At noon on Sept. 20 the Japanese right and center, the former being to the west, and the later to the east of the railroad, commenced the advance. The troops made use of the trenches and infrequent natural cover that lay in their way, The small forts to the south of Shuy siken resisted their advance, but briefly, their garrisons not being strong numerically. 


