society as the general interests of the

Missionary cause may require.

EULES TO BE OBSERVED BY MISSIONARIES.

The Missionaries of the Roard are expected to communicate with the Corresponding Secretary monthly, and oftener if necessary : giving a condensed sketch of their labours and such items of intelligence relating to their Mission

as may be useful to the Board, or of general interest to the denomination.

2. Each Missionary shall be instructed to form Auxiliaries to the New Brunswick Home Missionary Society in the field of his labor, for the purpose of raising funds for the Society, to take collections publicly and privately whenever he can do so with propriety, and in every way that he can consistenly replenish

the funds of the Society.

A faithful account of all contributions in money, or in other things, shall be transmitted through the Corresponding Secretary to the Board, and no money shall be paid him by the Treasurer without an order signed by the Chairman and Corresponding Secretary, or in their absence by three of the members of the Board.

4. Each Missionary shall keep a faithful record of the places visited, the number of sermons preached, of converts baptized, of churches formed, of visits made, of meetings held, of Sabbath Schools established, of Temperance Societies formed, of Tracts distributed, &c., &c., in the course of the year, and report the same to the Corresponding Secretary, at the close of each year

5. When Missionaries are employed permanently, in case of their wishing to retire from the service of the Board, they must give three months notice to that effect, and no missionary shall change his field of labour without consent of the

Board.

6. The Missionaries of this Board shall be amenable to the Board for a faithful performance of their duty as Christian Missionaries, and shall be liable to be dismissed at any time for dereliction of duty, or immorality of conduct, or for preaching sentiments in opposition to God's Word.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD.

Rule 1. There shall be a meeting of this Board for the transaction of business on the first Monday in every month.

2. The Recording Secretary shall keep a faithful record of the transactions of

the Board. 3. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare a faithful report annually, of the operations of the Society, which, if judged advisable, shall be printed under

the direction of the Society.

4. No man shall be employed by the Board who cannot furnish satisfactory evidence of good moral and religious character, of consecration under divine influence to the work of the Ministry, and of such mental attainments as shall enable him, with the divine blessing, faithfully and successfully to fulfil its respensible duties.

5. In case of wishing to dismiss a Missionary permanently employed, on account of incompetency on his part to fulfil the duties of his calling, or on account of inability on the part of the Board to pay his salary, three months

notice shall be given to such Missionary.

REPORT.

In presenting their annual report the Committee are rejoiced to be able to say that the Seminary is in a healthy state. The number of pupils in attendance for the year has been 105, and the average number present has been between 49 and 50 each week throughout the year.

The classes have been exercised in the various branches of English Mathematical, and Classical Studies, particular attention has been given given to English Grammar, Dictation, and the Parsing of sentences, as the teachers are convinced that thorough elementary knowledge is essential to future progress. The diligent application of the pupils in each department has been very gratifying, and their uniform good behavior has given much satisfaction to the Principal and Preceptress.

The arrangement with regard to the female department, mentioned in last year's report has been successfully carried out, and the committee have renewed their engagement with Miss Magee, who will resume her duties at the opening of the term.

The usual exhibitions took place at the close of each half year, and gave general satisfaction to a numerous audience. The Rev. Mr. Cady of Portland and several other gentlemen were present at the midsummer examination and expressed themselves highly pleased with what they wit-

At the close of the winter term two of the Students matriculated at King's College, Fredericton.

The notion has been entertained in some quarters that a young man cannot enter King's college directly from the Seminary. Such a misapprehension has an evident tendency to prevent students from entering or to occasion their leaving the Institution. The committee are determined therefore to check the spread of this notion which is both false and injurious, and they are persuaded that the Education Society will sustain them in doing so.

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As the Seminary building requires painting the committee have used their exertions to obtain contributions towards this object, in St. John through the kind assistance of the Rev. Jarvis Ring, and also at Fredericton. The work is still in progress so that a full account of their proceedings in this matter must be reserved for next year's report.

They are aware that many friends of the Society take a lively interest in the education of young men for the ministry, and the committee are anxious to do all in their power to promote so desirable an object. During the greater part of the year Mr. Judson Blakeney and Mr Joseph Blakeney, sons of Elder James Blakeney, have prosecuted their studies at the Seminary, and preached either in Fredericton or the neighborhood as occasion required; Mr. A. Washburn of St. Martins spent a term at the Institution with the same object in view; Mr. Allen Watson of Southampton also entered, but was compelled by failing health to relinquish is purpose.

The Committee entertain a firm conviction that the Denomination will not abandon an Institution which was founded by men whose memory is deservedly revered, which has for nearly a quarter of a century, been sustained by much exertion and many prayers, which has already conferred lasting benefits on the community, and indirectly contributed to elevate the standard of education throughout the province, and which is destined, if adequately supported, to produce yet more important results in the future.

With an assurance of the hearty co-operation and support of their merous friends in the province; and with an unshaken confidence in the divine blessing, the Committee and Teachers hopefully address themselves to the duties and responsibilities of another year.
