MURDEROUS ATTACK MADE ON MISS FRANK WOUNDED THREE TIMES BY AN UNKNOWN POLICE FIND HAT AND

Fiend Threw Aged Lady On the Ground, Jumped On Her and Shot Her.

DOCTOR FEARS FOR PATIENT

Police Are Puzzled to Divine the Object of the Man Who Made the Assault—A Wierd Story.

A brutal attempt to murder Miss Elizabeth E. Frank at her home "Mount Frank," on the Wellington road, just on top of the hill, and about half a mile from Clark's Bridge, was made about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon by a man as yet unknown to the police, although the detectives have a good clue, and an arrest is expected shortly.

Miss Frank was shot three times One bullet passed through her neck under the ear, coming out at the back, and boring a hole right through the cords. Another bullet cut the lobe off her right ear, and a third grazed her nose, tearing off the skin.

As Miss Frank is about 70 years of age, Dr. George H. Wilson is fearful that she may not recover. Blood poisoning is feared.

"I have seen a good deal in m practice," Dr. Wilson told The Advertiser, after he had dressed the ragged wounds, "but Miss Frank is the most wonderful woman who has as yet come under my notice. How she managed to rush to the grocery store for help. and later to go to the residence of her sister, Mrs. Charles Rudd, 175 Horton street, is a mystery to me. She is very badly wounded, and has lost a lot of blood. At her time of life one can never say what may happen."

A DEVILISH DEED.

The story is one of ferocious devilishness.

"I was sitting in my kitchen," said Miss Frank, "when I heard someone walking around the house. I listened for a moment, and then I heard glass crash in the window of the bedroom I occupied.

"I walked across the short hall at the back of the house, and then I could see a man attempting to get into the room.

"What are you breaking my windows for?' I shouted to him.


"He never spoke a word but drew a revolver and fired at me. I screamed and ran. I had had all the doors bolt. ed, and as I strove to get open the door at the east side of the kitchen I could hear him smashing out the entire sash. Then I got the door unfastened and he jumped into the room and started in pursuit of me.

'He was a man about forty years of age, medium height, with black curly hair, and bald spot on his head. He came right for me with the revolver pointed at me, and I screamed for help. I ran around the corner of the house to the front, when he overtook me. There he dealt me a blow, and while he stood over me he tried to murder me. With a terrible look in his face he jumped on me repeatedly.

A FIGHT FOR LIFE.

"I fought for my life and struggled with him. With the revolver almost against my face he fired. One bullet nose. I was covered with blood, and lines sank to the ground. He evidently Frank thought he had killed me, as he had front intended, and he went into the house.

"I was terribly dazed and weak, but I came to myself and getting up I ran screaming toward the Wellington road. There was nobody in sight for some time, but finally I saw some boys. They did not appear to take any notice of what I said, and then I made my way to the store. I never saw the man before, and he did not speak a word."



He was bound, gagged and brutally beaten, his feet being held and coasted in a fire by the fiends. A few weeks later he died of his injuries. A number of arrests were made, the suspect in the Frank case being among those hauled into court. They were all acquitted,



The squire owns the land on which the laborer works and the cottage in which the laborer lives. Through his ownership of the land the squire dictates to the farmer who is the direct employer of the laborer. He stuffs the bench which administers the law. fills the county council, which is the organ of local government. He appoints the parson, who supports the squire's instructions with the thunder of heaven. and through the parson he appoints the schoolmaster, who makes education a way approved by the squire. The bread the laborer eats, the house he lives in, the church he prays in, the school he studies in, the courts before which he appears, all belong to a single system which encompasses him, and in every action of his life stamps upon him his sub

GERMANY FACES GIGANTIC LOCKOUT

The Building Trade May Be Completely Tied Up.

Berlin, April 4.-A gigantic lockout, nitiated by 22,000 employers and involving direct or indirectly a million and a half workmen, appears to be inevitable in the German building trades. The lockout will probably begin on the 14th of this month. It means the culmination of a series of lisputes between organized employers and organized workmen over wages, hours of labor and other mutual interests. The trade employers held a convention at Dresden recently and drafted a new code on conditions of abor, which they presented to the unions. A conference of delegates of all unions will be held in Berlin on Monday to consider the ultimatum submitted by the employers. The majority of the delegates have already been instructed by their unions to unconditionally reject the employers' terms. The employers, who have foreeen this rejection, decided to lock out all workmen who refuse to accept their terms after April 14. The number of workmen directly affected is 400,000, but the workmen of allied and dependent trades who will be thrown out of work by the lockout is estimated to number 1,000,000. In Berlin alone 25,-000 men will be locked out and 100,000 others will be indirectly affected. The minister has been appealed to, and asked to use his influence to avert a gigantic industrial war, but the employers and the workmen say they will accept neither mediation nor comprom-



SHIPPED HEAVILY FAMINE THE CURSE OF BRITISH INDIA

Rev. Dr. King, of Indore College, Addresses Canadian Club.

ADMINISTRATION IS GOOD

Demonstrated Very Clearly That British Rule Has Been Just and Equitable.

A very interesting address on "Po-434.096 litical Conditions of India," was given 1,445,070 664,200 41,800 principal of Indore College, India. to the Canadian Club by Rev. Dr. King, There was a good attendance of the members. Inspector Edwards presided. In commencing his address Dr. King pointed out that all the criticisms of the Government of India were predicated by the statement that at some time in the past there was a golden 238,300 age in India, when the people were at peace, and prosperity reigned. There was no famine or pestilence or disease there. It had been impossible to obtain historic records of the early days, but during modern times at least famine was always present. The country was visited by famine, scourged by war, and the poor man always had a hard time.

No New Thing, The condition of famine was no new thing, but the British Government has taken great steps to prevent death

from that cause. Dr. King pointed out that the British Government had received less revenue from India than the historic sov ereigns of old. Ukbar, one of the best rulers of early time, received much larger revenue than England did from the whole country. The Mogul emperors obtained five times as much revenue as Britain does from larger domains

It was a mistake to state that India was governed by the British. Two-fifths of India is directly under native government, and although they cannot make treaties with other naions, they are nominally and practic

ally native states. The proper comparison of the value of British government was to compare the native states with the British governed states, and it would be demonstrated that the British rule bad been just and eequitable. Dealing With Famine.

The speaker gave an interesting account of the method of dealing with famine. These were not due to the fact that there was not enough food in ure to obtain employment, had not the funds to pay for it. During one faming the Government looked after a million the death rate was less than during the year previous. 


