From the Provincial Patriot.

Personal and Political Sketch of the Members
of the House of Assembly of N. B.,
as we find them in 1853.

CAPTAIN J. J. ROBINSON.

This Gentleman is one of the Charlotte
County Representatives—is son-in-law of
Admiral Owen, resides at Campbellville, is
Captain in Her Majesty's Royal Navy, and
considered possessor of a very handsome for-
tune. In personal appearance, is of short
stature, firmly built, muscular, and agile—
with a certain freedom of action, sea-faring
carelessness, and "devil-may-care" sprightli-
ness about him, that plainly enough bespeaks
him one of the "Sons of the Ocean." With
his abidance on the quarter deck of a British
man-of-war, we have nothing to do—it is
only as a Legislator of New Brunswick, and
for the County of Charlotte, that we have to
regard him. Accordingly, in debate, Capt.
Robinson speaks with difficulty, laboring un-
der some natural impediment, seemingly, and
yet it is neither stammering nor stunting.
It may be from a desire to deliver himself as
soon as possible—if that be the cause it seri-
ously indicates against the intention. His
speeches may certainly be in many of a war-
style—open and above board, but they are
far from statesmanlike—his action is some-
times vehement, and very frequently he evi-
nces a warmth of temper when opposed, in-
dicative of one who loves to command. His
love for England, English Institutions, and
English Laws appears to be sincerely cher-
ished. He glories in them, and the intro-
duction of any political measure in this coun-
try, not in strict accordance with the well un-
derstood sense of the Home Government, would find in Capt. Robinson an unflinching
antagonist. He considers vote by ballot a
most vicious, and treats the subject with
contemptuous scorn. Notwithstanding Capt.
Robinson's acknowledged Conservative predi-
cations, he always evinces in the Legisla-
ture a warm interest in the prosperity of the
Province, and particularly in that of the
County he represents—the St. Andrews and
Quebec Districts receives his zealous sup-
port, and the Fishery question finds him
equally ready to combat the dispute for the
good of the Province in particular and North
American Colonies generally. Capt. Robin-
son appears as independent in principle as
he is in purse, and would never barter his
nobility of soul for a "mess of pottage."

JAMES BOYD.

This gentleman is a Representative of
Charlotte County—arrived in this Province
from Halifax, Nova Scotia, in 1813, during
the American War, served the same year in
the embodied militia of N. B. Brunswick.
Whether he entered the ranks as Private or
Subaltern we cannot say; however, the fact
that he holds the rank of Colonel in the New
Brunswick militia at the present time, is suf-
ficient to justify us in recording in our opin-
ion, that Mr. Boyd has proved himself an
effective Militia Soldier. In personal ap-
pearance this gentleman is, in stature, above
the common standard—well proportioned—
in body and limb, and wearing a frank, manly
countenance. His hair is dark, complexion
flourid, and appears about sixty years of age.
By reference to authority before us we find
him a member of the House of Assembly in
1839, for the same County which he still re-
presents, and has for the last 14 years, with
the exception of last time on account of two
Scrutinies, through both of which he passed
successfully—the last one, which closed last
winter, is celebrated throughout the Province,
we may say Province. It commenced in
1851 and ended in 1853, and the expense
incurred by the rival candidates—Messrs.
Fitzgerald and Boyd, must have been enor-
mous while the time occupied by sitting
committees at the Legislature, allowing three
dollars per diem to each member, besides con-
tingencies, must have cost the people of the
Province no mean sum. Perhaps the amount
expended on this notorious scrutiny case,
would have made a railroad from St. An-
drews to Chamcook! In debate Mr. Boyd
evinces no pretension to oratory—his action
is dignified enough, being unaffected and
natural; his speeches are generally brief, and
noted rather for common sense logic, than the
graces of eloquence—he is a stubborn ad-
vocate for any case he takes in hand—and
never beats a retreat from the ground he oc-
cupies until fairly overpowered by numbers, or
out-generalled by superior political stratagem.
As this gentleman's votes on important sub-
jects will be classed with those of others, in a
condensed and methodical form, we omit
them here. However, we may just observe,
that as Mr. Boyd has served the County of
Charlotte 14 years, he must be well known
to his constituents and they to him. Res-
pecting the abominable looting which was
carried on last winter among the Members,
Mr. Boyd must certainly be quite innocent,
as he did not take his seat until near the close
of the Session—and even so, we believe he
always carries his own "Saff-bag."

WILLIAM PORTER.

This gentleman is also a Representative
for Charlotte County, having been elected to
that important and responsible situation in
1816. In personal appearance Mr. Porter
is far from homely; he is neither tall nor
short, but has a slight inclination to corpulent
roundness; his face wears the hue of health,
indicative of being no stranger to the blessings
of *cornucopia*. His nose is slightly
aquiline, approaching to what might be
termed "Roman." His mouth is small,
and rather pretty; his eyes are dark, but
too small to be considered handsome; his
hair is black, tho' thinly sprinkled with the
colour of the venerable; and yet Mr. Porter
is not far advanced in life; at least not of
an age to militate against his usefulness in
any way in which he may feel qualified to
engage. In debate, as a politician, Mr. Porter
displays no affected pretension to oratory;
his own good sense has taught him that na-
ture has not bestowed upon him the neces-
sary qualifications for a fluent and graceful
speaker; hence Mr. Porter, in the Legisla-
tive Assembly, speaks seldom and briefly.
His voice too, is rather low, and his enun-
ciation difficult for a Reporter's ear to catch
satisfactorily. In debate, this Member dis-
plays, sometimes, much warmth of temper;
he cannot brook opposition, and it may be
owing to this constitutional impetuosity, that
Mr. Porter utters what he does say, almost
unintelligible to a listener in the gallery.—
Mr. Porter, as a Member for Charlotte,
evinces a very warm heart; and should he
even err—which he may—(for who is fault-
less?) his constituents should, with becom-
ing charity, attribute it to error of judgment,
rather than intention. Mr. Porter's votes on
particular political measures, will appear in
due course of time.

DOCTOR ROBERT THOMSON.

This gentleman is a Representative of the
County Charlotte—in stature, is somewhat
taller than the common height, and propor-
tionally moulded. Is an Irishman by birth,
and physician by profession; possesses much
originality, and is an acknowledged scholar;
so far indeed are his literary attainments
respected, that even in the House of Assem-
bly, he is generally termed—"The Learned
Doctor." Doctor Thomson was returned
by Charlotte County in 1842. Since which
period he has represented his constituents.
Eleven years is no mean servitude. The
Doctor's features are neither handsome nor
homely. His eyes are small, but very bright
piercing, and a certain playfulness of expres-
sion lurks continually about his mouth. His
nose is long and aquiline, and his forehead
just the thing to suit a phrenologist. Before
we close our description of the Doctor's per-
sonal appearance, we cannot help regretting
that his admiration for the fair and gentle
sex never preponderated over his aversion
to wedlock; especially as his offspring,
doubtless, would have largely partaken of
their Pa's characteristics. Doctor Thomson
is a man still in the prime of life—his form
is erect, his step firm, and his abilities of
body and mind unimpaired. In debate, the
Doctor is a subtle reasoner—close, sound,
and logical—and he never fails to spice his
speech with such a sprinkling of wit and
humour as generally creates a hearty laugh.
His delivery is neither fluent nor felicitous,
and yet the Doctor always commands atten-
tion—the rich originality, so characteristic
of Irishmen, dwells largely in the Doctor;
and he never spares the expression of a joke
—tell on whom it may. In Politics, the
Doctor is a conservative to the backbone;
what the County calls "reform," he con-
sidering an innovation—*à voté by ballot*, he
despises—the creed of the Mother Country
is his political attribute; and yet no warmer
friend sits in the House for any County, than
does the Doctor for Charlotte. Should the
Doctor be charged with faults, political ones
we mean, he has many redeeming qualities
—among them, a sense of honor too high to
descend so low as to pilfer from the Pro-
vince, jewelry or stationery! And, *ergo*,
would pledge our existence, that Doctor
Thomson did not take the lady's ring.

SINGULAR DISCOVERY.

There is nothing new under the sun—
The American coffin which attracted so much
attention at the Great Exhibition of 1851,
and which, by producing the vacuum by
means of the air pump, was thought to be an
entirely new method of preserving corpses
from decay, has been just proved to have been
known in the middle ages. While demol-
ishing a short time ago, the old church of the
ancient Welch College at Helmsfield, near
Brunswick, a coffin made of lead the lid of
which was of glass of immense thickness,
contained the body of a young girl apparently
about twelve years of age, which still preserv-
ed every appearance of youth and freshness,
although the coffin bore the date of 1161—
A private letter from a bystander tells us
that—
"The face and figure of the child were

perfect as in life, not a single sign of decay
being visible throughout the whole person.—
The cheek preserved its delicate rose tint—
the forehead its snowy whiteness. The hair,
which was of a beautiful gold color, was
parted on the brow, and fell in long ringlets
over the bosom, crisp and fresh as though
the child had laid down to sleep the moment
before. The dress of white satin embroidered
in gold flowers, the shoes of white velvet,
the lace apron, all seemed bright as if newly
purchased; and more astonishing still the
bunch of lilies held in the hand of the corpse
still looked as fresh and moist as though she
were still hung upon it. The workmen en-
gaged in the demolition of the building were
in the town, and immediately went in
quest of the ghost-magistrate of the place,
who soon arrived on the spot, accompanied
by several of the inhabitants. Unfortunately,
the worthy functionary having recently
been made the victim of a practical joke in
the town, and being half suspicious of the
same thing was intended, would not believe
in the reality, and, seizing a spade from the
hand of one of the workmen who stood near
him, dealt a heavy blow upon the lid of the coffin,
and smashed one of two of the diamond shaped
panes of glass of which it was composed.
In a moment, and while we yet gazed, a thin
cloud of dust or vapor, like a wreath of
smoke, rose up from the coffin and, dimmed
the sight, veiling the corpse from our view.
When it had disappeared, we gazed down
wards in awe; nothing remained of what
had struck us with so much interest and won-
der; all had vanished, and left naught be-
hind but a heap of discolored dust a few
rags of tinsel, and one or two dry bones!"

The rage and despair of H-tr W—, the
great antiquary and savant of the place,
knew no bounds. He did his best to collect
the fragments that remained, and that same
evening the coffin was conveyed to Brun-
swick where it will no doubt form one of the
greatest ornaments of the museum. There
appears no doubt that the high preservation
of the corpse had been produced by the ab-
straction of all air from the coffin; and it is
supposed that the child belonged to some
great Professor of the University, who had
performed the experiment in secret; as it is
curious that, amid all the pains and care con-
cerning the body of the child, no means
should have been taken to preserve her name
from oblivion. No name is engraved upon
the coffin, not even her initials—nothing but
the date of the year in which she died or
was buried (1461)—London Atlas.

A HINT TO FARMERS.

The Maine Farmer gives the following
pertinent paragraph on the importance of the
proper care of stock:
We may send to England for Durham
cows, or to Spain or Saxony for the choicest
sheep; we may search the world over for
cattle that please the eye; but unless they
receive the best care and liberal feeding, they
will most assuredly deteriorate and eventu-
ally become as worthless and unworthy of
propagation as any of the skeleton breeds
that now haunt our rich but neglected pas-
ture lands. We remember, an anecdote in
point, and will relate it by way of illustration.
A farmer having purchased a cow from a
country abounding in the richest pasturage,
upon taking her to his own inferior pastures,
found that she fell short of the yield which
he was informed she was accustomed to give.
He complained to the gentleman of whom he
had purchased that the cow was not the one
he had bargained for, or, in other words, that
she was not what she was "cracked up to be."
"Why," said the seller, "I sold you my cow
but did not sell you my pasture too."

The above, which we cut from an exchange
reminds us of the reply which a shrewd old
farmer, whom we knew many years ago,
made to one of his neighbours in raising—
Shortly after, meeting the old gentleman re-
ferred to, he says, "Well, Mr. Sweetest, I'm
going to beat you in raising hogs this year.
I have got some of J. M.—'s breed."
"A-h-h," drawled out the old man, "you'd
better get the breed of his hog trough!"

SENSIBLE REMARK.—The Revd. Henry
Ward Beecher in his remarks at the anni-
versary of the Five Points Mission said:—

"When Christ went where there were
sick; He healed them; where there was ac-
tual want, He created bread, and came down
to their physical condition. Take the gos-
pel to the miserable outcasts of our city, and
no man can preach it, unless he does more.
It is as though he made a mark in the sand,
and the first tide washes it away. Preach
the Gospel, and the hunger of the man makes
him forget it. There is a great deal more
Gospel in a loaf of bread sometimes, than in
an old dry sermon. If I go to a man and
bring to him his want ever so much philo-
sophy, he will not hear it; if I come down
to him and bring him bread, and clothes and
medicine, this will give him a correct idea
of the Gospel—one which he can appreciate
and understand."

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.—A delibera-
tive body goes into committee of the whole,
when it suspends the rules of order for the
purpose of allowing unlimited debate on
some subject which it is deemed requisite to
discuss, without restraint. The motion to
"go into committee of the whole" upon the
state of the Union," was frequently acted on
during the debates on the Constitution of the
United States, when it became necessary to
debate all sorts of questions touching the
welfare of the country. In committee of
the whole the House is changed in charac-
ter—it is transformed into a committee subor-
dinate to the House proper. The House
becomes a committee that comprises every
member of the House, and as such reports
back its proceedings to the House for final
action. The debates assume great latitude,
as anything seems to be in order. When
the members of Congress wish to indulge in
long Buncombe speeches on everything else
save the particular business which their con-
stituents sent them to perform, they move
that "we go into committee of the whole
on the state of the Union." [New York Sun-
day Times.

The Ministers in these days do just about
what their parishioners desire; but a centu-
ry or so ago the minister was a law for him-
self, and no one dared to question his right.
In looking over the report of the celebra-
tion of the two hundredth anniversary of the
settlement of the town of Lancaster, Mass.,
which occurred on the 15th ult., we were
somewhat amused with the following remarks
of the Rev. Mr. Sears in regard to the for-
mer ministers of that town:—"He spoke
feelingly of them, both of their virtues and
their faults. Rev. Mr. Harrington, one of
their number, excommunicated a member
from his church for having criticised one of
his sermons. He refused to baptise children
born on Sunday, for he said they broke the
Sabbath in their very birth. But it happen-
ed that he had a child born to him on Sun-
day, and after that he relaxed the rigor of
his views on the subject. But with all their
love of power, they were good and holy
men."

WARNING TO TRAVELLERS.—We regret
that it should be our duty to warn travellers
against the dishonesty of parties frequenting
our principal hotels. We find that, on Fri-
day last, at the St. Lawrence Hall, Captain
Bordmore's room was entered, and a bag
containing some £50 currency, in British
and American gold pieces, besides some ar-
ticles of jewelry, was stolen. In the same
house, Capt. J. W. Allan, a gentleman from
the United States, on the following night,
was robbed of ninety dollars from his room.
At the Quawa House, too, Mr. Samuel J.
Days, of Springfield, Mass., his room was
entered, and \$400 in money abstracted; and
another room occupied by Messrs. Geo.
Lyon and Hon. A. Allan, was also entered
and \$40 in money taken. One person is,
we understand, in custody on suspicion of
being the robber at the Ottawa Hotel. Trav-
ellers should be careful in locking the doors

THE LARGEST RAILWAY IN THE WORLD.
—The largest railway in the world will
shortly be possessed by Canada. That branch
of it which is opened this morning from
hence to Portland, is, comparatively, but a
small portion of the whole. Preliminary to
the payment of the dividend, which during
the week has rejoiced the hearts of the stock-
holders, who have either been fortunate
enough to hold on to their original stock or
to have become possessed of stock by pur-
chase, the definite arrangement was made
for the amalgamation of the following lines:
The Grand Trunk Railway, or that road,
which was to connect Montreal with King-
ston; the Toronto and Guelph Road; the
St. Lawrence and Atlantic Road; the Grand
Trunk Railroad of Canada East, or that
road which is intended to connect Quebec

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with Trois Pistoles; and, lastly, the At-
lantic and St. Lawrence Railroad, or that
portion of the road hence to Portland, which
lies in the territories of the United States.—
The Grand Trunk Company have not be-
come possessed of the fee simple of the lat-
ter road; but they have got what, accord-
ing to the old English saying is as good as a
freeholder—a ninety nine years lease, at a
rent calculated at 6 per cent. on the outlay
incurred by the American Company amount-
ing to some \$5,000,000. On the 18th inst.
it is expected that the arrangements for in-
corporating the Richmond and Quebec
Railroad with the rest will also be conclud-
ed. When that shall have taken place, there
will be under one management—finished in
rapid progress or about to be begun—the
immense extent of eleven hundred and
twelve miles of railroad. We imagine that
the first portion of the road now opened
must be secure of an enormous passenger
traffic, passing as it does through the most
romantic scenery from the St. Lawrence to
the sea.—[Ib.

DEMOLITION OF BROOK'S MONUMENT.—The
Rochester Daily American published the
following letter, dated on Monday, on board
the steamer Ontario:—

Dear Sir:—The celebrated land mark
on Queensston Heights, erected in memory of
Sir Isaac Brock, who fell on that field Oct.
13, 1812, was on Saturday felled to the
ground. An ineffectual attempt had been
made to blow it up the day before. It was
found necessary to use a second blast, which
shivered the shaft to atoms.

It was not done by hostile hands, but by
direction of the British Government, who
will erect a new and beautiful monument in
its place.

The remains of General Brock were first
interred at Fort George, with those of Lieut
Alec Campbell, Capt. McDonald, October 16,
1812, and placed in the vault under the mon-
ument, Oct. 13, 1824. The remains are
now in the vault of the Hamilton family, at
Queensston, and will be removed to the new
monument when ready.

count of an engagement between a box
costructor and a crocodile in Jara, is given by
an eye witness:

It was one morning that I stood beside
a small lake, fed by one of the rills from the
mountain. The waters were clear as crystal,
and everything could be seen to the very
bottom. Stretching its limbs close over this
pond was a gigantic teak tree, and in its thick
shining, evergreen leaves lay a huge box,
in an easy coil, taking its morning nap. Above
him was a powerful ape of the baboon spe-
cies, a learing race of scamps, always bent
on mischief.

Now the ape from his position saw a cro-
codile in the water, rising to the top, exactly
beneath the coil of the serpent. Quick as
thought he jumped plump upon the snake,
which fell with in the jaws of the crocodile.
The ape saved himself by clinging to a limb
of the tree, but a battle royal immediately
commenced in the water. The serpent
grasped in the middle by the crocodile, made
the water boil by his furious contortions.—
Winning his fold round the body of his an-
tagonist he disabled his two hinder legs, and
by his contractions made the scales and bones
of the monster crack.

The water was speedily tinged with the
blood of both combatants, yet neither was dis-
posed to yield. They rolled over and over,
neither being able to obtain a decided advan-
tage. At this time the cause of the mis-
chief was in a state of the highest ecstacy.
At the end of ten minutes a silence began to
come over the scene; the folds of the serpent
began to be relaxed, and though they were
troubling along the back, the head hung
lifeless in the water.

European Intelligence.

The steamer Niagara arrived at Halifax on Thursday morning last, with 115 passengers and Liverpool dates to 23d July.

The Sarah Sands sailed from Liverpool on the 21st, 22d passengers for Quebec.

It will be seen that the news from the East is of a more pacific nature, and the chances are that there will be no war.

It was generally reported that Lord Palmerston would again take the Foreign Office, Earl Clarendon exchanging for Home Department.

The Government stated that a few days would terminate negotiations respecting the Turkish question, which would be published, whether successful or not.

Earl Portsmouth is dead.

The Queen's family is sick with the measles.

Parliamentary proceedings chiefly of a local character.

Lord John Russell replied to Lord Dudley Stewart, that he doubted if owners of British vessels abroad in the Danube, had any claim upon Russia for neglect to keep the navigation open.

Mr. Layard attempted to bring on a discussion, but was prevented.

The Russian Question.—There is no doubt that the reception given by the Cabinet of St. Petersburg to the first proposition from the Powers, was so favourable as to warrant an expectation that the question in dispute will be settled without further delay.

The Russian Chancellor is said to have declared to the French Ambassador that the Czar welcomed the arrangement held out for his acceptance—the only motive supposed to cause further delay, was the necessity of obtaining the assent of Austria, which consent is now supposed to be on the way to St. Petersburg. If the French proposal is the one ultimately adopted, it is a note formed by the French Government as a medium between the demands of Menshikoff, and the terms offered by Relschid Pacha.

It is difficult to say if the following important statement be premature, but it has had a bad effect on public feeling it came by telegraph 20th July, from St. Petersburg. The Czar has accepted the proposals offered by France and England. This news was reported to have been brought by steamer from St. Petersburg to Stettin, thence published in Berlin and Dresden, and telegraphed to Paris and London where it much improved the funds.

From Vienna it was also telegraphed, to London under date Constantinople, 11th. A conciliatory note just issued by Relschid Pacha is considered of a nature to bring negotiations at once to a conclusion. The feeling among commercial men is decidedly favourable.

The English and French fleets are still at Besika Bay.

The Sovereign of the seas is up for Australia. The Great Britain undertakes to reach Melbourne in 65 days from Liverpool, or for 40s per ton freight.

France.—It was currently reported that the delicate condition of the Empress required postponement of contemplated visit to Pyrenees. Good deal of gossip on the subject.

The French Press consider the Eastern difficulty as about over.

The number of arrests consequent upon the supposed conspiracy discovered at the Opera Comique, is now over 200.

Al. Arrago is said that his life is despaired of.

GERMANY.—The Bavarian Government announces that a World's Exhibition will be held at Munich next year.

SWITZERLAND.—The Austrian Blockade of Ticinese frontier is vigorous as ever, although some few of the expelled citizens had been permitted to return to harvest their crops, there being a deficiency of field labor.

PAUSIA.—The king has issued a proclamation that he will dismiss from the service any officer, who, marrying a Roman Catholic, shall bring up his children in that faith. This is intended as a protest against recent Papal encroachments.

ITALY.—A despatch from Milan, dated 17th, states Austrian Police are on trail, of a projected insurrection in Central Italy.

The house of the London Times' Correspondent was visited, and some arrests of Italians took place. Recently a band of Hungarian prisoners filling 17 cars, were taken into Pesth—crimes unknown.

TURKEY.—Conspiracy discovered among the Immans, students to assassinate the Sultan and proclaim his brother. Fifteen were bow strung. War party much incensed against pacific policy of Ministry. Difficulty existed in keeping the troops from committing some outbreak in their arduous against the Russians.

A rumour was circulated that the American Minister at Constantinople had addressed a note to Mr. Pasha, stating that the United States would cooperate with the other powers to support Turkish integrity, and would henceforth claim a voice in the affairs of Europe. Disbelieved, however.

CHINA.—China papers report capture of Nankin by the insurgents.

AUSTRALIA.—Dates to 21st April. Mining generally prosperous. Imports wanted prices ruled high.

SULPHATE OF ZINC.—A correspondent of the "New-England Farmer," who was formerly a practitioner of medicine, makes some very interesting and useful remarks about the sulphate of zinc in solution as a wash for horses, cattle, sheep, &c. He asserts that it is excellent for sore teats in milch cows, and mentions a few cases where its application was at once effectual and permanent.

For washing all kinds of wounds and sores, we believe sulphate of zinc will be found to possess virtue by those who use it, superior

to any solution with which we are acquainted. We have been acquainted for a number of years with its useful properties for inflammation of the eye, for which a very weak solution should be used, and also for washing all kinds of sores.

RAILWAYS.—We notice in one of our exchanges, (the Montreal Sun,) an ably written article, showing that the St. Andrews & Quebec Railway, offers advantages to Canada which no other line intended to reach the sea through British territory, can pretend to equal; and urging upon the enterprising people of Montreal the necessity of immediate action, in order that they may secure the carrying trade now enjoyed by the United States. It proves clearly and conclusively, that all the people of Canada have to do, is to build a line of railway 90 miles to meet the St. Andrews line at the Grand Falls, and when that is done, they will have a seaport of their own, "as near to Quebec by rail, as Portland is to Montreal," and without degrading the Atlantic & St. Lawrence Railway, which he supposes before long will have an abundant and remunerative through traffic—the Editor states his conviction, "that for the purpose of conveying Canadian products to the lumbering districts of Maine itself, and to a great part of Nova Scotia, the Portland road could not come into successful competition with the St. Andrews & Quebec, if both were in operation." Want of time prevents our giving the article from the Sun this week, but we will endeavour to find a place for it in our next number.

A PAYING CONCERN.—The "St. Stephen's Bank" for seventeen years past, has paid from 8 to 9 per cent. annually, and has never failed in declaring a dividend. Within the last six months the same bank has declared a regular dividend of 5 per cent.—a bonus of 20 per cent., and extra dividend of 4 per cent.—Has any bank in the North American Provinces equalled this? We think not. No wonder then that it is called "a paying concern" and that at the sale of increased capital stock on the 3d inst., it was sold from 10 to 13 per cent. premium.

The Freeman, noticing a small paragraph in our last number, in which we stated that a new Government cannot, or will not be formed without three at least of the present Executive, says:

"The opinion of the Standard, as to the merits of the Government, may go for what it is worth, but we should like to know who the three indispensable are?"

We have not claimed to be an "organ" of the Government, or to be the recipient of even one secret. And, as to our "opinion," the very clever Freeman will yet learn that it is worth something, and that some parties he has thought proper at different times to attack (in our "opinion" unwarrantably) will be leading Members of the new Government.

The Provincial Patriot says:—"We hear one or two have said the Patriot must be stopped." What! leave a flourishing town like St. Stephens without a paper. It must be an electioneering joke: the Patriot can well afford to laugh at such nonsense.

Whoever said so, cannot know its Editor and Proprietor, or the extent of its circulation. Although the paper is but three months old, we think that a hundred or two such subscribers might be spared from its large list.

It is with regret we learn, that during the week several fields of potatoes in this neighborhood have been attacked by the blight, commonly known as the Potatoe disease.

Farmers from the upper Parishes, however, state, that no symptoms of the disease have appeared, and that the crop will be an abundant one.

LARGE GOOSEBERRIES.—We were presented by Mr. John Little, with some gooseberries raised in his garden in town, from a bush only transplanted this season, which for weight and size certainly excel any thing of the kind we ever saw or heard of.

Eight of these gooseberries weighed a quarter of a pound, averaging half an ounce each, and measured three inches and a half in circumference. The weight and size are as

correct as proved scales and just measurement could give them.

We have received the first No. of a new paper published in St. John by Ross Woodrow & Co., called the "British Constitution." It is a large paper and makes a very respectable appearance.

On our first page will be found a "Personal and Political" sketch of the Members from Charlotte, drawn by the Editor of the Patriot. We have not had an opportunity of seeing our present Representatives, in the House of Assembly—but we believe that our contemporary has given his view of them without bias—please or displease whom it may.

TEMPERANCE POLITICS.—A League has been formed in New Jersey, the members of which are pledged to use "all legitimate and honourable means to effect the legal prohibition" of the liquor traffic; to be satisfied with nothing short of a complete outlawry of the traffic; and to vote for no man as legislator who is not pledged to its suppression.

We regret to learn that the weevil has attacked the wheat in many places in this County. It is not known yet what the extent of the injury may be, but it is feared from the sudden and general attack throughout the fields where it has been discovered that serious damage will be done.

The weather continues dry and warm, and if the hay crop is not as heavy as usual, the excellent order in which it is put up will make it of more value and go further than a much larger quantity put up in catching weather, or what is called half-bleached.

Other crops promise well.—(Charlotte Sentinel.)

On Monday young McGlynn and a son of Jedediah Jewett were riding in a wagon, when a loaded gun in the hands of McGlynn was accidentally discharged, and the contents of the gun, lodged in the thigh of Jewett. The boy suffered considerably, but is not considered dangerously wounded.

This should be a warning to parents not to allow children the use of fire arms until they understand how to use them. Had this shot taken effect in the body of the boy, it would in all probability have killed him on the spot.

RAILWAY CELEBRATION.—The Directors of the European and North American Railway Company, met together on Friday evening, and agreed to have the opening celebration on the turning of the 1st sod on the 14th September. Messrs. Jackson, Bates and Stephenson, (the great engineers) will be present. All the trades, societies, engine companies, are expected to turn out. There will be a grand ball in the evening. On the day following it is thought a public dinner will be given to Mr. Jackson, by the Amateurs of St. John. The first sod is to be turned up in the valley overlooked by Mr. Hazen's castle. The labourers are to commence work in earnest this day at Shediac on the branch line.—(Morning News.)

STRIKE OF WOMEN LABOURERS.—A late English paper says that the Women of Stokesley, Yorkshire, who go out to field work (weeding, spreading manure, pulling turnips, &c.) recently struck for an increase of wages. They sent a circular round to announce that instead of receiving 8d. a day they should require 10d. And we trust that they will get it. There would be some sense in getting up a Convocation of the Women of England in behalf of Woman's Rights.

In Central America, a large number of black Hebrews have been discovered. Near every family has the law of Moses on parchment. They trace their origin to the first captivity, when some of the Hebrews fled to the desert, and intermarried with the natives.

NEW LIGHT ON THE OLD HEAD OF KINSALE SOUTH COAST OF IRELAND.—Ballast Office, Dublin 16th June, 1853.—A lighthouse has been erected on the south Point of the Old Head of Kinsale, from which a light will be exhibited on the 1st of October, and thereafter will be lighted during every night from sunset to sunrise.

The light will be a fixed bright light, similar to that heretofore shown from the Old Lighthouse. It will be elevated 236 feet above the level of the high water spring tides illuminating an arc from N. E. to N. W. by N. and in clear weather will be visible at the distance of 21 miles.

Three well dressed men, two with bits in their mouths, driven by the third passed up Broadway, New York, one day last week followed by a rabble, and exciting much wonderment. The harness pair were driven into the bar of the Astor House, where they were lassoed, the bits being taken from their mouths that they might drink. The disgusting exhibition was the result of a foolish bet.

FROM BRITISH GUIANA.—The Chinese Emigrants.—The Gazette of July 7th, after

speaking of a rumor which had reached Georgetown, that the Lucknow, bound from China with Coolies, had been set on fire by the Chinese, who first murdered the officers and crew, and then fired the vessel, themselves escaping in boats, says that the immigration from China is too expensive ever to be beneficial to the country, and that the majority of those sent are the offscourings of a crowded population. At Trinidad there had been several contests between the Overseers and the Chinnamen, in consequence of the irascible tempers of the latter.

The Gazette contains a long article on the continuance of the slave trade on the coast of Cuba, in which the position is set down that if Cuba is allowed quietly to continue this crime, the British West India Islands must go to the wall, for they cannot compete with her in the production of sugar, and other articles, employing Chinese Coolies, imported at great expense, working for not as they choose, receiving liberal pay and extravagant allowances; while the African slave, whatever their original cost, are compelled under the whip's end to give continuous labor.

Walking liquor barrels would have been more appropriate: they do not deserve the name of men; and yet, Sir, I regret to say, some such persons may be found even in this small community, and if necessary I could give very recent instances where these unfortunate persons have, by their misrepresentation, actually benefited those they sought (assassin-like) "to stab in the back."

How faithfully they fulfil the old saying—"as they grow old they grow foolish."

ONE WHO KNOWS.

Escape of three Prisoners from Jail.—On yesterday morning, about 7 o'clock, it was discovered that three of the prisoners who were in jail awaiting trial at the Circuit Court, now sitting, had escaped. These were Andrew Brown, an American, charged with uttering counterfeit notes; Patrick McQuade, charged with burglary; and James Barry, a boy who got a number of jugs, &c. some time since under false pretences. The three were confined in the same cell.

Through this ran, close to the floor, a large pipe belonging to the heating apparatus, and two smaller pipes. They, by some means, got a leg off one of the iron bedsteads, and this serving as a capital crow bar they, with little difficulty, removed some eight or ten bricks from the wall (which is 14 inches thick) and were thus enabled to pass into the next cell, one of those known as the condemned cells, the doors of which, when there are no occupants for them, generally stand open for the purpose of ventilation.

The doors of these cells open on a small passage, at the end of which is a massive iron door, but this also stood open. Having once, therefore, got out of their own cell, there was nothing to prevent their getting into the large hall on which all these lower cells open. The jailer, (Mr. Creighton,) went in the morning, about 6 o'clock, on his usual rounds, and there being no lock of the inside of the door from the inside main hall to the outer, he merely closed this after him and went up stairs to examine the debtors' cells, &c. It is thought that the prisoners seized this opportunity, as it only required a few moments to pass from their cell into the hall, and that they quietly walked out by the main entrance.

The Sheriff has offered a reward of \$250 for the apprehension of Brown and \$100 each for the other two. Brown, from the first, showed an extraordinary degree of coolness. When first arrested and taken to the Watch House, he asked for cigars in order that they might quietly discuss the matter, and no doubt the escape was planned by him. McQuade, by his experience in house-breaking, was well qualified to be his assistant. It was said that McQuade was seen in the City some hours after their escape.

The telegraph was put in requisition, as it was thought that Brown left by the Admiral at 8 o'clock, but it is hardly probable that he would venture so far, as he was well known to Captain Wood, who was present when first arrested.—(St. John Freeman.)

SAD ACCIDENT.—Yesterday a little boy, about 8 years of age, son to a man named Beamish, while running after a cart, which was going at a fast pace, in Brussels street, slipped and his arm getting between the nave of the wheel and body of the cart was dreadfully mangled. The flesh and muscles were torn from the bones, from the shoulder to the fingers ends, the bone of the fore arm crushed to pieces, and the other bones broken. Drs. Boyd, Travers and Jarvis saw the child soon after and determined that amputation was unavoidable. Chloroform was administered with excellent effect and the limb was taken off at the shoulder joint by Dr. Travers, assisted by the other gentlemen. This, which is a much more delicate and difficult operation than amputation in the ordinary way, was rendered necessary by the nature of the arm. The poor child is now doing well, and his life will probably be saved.—[lb.]

We (Bangor Whig) received the following letter yesterday, from a respectable gentleman now at Houlton, giving the particulars of an arrest for a murder, supposed to

have been committed in the neighbourhood of Houlton, about two years since:—

Houlton, Me., July 22, 1853.

SINGULAR DISCOVERY OF A MURDER!—Sheriff Herfing arrested to-day a Mr. Gulliver, for the murder of a Mr. Cogswell, said to have been committed two years since, while making shingles somewhere in this vicinity. Gulliver boarded in the family of Cogswell, and Mrs. Cogswell, it is said, became more interested in Gulliver than in her husband, which instigated the murder.

After Cogswell was missing, Gulliver reported that he had run off, and had been seen between Houlton and Calais, in company with a woman, and inquired when a steamerboat would leave Calais. Mrs. Cogswell's friends (who live in the Province of New Brunswick) after hearing of the strange absence of Cogswell, sent for her to come home, and Gulliver followed in a few days. How long they lived together I am not informed; but they quarrelled, and she twitted him of her having killed her husband!

This reply was, "you urged me to do it!" This conversation being overheard, has led to the arrest, and his examination will take place on Monday or Tuesday. I am not informed that the friends of Cogswell have gone to the shingle camp to search for his bones.

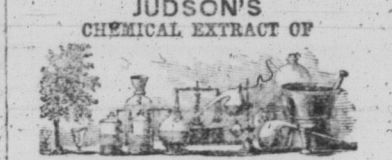
