THRIFT IN ENGLAND.

The statistics of British savings show noteworthy progress. In the last past fif-teen years the depositors in the postal savings banks have doubled in number, from less than 5,000,000 to 10,000,000, and the ratio of depositors to population has increased from 1 in 7 to 1 in 4.5. Deposits have increased from \$269,140,816 to 3740,248,181, and the number of postoffice banks from 10,000 to 15,000.

The scope of the bank has been enlarged, so that a larger amount can be deposited in any one year than heretofore, and the total deposit of any one individual may aggregate \$973.30. The British postal savings system is thus shown to be highly successful as an incentive to popular thrift.—Chicago Journal.



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
