Great Conflagration Raging Unchecked, and Already Many Commercial Houses, Hotels and Private Residences Have Been Wiped Out - Eye Witness Gives Graphic Discription of Scene---Ottawa Asked to Send Assistance.

Ottawa, Nov. 4. - A great fire is reported raging at Pembroke, Ont. and the local fire department has been asked for assistance. The origin and exact nature of the conflagration is not yet known, as some of the telegraph service has been affected, but the meagre dispatches that have arrived | Who Were Inmates of the Shelter in say that several large hotels and several banks have already been destroyed, and the flames are spreading. It is understood a section of the Ottawa fire department will be rushed to the scene at once.

FORTY RESIDENCES DESTROYED

Ottawa, Nov. 4 .- (Later.) -A report received from Renfrew at 12 noon, states that the fire at Pembroke is still burning, and that forty residence bave been destroyed.

STORY OF EYE WITNESS.

Renfrew, Nov. 4.—The following report of the Pembroke fire was told by a traveller who left Pembroke about 8 o'clock this morning. The fire originated at 4:20 a.m., in the foundry of the National Manufacturing Company's plant, spread to the Leland Hotel, and thence toward the street leading to the dock. Crossing that it burned the buildings down towards the C. P. Railway track, and spread up Main street as far as Manitoba Hotel. In the vicinity of the Leland Hotel the fire was checked. Around the old Manitoba Hotel the fire was apparently under control at 6 o'clock. At 6:30 it had caught in the wooden buildings and boathouses along the river front up near the bridge, and opposite the postoffice. The fire broke out in a frame butcher shop between two large brick stores, and then it swept around and caught in the wooden work of the bridge and swept back towards the Copeland House. Soon that whole block of brick stores was on fire. Passage across the bridge was stopped. Then the fire leaped the street and seized on the grist mill on the west side of the river. Then as it swept back towards the business part it became evident that the Copeland House would go. Unless that could be saved, it was likely that a large part of the business section would be destroyed.

COPELAND HOUSE GONE.

Later reports say the Copeland House is burned, and also the Munro Block. At the bridge the sound of the roaring of the flames, the crackling of the metalled roofs, falling of glass and plate glass windows exploding like the report of a cannon, added to the general excitement.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.-Fire, which broke out at Pembroke at 4 o'clock this morning, starting in the works of the National Manufacturing Company, extended south to Pembroke street, burning all the principal buildings on the south side of Pembroke street. The Pembroke flour and grist mill and the Freeman building are a complete loss. At 9 a.m. the fire was burning in the rear of the Mackey-Ryan Hardware Company building. All the telegraph lines have been burned, and consequently no further details are obtainable. It is believed the loss will run into the millions.

When the Pembroke fire brigade arrived they dil heroic service, and all that was possible that human strength, ably directed, could do to stop the progress of the fire, but the strong wind blowing from the river toward the town made it impossible for them to overcome the flames. Early in the morning Pembroke dispatched a train over the C. P. R. line for fire-fighting equipments, which train arrived back about 9:30 with the Renfrew brigade and hose reel, and quite a number of Renfrew citizens accompanying. 



THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.

Technically and legally the next

President of the United States was not chosen yesterday. Those who went to the polls elected 483 men, the majority of them comparatively unknown first Wednesday in December. This round-about method is a curious il. spirit and meaning. The fathers of the republic were not unbridled democrats, and had no idea of permitting the President to be elected by direct system by which they fondly hoped the choice for that great office would be determined by a small body of distinguished citizens of independent of men. ludgment, acting as a buffer between a turbulent and fickle democracy and the Presidential chair. Accordingly each state was required to appoint, in such manner as its legislature directed, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state was entitled in congress. These electors constituted an electoral college, and each member had two votes, one for President, the other for vice-president. For nearly a quarter of a century the electors were appointed by the state legislatures, but since then they have been chosen directly by the people. Practically the people vote directly for the President and Vice-President, as the members of the electoral college, contrary to the intentions of the framers of the constitution, are merely dummies, tagged, ticketed and labeled by the respective parties. For instance a man who wished to vote for Taft yesterday merely marked his ballot for the Republican list of electors; the Bryan man for the Democratic ticket, and so on. The pro-

The result of yesterday's election has no special significance for this country. Canadian were naturally interested in the personalities of the presidential candidates, but the campaign issues had little or no bearing upon Canadian affairs. The fortunes of this country are not affected by the legislation of the United States to nearly as great a degree as during the larger part of the last century. There was a time when Canadian producers were dependent in a great measure upon the American market and when the tariff policy of the United tSates was of the utmost concern to them, but that day has gone by, thanks to the adaptation of Canadian agriculture to the British market, and the remarkable growth of the Dominion in the past ten years. The Republican and Democratic parties in the United States went into the present campaign pledged to a revision of the tariff, and while the Democrats are traditionally the low tariff party, they could not have made drastic changes with a Republican Senate against them. The Republicans, with control of both branches of Congress, are at least in a position to fulfill their promises.
