The Chapter met on Thursday, 14th November, when full accounts of the financial affairs were presented and considered. It appeared that some reductions had been made in the debt. On Thursday evening, 3rd December, the Rev. Canon Macnab delivered a very interesting lecture on the Cities of Italy, with lime light views, under the auspices of the ladies of the W.A.

The receipts from both of these entertainments are to be given through the W.A. towards a special appeal put forth by the Bishop of Algoma.

On Sunday, 1st December, being the birthday of her Majesty Queen Alexandra, the national anthem was sung at the evening service, with the new verse which has been lately published. The three verses as sung are as follows:
