The battle lasted an hour, at the end of which time the Dahomeyans fled in disorder and were pursued by the French. The natives, hewever, tound little difficulty in making their escape, but few of them falling cantives. Five Europeans and three Sengals were killed, and 23 Europeans and 13 natives were wounded. The enemy's loss is unknown, but they left on the field 200 dead, including twenty of King Behanzius' famous amazons. Another dispatch from Porto Novo says that the battle was waged for three hours. The forces of the Dahomeyans comprised 6,000 male soldiers and amazons, with six breech-loading guns. Both sides fought fiercely, but the amazons were particularly noticeable for the bavery they displayed.

Mrs. George Magee has kindly offered to furnish a room in each wing, and they will be known as the Magee rooms.

The visiting and relief committee reported having made 704 visits to 102 families during the year. They distributed 282 new garments and quantities of blankets, quilts, warm clothes, etc.

The hospital and jail committee reported that services had been held in the hospital, the jail and the homes. They were grate-

ful for the assistance of the Ministerial Association in this. Doctors Macarthur, Mitchell, Cl. T. Campbell, English, Gardiner and Graham were thanked for kind services, as were the city papers.

The treasurer's report showed a cash balance of \$1,559 88. Receipts were fairly satisfactory, though additional income would increase the association's efficiency.

The invention to be patentable must be "any new and useful art, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, or any new and useful improvement in any art, machine, manufacture or composition of matter."

In our opinion the mode of planting and trimming trees is not legally the subject matter of a patent of invention, but the appliances or machinery for doing so may and can be legally patented, and to that extent the company have exclusive rights under their patents, which we have not seen and do not require to see, as we should not give any opinion on their validity which called for a decision on any matter of fact liable to be disputed. The patents are only prima facia valid, but until declared void in whole or in part by the judgment of a competent court it is well for "Lucknow" and others interested to know that the company are at liberty to bring an action for any infringement of what they conceive to be their legal rights, and thus to test the legality of their claims. EATEN BY CANNIBALS.

The Second Explorer in Equatorial Africa to Fall a Victim to Men Easers.

The Second Explorer in Equatorial Africa to Fall a Victim to Mon Eators.

A few months ago the French explorer, De Poumayrae, ascended the Mobangi tributary of the Congo to its big northern bend, and then paddled up the newly discovered affluent, the Kotto River. He made this journey for the purpose of conferring wint Chief Fakuru, of the Sakhara tribe. He was well received by this chief, whose relations with all white men have been excellent in the little time they have known him. Upon his return journey southward, however, Mr. De Foumayrae came into collision with the Bubus. This tribe has for a long time been at war with the Sakharaa, who have been bent upon subjecting the Bubus, though they have not yet succeeded. It happened, unfortunately, that a number of Sakharas were members of the explorer's party, and it is supposed that this fact was the occasion for the fiere attack which the Bubus made upon the travelers.

The white expedition was suddenly assailed by a large force of natives armed with lances and knives. All the survivors of the fight declare that the Bubus fired no guns. Soon after the fight begah Mr. De Poumayrae was wonded in the right side by a lance thrust. The Bubus carried him alive into their village, where they murdered him. Only a few members of his party escaped, and made their way to the white post on the Mobangl.

The explorer and all his comrades who, were taken prisoners were caten, and the cannibal or giear of the Bubus extended over a period of several days. This is the second instance of a white traveler being killed and eaten by cannibals in Africa, The first instance occurred about two years ago, not very far from the place where the recent tragedy occurred. The commander of a French station, with his handful of men, were all butchered and eaten.

A single prescription of medicated brandy has in many cases led to the relapse of half-reformed drunkards and rekindled the fiames smothered by years of heroic self-control. Tonic bitters have also frequently initiated the alcohol habit, and the history of all epidemics proves that the victims of strong stimulants are especially liable to the risk of contagion. In southern Asia the plague rages with special vinelence among the opium-caters, and in the yellow-fever epidemics of the West Indies the mortality among dramdrinkers is about twice as large as that of total abstainers. The Mexican Indians, who detest alcoholic drinks, are almost fever proof, while the bibulous Crecles die by thousands, in spite of abundant opportunities for becoming accessentized.

The Cutlook.

The farmer in these days who neglects to read one or more agricultural publications, or participate in farmers' conventions, or participate in farmers' conventions, or devote a certain amount of attention to experimental work, will die poor. Yarming is becoming a scientific vocation.

It is only exasperating to be told that the farmer of the present is better off than his pioneer grandfather. It would be marvelously strange if he were not. The pioneer often lacked the coarsest bread and irequently the most ordinary comforts; but, for all that, he was the richest man in the community. Then, every time he invented or purchased a machine which added to his power of labor he reaped the full benefit of this extension of his earning capacity; so that his condition rapidly improved with the advancement of the science of farming. He has no such opportunity of bettering himselt to-day. The facilities for agriculture have improved a thousand fold since the old day of the U. E. Loyalists, but the grandsons and greatgrandsons of these men have not profited proportionately by the increase. As a matter of cold fact, the farming class seems at present to be sliding down the reverse side of the hill, in spite of the new farm machinery that inventor and machine shop are uniting to turn out in an almost unbroken stream.

—So long as the improvement of the country roads depend entirely upon working out the poll taxes, or, in other words, having 'road-making sociables' in each township once a year, the present state of affairs will not materially change. On the other hand, were all road taxes paid in cash, and all work of improvement and repair done by skilled labor, under the direction of competent road engineers, it would not require many years to make great progress towards improvement.

—Governor Wiman, of Michigan, has secured the authorization of the appointment of a special commission to look into the feasibility of employing the convict labor of the State in constructing a system of public roads for the State. No subject larger than this ever entered into the politics of a State, Hitherto the subject has not gone beyond the stage of magazine and newspaper discussion. It has been too large for small statesmen to handle. It is now destined to become and to remain the one measure of public importance until its fate is settled by intelligent discussion one way or another. It is unlikely that the farmers of the country are unappreciative of the economical importance of good roads. No labor-saving machine that a farmer uses is more useful than a perfectly-constructed highway. Though the farmer knows this better than any one else, no one better than he knows that roads cost money.

Smut in Wheat and Oats,

Smut in Wheat and Oats.

—A bulletin recently issued by the Michigan authorities says that smut in wheat and oats can be prevented if farmers would soak their seed in warm water for fifteen minutes. Of course the water must not be so warm as to destroy the germ of the seed. The plan generally followed is that of dipping the seed into water at a temperature of 135 degrees Fahrenheit for fifteen minutes and then spreading it out to dry. This plan, it is said, not only destroys the smut germ, but promotes germination of the grain and increases the yield. The bulletin says:

The smut of oats and the stinking smut of wheat are parasitic plants.

The spores of these smuts attack themselves to the kernels of oats or wheat and are sown with them.

The spores germinate at about the same time the seed germinates, and in some way enters the young plant and live upon it until, finally, the head of smut appears.

Both of these smuts can be entirely prevented at a slight expense by the hot water treatment.

many, seems to prove that the ripening of honey, or the change from nectar to honey, is a process of evaporation only. Dzierzon, however, thinks that this condensing process is performed by the direct action of the bees. He says: "It seems we can reasonably suppose that the honey stomach of the bee is like a filter, allowing the water to pass through its walls. I believe nectar would much sooner turn sour than thicken to the consistency of honey inside of the hive." Schonfeld, in his experiment, formed a colony of young bees only, which he knew would not and did not go out in search of food. To this colony he introduced a comb filled with sugar syrup, but inclosed in wire cloth. Then he fed this colony the same kind of thin syrup. At the end of seven days the fed and stored syrup was compared with the screen-inclosed syrup, and only an insignificant difference was ascertained in favor of the first named. The syrup in the inclosed comb had not soured, and was so nearly of the same consistency that Von Planta, who made the analysis, thinks it questionable whether, in this process of concentration, the organization of the bee plays any part at all. the organization of the bee plays any part at all.

Experience has shown that the addition of some leaf mold —more or less—will improve the character of the soil. The leaf mold is the vegetable soil or mold found on the surface of the ground in woods, and is formed by the decay of the leaves which fall from year to year. A general rule which gardeners sometimes observe is to increase the quantity of leaf mold for fine-rooted plants and to use less, or none of it, for those which make strong, coarse roots. The nice proportions, if worthy of notice, are to be learned only by experience. A soil which will suit a great variety of plants may be composed of three parts loam from an old pasture, as described, and one part leaf mold, and another part of sand to make the soil porous and insure free drainage. Now to this mixture may be added more or less manure, according to what is desired to be accomplished with the plants. For ordinary house plants one part of well-rotted cow manure may be used, and the whole compost will be suitable for most purposes.


