HON. C. N. SKINNER

Distinguished Career of Brilliant Jurist Ends After Brave Fight With Disease.

City Recorder and Prominent in Politics for Many Years--Many Society Connections.

Hon. ... N. Skinner, city recorder, passed away last evening at the family residence on Crown street. Mr. Skinner had been in a semi-conscious condition since Wednesday afternoon and gradually grew weaker till the end came peacefully at 9.30 p. m. yesterday in the 77th year of his age. The recorder was taken ill about a month ago and his condition rapidly became critical. But after some days his illness took a turn for the better, and he began to rally till hopes of his complete recovery were entertained. On Tuesday he had sufficiently recovered that he was able to leave his room for a short time, but on Wednesday afternoon he suffered a relapse and gradually sank into a semi-conscious condition, though at times he rallied sufficiently to be able to recognize those about him. Yesterday afternoon it became apparent that the end was near and the members of his family residing in the city were summoned to his residence.

Mr. Skinner leaves a widow, five sons and two daughters. He is also survived by two brothers, A. O. Skinner and F. S. Skinner and four sisters, Miss Mary Manning Skinner, Mrs. A. Robertson, Mrs. Emma Fiske and Miss Belle Skinner.

Tammany Leader Admits His Strength--Thought to be Willing to Accept Nomination.

New York, N. Y., Sept. 22.—Gaynor sentiment took form and assumed direction in Democratic circles here today, more rapidly than at any other time since his name came to the front as a possible candidate for governor. State Chairman John A. Dix, had brought word of how large the figure of the mayor bulged from a distance but until today New York leaders had been reticent. Partly they were restrained by the continued silence of the mayor himself, and partly by hesitation as to how they would fare with Mayor Gaynor at Albany and John Purroy Mitchell, now acting mayor in his chair. But today there were two developments of interest.

In the first place there was much open talk for Gaynor among district leaders who gathered at Tammany Hall and those who heard it could only account for it on the assumption that it had warrant from those higher in the councils of the society. In the second place Chas. F. Murphy, the taciturn leader of Tammany publicly admitted the strength of the movement toward Gaynor while carefully reserving any declaration of his own attitude.

Mr. Murphy said: "The sentiment of the state seems to favor the nomination of Mayor Gaynor for gover on." By many Tammany men this de claration was taken to mean that Murphy brought away from his re

nor." 





SUICIDE CAUSE OF TRAPPER'S DEATH

Coroner Berryman Makes This Central Committee Chosen at **Decision After Viewing Body** Yesterday--Sight Most Horrible One to Witness.

Coroner D. E. Berryman went to the Glies Crossing on the Lepreaux road yesterday morning and viewed the remains of the trapper, John Simms, who committed suicide by shooting himself. When the coroner returned about noon he stated to a Standard reporter that in all his life he never witnessed a more terrible sight than when he entered the hut that the trapper had occupied.

The trapper was seated on a bench between his feet which were covered with moccasins was a double barreled shot gun, which had been the cause of his death. The coroner said that he had no doubt but that Simms had committed suicide and it appeared that he had placed the barrel of the gun under his chin and had pulled the trigger with his foot. The charge had entered under the chin and the entire face had been blown off. The brains and the flesh from the face had been scattered about the walls of the hut and the sight was a most horrible one to witness.

The hut in which the hermit had lived was only about twelve feet square, and was in a filthy condition. Simms had very little to do with any person and for the past five or six years has made his living with shooting and trapping game.

Communication has been made with some relatives in Nova Scotia and Coroner Berryman has decided that an inquest is unnecessary. He has given permission to the special constable to take charge of the body and notified the Alms House commissioners to arrange for the burial.

Here's T. AND L. CONGRESS Enthusiastic Meeting Held Last Evening--Labor as Fac-Bargain At a meeting of representatives of the local labor unions held in the Old Longshoremen's Hall last evening, the question of forming a trades and labor council was discussed at length and a motion to report to the local unions in favor of this movement was adopted unanimously. About 30 delegates representing more than 1500 organized workingmen were present and the meeting was very enthusiastic. All the delegates expressed themselves strongly in favor of the formation of a central body, agreeing that since the old council had lapsed nearly two years ago, the labor movement had made no progress. Some discussion took place along the line of independent political action on the part of the workers, and the opinion was freely expressed that by bringing the influence of labor to bear upon the city council many reforms could be secured calculated to promote the interests of the workers. Uunfortunately the president of the old council was not present and the delegates were without some information as to the status of the old charter received from the trades and labor congress of Canada. Chas. Jones, of the carpenters' unions was elected temporary chairman, and A. Dever, of the pressmen, secretary. The old longshoremen, the carpenters and joiners, bricklayers and masons, printers, pressmen, painters, sheet metal workers and other unions were represented. Some discussion took place on the question of seating delegates from the unions affiliated with the Canadian Federation of Labor so-called, but the matter was not definitely decided. Another meeting will be held on Thursday evening, Oct, 6, when the delegates will present credentials from their unions and select officers.
