



MAN IN THE ICE AGE Ten thousand years ago the period known as the ice age was upon America and the world. Vast glaciers de scended from the Arctic regions and flowed southward. There are traces of these over all the northern states and Canada, in the shape of the boulders of more or less size that the great glaciers carried southward and ground

It has been long known that animals part of it. Woolly elephants' renains have been found imbedded in the ice of Siberia. Now, however, Prof. E. W. Claypole, of Akron, O., it. promulgates the theory and belief means to demonstrate their practical that man himself existed in the ice age-at least, the latter part of it.

He bases his belief on the fact that a man digging a well at New London, in Ohio, threw out from the battom of it a very peculiar stone axe. It was not an implement such as the mound builders used, but one made of comparatively soft green slate. The curious relic of prehistoric man was found imbedded in a heavy blue clay. 

### BEES AND BIRDS CET DRUNK

toxicated With China Berries,

T. L. Williams tells in the Journal of Botany about bumblebees which become intoxicated by sucking the honey formed in the flowers of various com-positae and dipsocaetae. He says: "When the stage of intoxication is reached it is indicated by rolling the back, striking the legs wildly in the air, and general helplessness. The bees on which experiments were made rapidly recovered from the effects but are usually eager to repeat the debauch. One individual was an excep-tion. It was shut up in a vaculum with copious supplies of centaurea scabiosa, and the next morning it manifested remorse and disgust, raising its head and forelegs as high as it could above the plants and hurrying away as soon as released. The most dissolute of the bees are the workers of the nests, bombus lapidarius, which, deprived as they are of certain corporeal pleasure, find solace in the intoxicants.

"There are other animals which are fond of intoxicants, notably the robin which gorges itself with china berrie while in the Southern States ever winter. The china berry has a larg stone about which there is a th This paste contains alcoh and a pouchful of the berries, whi hang in big clusters on the tree the birds pluck them, or till sprin comes, insures a robin a glorious drui which ends in stupefaction, and the spree ends in death, often, for fex. and other predatory animals, including darkeys with half-bushel sacks, search under the china trees and get man a meal and potpie

"The robins are affected differently by the berries. Some of the birds eat the berries till they tumble head over wing to the ground. Others get fighting mad and attack their comrades. Still others flap their wings and go along the branches, slipping and falling, but screaming in jerky voices and buffeting comrades in the most joyful manner. One darky sometimes gets three or four dozen of the birds in a day, and the birds flavored by the berries are mighty fine eating.





The Superintendent of the Methodist Church Preaches Here Twice.

Rev. Wm. Patterson, of Toronto, on the Armenian Outrages.

Rev. John Philip at the First Method ist Church-The Skepticism of Today-Rev. Thos. Wilson's Warning to Church Members.

The able and venerable general superintendent of the Methodist Church of Canada, Rev. Dr. Carman, preached to large congregations morning and evening yesterday at the Hamilton Road Methodist Church, on the occasion of the special services for clearing off the church debt.

At the morning service Dr. Carman based his remarks upon Luke, xvi., 2: "Give an account of thy stewardship, for thou mayst be no longer steward." Every man, he said, was a steward, and must give an account of his stewardship. The account would have to be given primarily of those duties which were conferred to our especial care, and not the business of our neighbors. But the stewardship of the individual included the care of the weak and helpless. It also included the preservation of such institutions in the state as were particularly valuable, as for example an excellent pube lic school system, which must be pre-tected against the encroachments of

ecclesiastics and politicians. Continuing, Dr. Carman condemned in the strongest language what he termed the brutal exhibition of the past week. Two men, Corbett and Fitzsimmons, stood up and pounded each other like beasts, and many people had gone crazy over it. For his part he thanked God that such a vile practice could not be carried on in Canada.
