London, Eng., April 27.—The Royal Marriage between the Prince Leopold (Duke of Albany) and the Princess Helena of Waldeck took place at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, to-day. The proceedings were of an unusually interesting character, and the attendance of Royal guests and distinguished visitors was exceptionally large, which bore testimony to the popularity of Her Majesty the Queen's youngest son. A deep blue sky, fine April weather, a warm spring day, font of the word of

Crowds of people thronged the station grounds at Paddington to see the wedding guests depart, and hearty cheers were given for the Queen, Prince Leopold, and his charming bride. The guests were about two hundred in number, and left by a special train on the Great Western Hailway for Windsor. The guests who were to take no part in the Royal processions were at once driven to the south door of St. George's Chapel and seated in the stalls. Seats in the choir were proyided for the Knights of the Garter.

PRELIMINARY CEREMONIES.

There were four processions from the Castle to the chapel. The first included the Royal Pamily and the royal guests; the second included Her Majesty the Queen, Princess Beatrice, and Princess Victoria of Hesse; the third, Prince Leopold and attendants; and the fourth the Princess Helena and her supporters. Each of the processions was headed by York and Lancaster heralds, and closed with six gentlemen-at-arms and six yeamen of the guard. At a quaster to twelve o'clock the first procession, with an officers' escort of the 2nd Lite Guards, left the Castle for the chapel. As the citizens hurried out of their homes they discovered the fire to be on Main street, and on reaching that thorough fare they saw immense bodies of flame issuing from the store of Mr. Davidson, corner of Main and William streets. So firm a hold had the fire got on the place that it was impossible to do anything in the way of arresting its progress, the corporation not owning a single foot of hose, to say nothing about an engine. The fire engine belonging to the G. W. R., which has at previous fires done such good service was, however, brought into use, a few volunteers having brought it to the scene of destruction. Much valuable time was spent seeking for water, but at last the engine was taken to the rear of the Thompson House, where the well seemed inex haustible. Under the direction of Mr. Wolton, locomotive foreman, aided by a number of the G. W. R. employees and a few other citizens, principally elderly men, a stream of water was directed first of all on the buildings adjoining that on fire, so as to prevent the fire getting hold, and then the nozize was directed towards the doomed store, and the water soon made its presence felt, and although it was from the first seen that nothing could save the store from total destruction, the engine kept the fire down, and the workers had the gratification of knowing that their exertions had kept the fire from spreading down William street. Beyond the damage done to Scott's bank by water, and the partial destruction of the store adjoining Mr. Davidson's, there was nat much injury sustained. 
