babilities before we left Scotland and on any subsequent day; but other matters required attention on the sea, and these probabilities of weather were overlooked. The Government considered the propriety of advising the women and children to remain in St. John, and thought of making some provision for their accommodation in the city, but the disadvantages were more than equivalent to these inconveniences of the position which would be surmounted in two, or at the furthest, three weeks. Arrangements were made by the Surveyor General, the Hon. B. Stevenson, with the old residents in the neighborhood for accommodation and labour, and every possible effort permitted by the condition of the country has been made to furnish clearances and houses and roads. All the immigrants enployed on the roads have been paid a dollar per day. Where the clearances on lots were only partially executed or not commenced the owners of the lots have been paid to complete them, and where the log houses were not ready for their future inhabitants those men who could brild them have been paid for the work. The accommodation for the women and children has been much more overcrowded than it is desirable, but not so great as I have seen in the habitual life of large cities. Temporary homes for some families were found in eight or tentents, a shelter disliked by some of their inmates and liked by others. All these difficulties are in process of daily reduction. A number of the houses have been inhabited by their future owners since their arrival; a number more for eight or nine days and others for shorter periods; the timber is cleared from a few acres around some homes; and ere another week passes away the new settlement will have commenced its career of ordinary labor and I believe of success.
