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PROCEEDINGS OF FIRST DAY.

ORANGEVILLE, MASONIC HALL, February 18th, 1873.

The Right Worshipful the Grand Master, Brother and Companion, Sir D'Arcy Boulton, took the Chair at 12 o'clock noon, and the Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Brother and Companion, Sir George F. Gow, took the Deputy Chair; and all the other R. W. Grand Officers being in their respective places, (except the R. W. Grand Lecturer, Brother and Companion, Sir James McClure, who was unavoidably absent on account of severe domestic affliction).

Companions John Witters and William Portis, upon being properly instructed by the R. W., acted as Heralds pro tem.

Companions Sir T. R. Brownlee, G. D. C., and James Wilson, C. M., Wentworth, tested the Companions in the Royal Scarlet Degree.

The R. W. Grand Chaplain, Companion Sir John Carry, B.D., conducted the opening services in the Illustrious Degree of R. S., when the R. W. declared the Grand Chapter duly opened for the despatch of business.

Companions Sirs Eli Higgins, Hugh McCaw and E. T. Essery, repeated the Lecture of the Illustrious Degree.

Moved by Companion Sir John Hoey, seconded by Companion Sir John Carter, and

Resolved,—That this Right Worshipful Grand Lodge do now adjourn, and stand adjourned to half-past two o'clock p.m., then to meet for the despatch of business.

The Masonic Hall, although splendidly furnished, and a large and commodious one, was found to be too small to accommodate the large number of delegates present. The R. W. therefore declared the R. W. G. Chapter adjourned accordingly, to meet in the Town Hall at half-past two o'clock p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

ORANGEVILLE, February 18th, 1873.

The R. W. Grand Chapter met in pursuance of adjournment in

the Town Hall, at half-past two o'clock p.m. The R. W. G. Master in the Chair, the R. W. D. G. Master in the Deputy Chair, and the other R. W. Grand Officers in their respective places.

Companions Sirs T. R. Brownlee, G. D. C., and James Wilson, C. M., Wentworth, tested the Companions in the R. S., and reported all correct.

The R. W. G. Master declared the Grand Chapter ready for business.

Moved by Companion Sir Thomas Keyes, seconded by Companion Sir John Orr, and

Resolved,—That Companions Sirs D'Arcy Boulton, F. H. Medcalf, D'Alton McCarthy, W. W. Connor, John Hoey, Rev. John Carry, B.D., Wm. Adamson and Thomas Keyes, be a Committee to take into consideration any changes which they may deem advisable for the better working of Royal Scarlet Chapters.

Moved by Companion Sir James Bennett, seconded by Companion Sir John Hoey, and

Resolved,—That this &R. W. Grand Chapter of Western Ontario be reduced to the Orange Degree.

The R. W. G. Master accordingly declared the Grand Chapter reduced, and instructed the proper officers to that effect.

Brother Col. Ogle R. Gowan asked leave to give the following notices of motion, and trusted some of the Brethren would move them on to-morrow, as he was obliged to leave this evening, and could not be present:—

1st. That Brother————— be, and he is hereby appointed Delegate, on behalf of this Grand Lodge, to represent the Loyal Orangemen of Western Ontario at the Grand Tri-Annual Conference to be held in the City of Glasgow, Scotland, in July next, and that the sum of one dollar be collected from each Lodge to defray his expenses.

2nd. Whereas a number of Societies or Orders, called by a variety of names, such as Orange Young Britons, Knights of Malta, the Irish Black Order, the Scotch Black, and several other similar Associations, have been introduced into Canada, or have been organized in various parts of the Dominion, within the last few years. And whereas such Societies or Bodies of men have been allowed in some places to walk in public processions, and otherwise identify themselves with the Loyal Orange Institution, without being under the control, or owning any direct responsibility to the Grand Lodge of the Order for their acts, words, or proceedings; and it has become highly desirable and necessary that, if such Bodies are to be continued, they should be placed under the direct control of proper Officers, responsible to the Grand Lodges. Therefore, this Provincial Grand Lodge feels it to be its duty to call the attention of the Most Worshipful the Supreme Grand Lodge of British

and Data That recognizing the great value and importance of a full and accurate history of the origin and progress of the Loyal Orange Institution, our old Grand Master, Lieut. Colonel Gowan, be respectfully requested to continue his history of the Society; and that, with a view to its more general diffusion, the Grand Secretary be instructed to send a circular to each Lodge of the Order, as well as to all prominent Officers and Members thereof, requesting their exertions to obtain the names of subscribers, and to forward them to the author of the work at Toronto.

The Right Worshipful Grand Master delivered the following

ADDRESS:

In meeting you once more, I beg to congratulate you on the prosperity of the Order, as will be seen by the Grand Secretary's report:—More dormant Warrants have been revived and fewer reported dormant than for some years, and generally there has been a healthy progress.

It is, however, to be regretted that a want of unanimity still prevails among us on those important occasions when we are called upon to exercise our franchise as Britons, thus weakening our influence in the country. And it is to be hoped that some remedy may be found for such an unhealthy state of affairs.

I trust that the deliberations on which we are about to enter may be characterized by that wisdom and brotherly love so essential to the success of our endeavors, and that the blessings of the Almighty may rest upon our efforts to uphold the Pure Protestant Faith in this land, and to promote a true British feeling among its people.

THE SCOTT MURDER.

At your last meeting you appointed a committee consisting of Hon. J. H. Cameron, Bros. H. S. McDonald, M.P.P., G. M. of Eastern Ontario, D'Alton McCarthy and myself, to search into the law and give our opinion on this question, and to report what Government or tribunal had power to punish the murderers; and, secondly whether the Government or Ontario had any such power at the time they offered \$5,000. We bestowed upon the work entrusted to us our best study and attention, and reported and published the opinion found in the last report of this Grand Lodge, which, I am happy to say, was endorsed by the Press. The Globe, in an article on the subject, said that no one doubted the correctness of our opinion. I caused Mr. Cameron's fee (\$105) to be paid, the others being members of our Order in active connection made no charge.

LODGES OF INSTRUCTION.

Though the unusual demands upon my time during the past year consequent on the elections, prevented my giving as much attention to the matter as I otherwise should, still I managed to hold two Lodges of

Instruction, one at London and the other at St. Catharines, and I believe they were productive of good. Each occupied about the same length of time as an ordinary Grand Lodge Session, viz., two days and evenings. At the London one five Counties were represented, and at St. Catharines three. At each place I had the pleasure of explaining our principles at public meetings. The cost was defrayed by the localities, so this Grand Lodge was at no expense, and the time g ven to the work was the only tax upon me. I would recommend my successor to continue them for a time till several sections of the Province have had a chance of one somewhere within their reach. At the St. Catharines Lodge I had the valuable assistance of the Grand Lecturer, Bro. J. B. Davis.

INCORPORATION.

In conjunction with the Grand Lodge of Eastern Ontario I took steps to apply for an Act of Incorporation, in accordance with the report of a committee at our last meeting, and on its introduction was surprised to find M.P.P.'s representing large bodies of Orangemen taking ground against it, and I recommend that strong, but temperate resolutions be carried by this Grand Lodge and printed, and a copy at once sent to every member of the House.

NEW CONSTITUTION.

During the past year a new Constitution has been issued, which, though costing the committee a week's labor and a vast amount of thought and care, is still I find defective in some respects. I am happy to say, however, that a remedy has been devised for the crude legislation and tinkering from which we suffered in former years, by the provision for a Standing Committee on Constitution and Laws, through whose hands all proposed amendments must pass before becoming law.

THE GRAND COUNCIL.

The Grand Orange Council of the British Empire will meet in July at Glasgow, and this being the strongest Orange Province in America it will be proper that we should be represented at it. This Council meets every third year, and has for its object the interests of Orangemen everywhere, and the consolidation of our strength as a power in the nation. Though the expense of sending representatives is great it only comes tri-annually, and, considering the vast interests of the Order, it is not too much to expect Western Ontario to take a foremost part in promoting them.

JOHNSTON'S VISIT.

The past summer was made memorable by a visit from Bro. Johnston, of Ballykilbeg, and I rejoice to know he met a reception worthy of one who has done and suffered so much in the cause of Orangeism. I believe that he left Canada with the feeling that in its attachment to our principles it was second only to Ireland itself. It was a matter of great regret to me that I was deprived, by circumstances, of the pleasure of meeting him; but being myself deeply immersed in the elections, as well as my two Deputies, I did what I thought was best in the emergency, and requested the Founder of Orangeism in Canada to represent me on the auspicious occasion.

ANNUAL REPORT.

To the Right Worshipful the Grand Master and Brethren of the Grand Orange Lodge of Western Ontario, in Grand Lodge assembled:—

RIGHT WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,-

Your Grand Secretary regrets exceedingly that he is unable to lay before you as full a synopsis of the principal events connected with the working of our beloved Order during the past year as he was desirous of doing, owing to illness during a portion of the months of December and January, and to the large amount of Orange correspondence requiring attention, the reports, constitutions, annual returns, circulars, &c., to be distributed to the Lodges upon his convalescence.

Although the past year has not been marked by as striking events as its predecessor in the world's history, yet it has been one long to be remembered by our Brethren in the "Dear Old Land," for the repeal of the ohnoxious Party Procession Act; and in this land of ours for the visit of the Orange Hero, Brother William Johnston, Esq., M.P., and D. G. M. of Ireland, who gave it the death blow. It is very much to be regretted that he was unable to visit so little of our large and prosperous Province. His visit, limited however as it was, has already had a very beneficial effect in opening the eyes of British Statesmen, farmers and artizans, to the capabilities of our extensive Province as a field for emigration, as also to our attachment to the British Crown and Constitution. I may also mention the triumphant return of Mr. Lewis, the Conservative candidate, as member for the renowned Maiden City of Derry, in opposition to Ultramontane Popery and Home Rule. And also the election of Brother James Alex. Henderson, J. P., proprietor of those sterling Protestant and Orange papers, the Belfast Newsletter and Weekly News, as Mayor of the large and flourishing Town of Belfast.

I again take the liberty of making a couple of quotations from its columns on Protestantism in general during the past year:—

"We do not mean to say that the presence of wealth and power with Protestantism indicates its truth, but we do say that their presence

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attests the adaptability, of Protestantism to the wants of mankind, and its usefulness even in this life, without at all interfering with the rewards of the future. There must be something more than accident in the fact that every State in Europe which adopted the doctrines of the Reformation has progressed, while every State which clung to the Papacy has gone down with the Papacy, or is in a weakened, disturbed, disaffected condition. On the continent of America a great Protestant Power has arisen in the United States within the memory of living men, and a greater Protestant Power, as far as numbers go, has started into existence in the Dominion of Canada, the ally and fast friend of the United Kingdom. And look at this United Kingdom, through England its governing member. Before the Reformation, and until persecution drove the French and other Protestants into Britain and Ireland, Englishmen were of small account in the reckoning of the peoples of Europe. Their annual revenue amounted to two or three millions of pounds, they had no commerce, no manufactures, they grew wool, but foreigners manufactured it. Now, look at England as the seat of power and the representative of the United Kingdom. She is the banker, the postmistress, the carrier, the railway contractor, the manufacturer for the world. Her revenue is seventy millions of pounds. the annual earnings of her artizans are between three and four hundred millions, her commerce is on every sea. She governs an Empire on which the sun never sets, and her subjects number considerably more than three hundred millions. England is Protestant, and to Protestantism she owes her greatness. Contrast this with Austria, strangled by Roman concordats, proud of her Roman alliance, once powerful in arms and influence, now trembling for the safety of what remains of her empire; with Spain, infamously notorious for her persecution in Rome's behalf, stripped of her colonies except one, and that one in open rebellion, her wealth dissipated, her influence destroyed, and a foreigner struggling against adversity in Madrid, while in the Provinces a pretender is unsubdued; with France, at one period a member of the Protestant league, from which in an evil day she broke off, always mighty in arms and favored with a fruitful soil, but on her knees recently craving merciful terms from the Protestant dynasty of Prussia, and still reeling under the blow which that power dealt out."

Ulster Scott in his letter to Samuel Simon, Esq., G. M. of the A. P. Association, Chicago, says:

"With extreme thankfulness I hail the tidings from South America, that Romanism there is receiving fatal death-blows. Most terrible have been the results to that lovely country of the early spread, through the Spanish colonists, of the Papal system. But God's Word has reached at last the South Americans. They have heard, and are daily hearing now, the glorious Gospel. The work of Protestant Reformation has begun under the happiest auspices. What follows may be relied on as giving a true sketch of the extraordinary Mexican reformation:—'The Church turned against us, and advertised from all its pulpits our Bibles and panphlets and hymns, by prohibiting their circulation. Multitudes sought for them, and in many towns and villages the people read and sang of Jesus and his love. This movement became a power, and the day the Church of San Francisco was opened was a great triumph of the Gospel. Aguas, one of the great preachers of the Cathedral of Mexico, who had, like Saul, persecuted the Church, but who, like him, had been

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truly converted, was the preacher upon this great occasion. One of our pamphlets had been given to him, with request to answer it publicly, and in studying it for this purpose, and then studying the Bible, he had been brought to the truth. He relinquished all his high prospects for Jesus. He was no craven Christi n, and came forth publicly to preach the truth which he had persecuted. Rome was terribly enraged, and published numberless tracts against us, filled not with arguments, but with the vilest calumnies, until the respectable Romanists were ashamed of them, and said these were not arguments at all. Then the most learned and able priest of the Cathedral challenged the preachers of the Gospel to meet him in discussion, and the challenge was gladly accepted. The whole city of Mexico and neighborhood was moved. The great church of San Francisco was prepared for the discussion with two platforms, one for each side. President Juarez asked, as a favor, for reserved seats for himself and family. When the crowds had assembled, the Protestant pastor, at the hour appointed, ascended his platform with the Bible, but the Roman Catholic platform was empty. After that the whole city knew that Rome could not face the Gospel, even after having invited a discussion upon the question at issue. The fame of this affair spread through the country, and people came in from the towns and villages around to get Bibles, and pamphlets, and hymns, and went home to gather little congregations of inquirers after truth. These were persecuted by the Romanists, though we in the capital were as safe as you are here. In one of these towns a priest, in his fury, tore a Bible in the pulpit, and so excited the people against the Protestants that a mob attacked their meeting house, and stoned the men out of the city; but the women kept the meeting up. At last a hundred armed men surrounded the Protestant pastor's house, and when he came to his door he was felled to the ground and fired upon. His wife believed him dead, and fled to a neighboring village to tell how well her husband had died. He, however, had recovered. Upon the false news of a revolution in the capital this chapel was burned, and the congregation again driven away. A force was sent by the President to restore order, and when the priests and their rioters could give no reason for their lawless violence, the commanding officer highly commended the Protestants, and told them they would be protected. They held a prayer-meeting on the ashes of their chapel. There are over fifty Protestant congregations in Mexico, but they are poor and persecuted. The Church of Rome requires its adherents everywhere to discharge all Protestant workmen from their employment, and these are consequently unable to

support missionary efforts."

While we hail with pleasure the efforts of Romanists to shake off the shackles of the Papacy and to expel the dark sons of Loyola, is it not with shame and confusion of face that we see the crafty reptiles permitted to creep into the good old Church at home, and introduce their Romish superstitions for the glorious gospel of the blessed Jesus. And here permit me to give a short extract in illustration from the reply of the Bishop of Manchester (Fraser) to the Romish Bishop Vaughan:—

"He heard the other day—and he heard it with shame and confusion of face—of a church in that diocese in which there had been carried a banner on which was emblazoned the name of 'The Queen of Heaven.' He had heard of a queen of heaven in the Bible, no doubt, but it was Ashtaroth, the moon goddess of the Sidonians, before whom Israel in its idolatry bowed down ignorantly; but in the gospels he heard of no

'Queen of Heaven.' And it filled his heart with shame to think that English clergymen or English congregations would carry in their churches banners emblazoned with the names of the 'Queen of Heaven.'

"Therefore," he said, "while they tried to revive reverence, devotion and piety, and while he congratulated them on having made the church decent and putting their choir in surplices—there was no Popery or superstition in that, it was decent and reverent—he hoped they would not go in search of everything that was practiced in the 13th century, even though there were some things in which they might imitate them."

In our own Province it has pleased our kind Heavenly Father to bless us with another year of peace and prosperity, and the march of our cause is still onward.

No. 991 burnt, has been reissued to the County of Kent. No. 957, South Ontario, has been removed from Duffin's Creek, and is now working in Whitevale.

I have also issued Duplicates of Nos. 188, 412 and 791, city of London, stolen from their Lodge rooms, by order of the M. W. Grand Lodge. From correspondence held with Bros. Wm. Parke, of Galt, and R. H. Armstrong, C. M. of Oxford, I expected applications for Warrants for the Towns of Galt and Ingersoll ere this, and I hope the Brothers will persevere, as more strength is much required in these counties.

Only two Warrants have been sent to me as dormant during the year, viz., No. 899 from Essex, and No. 1162 from Norfolk. In the place of the latter No. 807 has been renewed, with the Rev. Elliott Grassett, M.A., Rec. and R.D., as W.M. No. 1234, Lincoln, is returned on the County report as dormant, but there is a prospect of starting it again in another part of the same County.

Royal Scarlet Dispensations have been issued to the County of Brant and Districts of Barton, Parry Sound, City of London and Orillia.

During the first five years of the existence of this R. W. Grand Lodge, the average number of Lodges which paid their Grand Lodge dues was 373, during the next period of five years 447, and during the last three years 497, or an increase of 124 over the first period. Still there remains a large amount of arrears on your Grand Treasurer's books.

The backwardness of Lodges in making their annual return and remitting their Grand Lodge dues is a great source of annoyance and expense to your executive. And here it is but justice to state that several County Masters make it a point of duty to see that the entire Grand Lodge dues and returns are forwarded in due time, so that forthe remainder of the year the correspondence with any of those Counties has cost your Executive but a trifle; but, on the contrary, in those Counties where there is no system, the dues are paid in a most unsatisfactory manner. I would also call attention to the unsatisfactory manner in which many of the returns are filled, thus rendering it impossible to give anything like a correct estimate of the strength, &c, of our beloved Association in this Province. Many of the Brethren will still persist in sending me the names of members, either suspended or expelled from Private Lodges. They surely cannot have read the Constitution, or Grand Lodge reports, or they would know that all suspensions and expulsions must be confirmed by their respective District and County Lodges, and should accompany the County report to the Provincial Grand Lodge.

There has been a very large correspondence during the year, which is so arranged as to give your Committee as little inconvenience as possible in dealing with it. The delay in issuing the last Annual Report was, in the first place, owing to have to wait for the opinion of counsel in the "Scott Murder," and next of the failure of your Printer. The M. W. Reports, Constitutions, and annual blank returns, &c., were distributed immediately after I received them from the Printer. There has been

District Master, North Kent :-

"Sorry to say some of the Lodges not doing as well as I could wish. No. 1077, 'The Indian Lodge,' doing well, 50 members, all Good Templars, and proud to wear the colors. Had a pleasant excursion to Walpole Island on the glorious 12th."

The District Master of Harwich and Howard (or S. Kent) :-

"The Lodges in my District are increasing in numbers and in good working order."

The District Master of Toronto :-

"We have largely increased both in numbers and respectability. We have now two Halls in the one building at a rental of \$460 per annum, well furnished at a cost of over \$2,000, so that no Orangeman need be ashamed of bringing any gentleman to see them. The two new Lodges are organized, and I think will do well. Our Briton Lodges are also increasing. I opened a new one, the Wm. Johnston, in September,

which makes eight in the city, with three Lodges of True Blues—eleven altogether. And I hope that the Grand Lodge at its next Session in Belleville will make a liberal Constitution for them."

The County Master of Brant :-

"Had a large County Meeting."

The County Master of Elgin :--

"I am happy to inform you that the Order is prospering. No. 563, Avon, has built a fine Hall."

The County Master of Halton :-

"You will observe we have added two new Lodges to the Nelson District; that our members have increased, although a process of weeding out has been undergone by several Lodges which needed it. Our improvement has not been in numbers alone, but in the excellent character, position, and influence of most of the new recruits. Our recent County meeting was the best we have ever had, and to sit there and observe the orderly and able manner in which that magnificent Lodge (made up of the best men and talent of the County), conducted its business was a matter for pride and congratulation, and quite enough to make any man proud of belonging to an Association controlling such an assemblage of men. It is an evident fact that Orange Lodges are contributing greatly to qualify men for Municipal and Legislative positions."

The County Secretary N. Huron:-

"The Order works well, with the exception of getting the returns sent in time. Have 31 Lodges in working order."

The County Master of East Lambton :-

"I have much pleasure in being able to report that the Order in this County is progressing favorably; there are two more warrants working since last report. We had a large meeting at both District and County; brotherly feeling prevailed. Every Lodge has paid their County and Grand Lodge dues. No suspensions nor expulsions."

The County Master West Lambton :-

"I feel pleasure in again furnishing you with the report of West Lambton. We are gaining ground, not so much in numbers as in influence and respectability, yet our number is increasing steadily. No. 1096 shows an increase of 23 members, being now 119. We have also erected a new Orange Hall in the village of Petrolia, costing over \$1,000, which was dedicated on the 20th of November last by Bro. Col. Ogle R. Gowan, P. M. W. G. M., B. A., and to whom we are greatly indebted for the very stirring and excellent address he delivered on that occasion. The District and County meetings were well represented, unity and brotherly love prevailed."

The County Secretary South Ontario :-

"I am happy to inform you that there is a good lively spirit among the members this year, and I am also proud to say that our Lodges are composed of men of respectability, good character, etc."

The County Master of Norfolk :-

"Every Lodge in the County is working well. Orangeism is growing. Never attended a better County meeting." The County M

"In transmitting you the annual returns for this County, I have great pleasure in being able to report an increase of numbers. The County Master of North York and D.G.M. of Ontario West :-

"It is with pleasure that I again send you the County report for the eighth time, and also have much pleasure in remarking the continued prosperity of the cause in the rebel county of North York. I believe the Order in this County never was better. We had large meetings of both District and County, and the best harmony prevailed. Our word is still noward."

The County Master of Wentworth :-

"Herewith please find report of my County for 1872. I take the opportunity of informing you that the Order is still in a prosperous condition. Every Lodge—eleven in number—on the report is in a healthy condition, with a steady increase of membership, representing in the whole County about thirty per cent. over last year. The visit of Bro. William Johnston is bearing fruit. From the Old Country papers, I see he never misses an opportunity of saying a word in favor of Canada. Hoping the future will show a state of prosperity never yet attained."

It is my painful and solemn duty, to have to notice, in this place, the demise of that worthy Brother, George Davis, J.P., for many years the District Master of the large Orange District of Barrie, and who, at the time of his death, held the honorable position of Warden of the large and loyal County of Simcoe. And by late Irish papers of two prominent and staunch Irish Orangemen, Bro. Sir William Verner, Bart., M.P., and the Rev. Daniel Macaffee, the well-known and much-esteemed Wesleyan minister, (the friend and colleague of Dr. Cooke,) whose great work in the cause of Protestantism was his contest with O'Connell.

Having thus briefly noticed some of the matters which will require your attention during the session, I pray that the Almighty Ruler of the Universe will be pleased to bless your proceedings and deliberations in such a way as shall redound to His glory, and the honor, prosperity, and harmony of our beloved Institution.

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APPENDIX B.

The Right Worshipful Grand Master for Western Ontario, deems it expedient that the Bill for the Incorporation of "The Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario," which passed the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, on the 24th March, 1873, but was, subsequently, reserved by the Lieutenant-Governor for the approval of His Excellency the Governor-General, should be published as an Appendix. Owing to this reservation the Bill has not, thus far, become law. It was introduced to Parliament by Brother Herbert S. McDonald, Grand Master of Eastern Ontario, and was bitterly opposed by some Roman Catholic Members.

BILL.

An Act to Incorporate the Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario.

WHEREAS D. A. Boulton, F. H. Medcalf, James B. Davis, Ogle R. Gowan and Alfred Medcalf, Members of the Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario have, by their petition, prayed that the members of the said association may be incorporated by the name of "The Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario," and it is expedient to grantthe prayer of the said petition:

Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

- 1. The said D. A. Boulton, F. H. Medcalf, James B. Davis, Ogle R. Gowan and Alfred Medcalf, and all other persons who are now or may hereafter become members of the Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario shall be, and they are hereby incorporated, by the name of "The Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario."
- 2. The said "The Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario" shall be capable of taking, holding, conveying, and selling real estate, property, moneys and securities, for the use and benefit of the said association, or any lodge of the said association, according to such by-laws, rules and regulations as the Grand Lodge of the said Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario shall from time to time prescribe and adopt: Provided that such rules, orders and regulations are not contrary to this Act, nor to the laws in force in this Province, and also, provided always, and it is enacted that the said corporation shall at no time

- 7. It shall be the required by the Legistreal or immovable presuch details thereof:

acquire or hold as purchasers, any lands or tenements, or interests therein, exceeding in whole at any one time, the annual value of five thousand dollars, nor otherwise than for their actual use or occupation, for the purposes of the said corporation ; and it is further enacted that the said corporation may by the name aforesaid, from time to time, take or hold by gift, devise or bequest, any lands or tenements, or interests therein if such gift, devise or bequest be made at least six months before the death of the person making the same; but the said corporation shall at no time take or hold by any gift, devise or bequest, so as that the annual value of any lands or tenements, or interests therein, so to be taken or held by gift, devise or bequest, shall at any one time in the whole exceed the annual value of one thousand dollars; and no lands or tenements, or interest therein, acquired by gift, devise or bequest, shall he held by the said corporation for a longer period than seven years after the acquisition thereof; and within such period they shall respectively be absolutely disposed of by the said corporation, so that it no longer retain any interest therein, and the proceeds on such disposition shall be invested in public securities, municipal debentures, or other approved securities, not including mortgages, for the use of the said corporation; and such lands, tenements, or interest therein, or such thereof which may not within the said period have been so disposed of, shall revert to the person to whom the same was acquired, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns.

3. All real estate and property held at the time of the passing of this Act in any manner whatever, by, or in trust for any lodge of The Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario, shall be, and is hereby declared to be vested in the said "The Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario," without any deed, conveyance or assurance, but for the use and benefit of the said lodges, for which it was held at the time of the passing of this Act.

4. It shall be lawful for any person or persons in whom, or in whose name or names any lands, tenements and hereditaments, are now, or shall or may be hereafter vested in trust or otherwise, for the benefit of the said The Loyal Orange Association of Western Ontario from time to time, to convey, assign, or transfer by deed, under his or their hands and seals, in the usual legal way, all or any of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, unto the said corporation and their successors, for the purposes aforesaid, as provided by this Act.

5. Nothing herein contained shall affect, or be construed to affect in any manner or way, the rights of Her Majesty, her heirs, or successors, or of any person or persons, or of any body politic or corporate, such only excepted as are herein mentioned and provided for.

6. Notwithstanding anything herein contained, the said corporation shall at no time take, acquire or hold, or be competent to take, acquire or hold, any real estate, or interest therein, exceeding the annual value of five thousand dollars, under any of the provisions herein contained, or otherwise.

7. It shall be the duty of the said corporation, when thereunto required by the Legislature, to lay before that body a statement of the real or immovable property or estates, held by virtue of this Act, and such details thereof as the Legislature may require.
