The cause of the depression which is quite general among the prisoners taken recently, is the conclusion that they have reached, after comparisons, that the Allies' artillery tactics are far superior to theirs. They attribute their defeat to the success of the French in emcircling their strongest position and in well-directed and concentrated artillery fire. # ARE CLOSING NOYON AND BAPAUME OVER 1,500,000 Troops Under General Haig Continue

New York, Aug. 24 .- The Associated Press this morning issued the

British troops along the extreme northern sectors of the battle line in Picardy and Artols are advancing at a comparatively rapid rate. Their attack in the Albert region was continued early this morning. According to unofficial reports

According to unofficial reports from the field, the British have reached the village of Henlin, on the Cojeul River, five miles southeast of Arras. They have advanced further to the south, and are in the outskirts of the town of St. Leger.

Closing in On Bapaume.

Advancing Britons appear to be closing in on Bapaume, the reputed keystone of the German positions between Arras and the Somme. The Germans have been forced to give up towns just to the north of Bapaume, while the British are reported to be operating just to the west of the town. It is officially reported that in the fighting since Wednesday morning, when the offensive began in this sector, the British have taken more than 14,000 prisoners. It is stated in unofficial advices that whole batteries of the enemy.

The fall of Bapaume, it is said, would be a disaster to the enemy. Field Marshal Halg's men now are but a little more than two miles away on the northwest, having taken Alchiet-Le-Grand and Bilbucourt in determined fighting. ing taken Alchiet-Le-Grand and Bihucourt in determined flighting. West of Noyon the French have forced a crossing of the Divette at Evricourt, three miles from Noyon, and they maintain their strong pressure from the south and east. Between the Alsne and the Allette, north of Solssons, Gen. Mangin's troops are pressing close to the heights dominating the Chemin des Dames from the west, increasing the menace to the German positions along the Vesle.

British Steadily Advancing.
The British third and fourth armies are fighting over the old battlefield of the Somme and are making marked progress in fighting which resembles in intensity the first days of the drive of July, 1916. They have crossed the Albert-Arras road over most of its length. They have selzed the high ground north, west and southwest of Bapaume and have surrounded the important position of Thiepval on three sides.

North and south of the Somme the British are closing in on Bray. They hold the heights to the northwest. South of the river they have taken two villages east of Bray, which lies on the north bank. In the area of Lihons the British are east of Herlesville. From Chaulnes to the south of Roye, the battle line remains unchanged.

Heavy Allied Fire.

French and British guns are pouring a heavy fire into and behind the front here, the stability of which is seriously shaken by the allied progress to the north and south. Noyon is still in enemy hands, but its usefulness wanes as the French artillery bombards it and the armies of Generals Humbert and Mangin move toward it.

On the front north of Soissons General Mangin apparently is giving most attention to sharpening of the salient which has its apex im-

General Mangin apparently is giving most attention to sharpening of the salient which has its apex immediately north of Soissons. He has gained further ground east of Begneux and west of Crecy Au Mont toward the Soissons-Chaulny road. Any advance here adds to the vulnerability of the German line eastward from Soissons.

Fires are reported burning behind the German position north of the Vesle, and it is believed the enemy may be preparing to retire. Infantry and transports have been observed moving northward from the Vesle in the last few days.

Everything is going well. We have begun our action and we shall continue. These are the words of Marshal Foch, whose strategy has placed the Germans in their present unenviable position.

The sixth week has begun auspiciously with the German line from Arras to Solssons wavering under allied blows and unable to retire without inviting disaster. In the last week more than 20,000 prisoners, not counting Friday's captures, have been taken, more than 50 towns and villages regained, and the Allies have pressed on unchecked.

#### UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER

ACIFISM in various guises continues to flourish in the United States. But for every smoldering mass of anti-war sentiment a sweeping backfire of positive patriotism is certain to be kindled. Organizations of many kinds, reaching into every section of the American social fabric, are springing up, and thousands are quickly enrolling themselves to stand solidly with the nation, pledged in undying fealty to the preserva-

tion of liberty and justice. At Flint, Mich., recently the Unconditional Surrender Club of the United States was formed. and already the membership has run into the thousands. The society declares that unconditional surrender are the only peace terms that the Allies must impose on Germany, as Gen. Grant imposed them on the Confederate States. Each member must agree to give themselves and all they possess to the winning of the war. Less than a month after the organization of the club with seven charter members, one branch had secured more than 20,000 members and the stern sentiment for making Germany come to her knees spreads everywhere. The desire is not to strike at the German people, but to bring about the overthrow of the military machine which has enslaved and perverted the whole Teuton race. So long as this race continues to bow the knee to kaiserism and kultur, the determination of the Allied peoples to subdue and chasten their enemies will become ever stronger and stronger. The Allied nations have gone to the limit of making overtures. Germany would not yield an inch, and even if the present wonderful strokes continue to demoralize the foe, no consideration will be given to advances unless the arms of the Krupps are east down. Unconditional surrender is a universal determination among the combined Allied peoples. Possibly the attitude of Lord Lansdowne was directly responsible for new leagues and clubs that nail victory before peace to their banners. The Americans may regard his pacifism as representative of a large British ele ment, and with the presence of so many queer ingredients in the great American melting pot, there is always need for standing by the country. The erv for all the strong men and women who are willing to risk all and to give all so that democracy may flourish. The Unconditional Surrender League may becomes a most powerful force in the cause; it has the sanction of President Wilson, a fact which speaks again of the resolution of their leaders to make the war decisive and a tremendous lesson to all autocrats of the future.

LL THINGS seem to be working together for good to the Allied nations fighting together to end militarism forever.

Marshal Foch is keeping up his forward narch, driving the Huns before him and taking many prisoners. The Allied nations are united without a dissenting voice. #### RECIPROCITY IN BRAINS

TEXT SPRING may witness an influx to America of the most distinguished scholars of Great Britain. For the first time in the aistory of American university education a "Britsh University' term may be offered at Columbia, and if plans now under way mature, the war-time etting of Morningside Heights will have an Oxord and Cambridge tinge.

The idea which emphasizes the growing in imacy between Great Britain and America has o far advanced that Prof. James C. Egbert. ector of the department of extension teaching, avs in his annual report to President Nicholas Iurray Butler:

'We are looking forward to entertaining and stening to a group of distinguished professors rom the other side during the spring session of

"Because of the war," Professor Egbert adds, many of the most distinguished scholars of Great Britain may be released from their univerity duties and permitted to visit this country. "It is hoped that it may be possible to

stablish a series of courses by the most notable nen in educational service in Great Britain for he advantage of those who find it impossible to

The general public would have wide oppor unity to study under these scholars, for it is lanned to give the courses in the department of xtension teaching, which, according to Professor and entitled!

Egbert's report had an enrollment last year of 6,667. The courses in extension teaching are planned primarily for two classes of students: First, men and women who can give only a portion of their time to study and who desire to pursue subjects included in a liberal education of the character and grade of a college or professional school, but without any reference to an academic degree; second, those who look forward to qualifying themselves to obtain in the future academic recognition, involving acceptance of the work which they may satisfactorily complete in

extension teaching. The Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon Lang, archbishop of York, in an address in St. Paul's Chapel last April, when he received the degree of doctor of laws, stressed the depletion of the ranks of the British universities by war. Where once there were students, he said, there are now only soldiers. Oxford had 3,200 students at the beginning of the war and now has about 360. These are either foreigners or men physically unfit for military service. A total of more than 11,500 Oxford men have gone into the army and navy, and of that number, according to recent figures, fifteen have reached the Victoria Cross, 314 the Distinguished Service Cross, 983 the Military Cross, 602 have been mentioned in dispatches, and 2,100 have been killed.

It is this situation which inspired the plans for a "British university term" at Columbia, and for further cementing Allied unity.

There is a big demand this season and the price is 24 to 25 cents a pound, wholesale. The bees are now working on the buck-wheat and late red clover, but it is feared this will not be sufficient for their winter use. Large quantities of the clover honey had to be left in the hives, owing to the scarcity of sugar and by advice of the food controller. Were the beekeeper allowed a sufficient quantity of sugar, this could be taken off later and there would be a better supply of the purest and cleanest of table delicacies.

During the hot spell a great many of the tomato blossoms fell off. This means that the fruit coming in early September will be scarce. The tomato crop this year is less than 50 per cent of the normal crop. We picked, on Wednesday, five and a half baskets from a 2-acre patch whereas we should get 75 baskets, with a good crop.
