Loubet going to Rome. Signor Prinetti, who was minister for foreign affairs, when the visits were first discussed and who is now in this city, had an hour's talk with Foreign Minister Delcasse yesterday evening. He said afterward that if King Victor Emmanuel came to Paris Italy would expect M. Loubet to go to Rome. He added that Italy did not want a repetition of the difficulties which arose from the fact that Emperor Francis Joseph did not return the late King Humbert's visit to Vienna. Signor

Prinetti added: "It is to be distinctly understood henceforth that each time a king of Italy visits the chief of a foreign state at the capital that chief of state will return the visit at the Italian king's capital, namely, Rome."

The official programme of King Victor Emmanuel's visit to Paris, given out today, makes no mention of a return visit. The King will stay here from July 16 to 18, and will be entertained with elaborate fetes, a military review, state banquets and a gala performance at the opera.





The old theory that the atoms of elements consist of indivisible units of matter has now been definitely discarded. Instead, we are told that each atom smaller, but absolutely identical, units, consists of 700 such units or ions. The As for the notification in evening dress, nature or identity of each substance depends upon the number of such ions contained in each atom, thus 11,200 ions in each atom produce what we know as oxygen, and 137,200 of the same ions, if combined in a single atom, would yield what we regard as gold. The nature of these ions is, for want of a better word, electrical. In other

words, electricity and matter are one

and the same thing. This theory has been more or less familiar to scientific men for two or three years, but has not been demonstrated until recently, when study of the Roentgen rays suggested it, and now radium seems to furnish complete proof, and also carries its conception into a marvelus elaboration. An examination of radium and other phenomena leads Professor Lodge and his associates to believe that matter is not stable in its atoms as has been heretofore supposed, which means the rearrangement or recombination of elements. Thus, water may be separated into oxygen or hydrogen but it was never before imagined that atoms themselves were capable of disintegration. Professor Lodge suggests that this is the normal process of nature, yet it is proceeding at a rate so slow that it baffles the powers of conception of the human mind to estimate the length of time required. In radialone, it proceeds so rapidly that the phenomena are easily observed. The whole theory in effect is an astronomical one. Chemistry has, in fact, become the astronomy of the infinitesimal. One is led to wonder then if the earth and the other planets as not mere ions forming a single atom of a higher universe, where perhaps they constitute a speck of dust that worries the careful housewife in the world next above us.
