HUN TROOPS DESERT

There are not yet no outward in dications as to when and where the German command will launch its next stroke against the Allied lines. The fighting lull on the western front continues with only raids and local attacks, while on the Italian front, the Austrians reeling from the shock of the repulse on the Piave, seemingly are centent to allow the Italians to have the initiative.

Between Montdidier and Ypres. Itsis two weeks since the German Crown Prince ceased his ineffectual efforts to reach Compeigne and the breathing space which has been longer than between the offensive across the Aisne and that on the Noyon-Montdidier front, has beep sufficient to permit the Germans to prepare fully for a renewal of the offensive. Allied capitals look for another attack very soon. Military observers believe it will come on the front between Montdidler and Ypres.

For the first few days, the German artillery fire has been violent on several sectors, each of which might be selected for an attack. These sectors are south of Arras, the northern and southern legs of the Lys salient and south of the Aisne. The Germans may, however, attempt to surprise the Allies by attacking where they hope they will not be

age. The Germans have raided Paris two nights in succession. No great damage was caused Wednesday and on Thursday slight material damage and several casualties resulted. Allied bombing squadrons are very active against German military targets behind the lines. The British are making nightly raids into Germany, especially against manufacturing and railroad towns between Metz and the Phine. Unsettled conditions in Australia Rhine. 

It had previously been customary to throw away as valueless the scum formed on the cauldrons. But it was discovered that this seum contains large quantities of carbonate of lime. It is estimated that 4,000 tons of the carbonate can be recovered from 70,000 tons of be recovered from 70,000 tons of beets. To this quantity of the carbonate 1,100 tons of clay are added, the resultant product being a good cement. The beet seum is pumped into large reservoirs and allowed to evaporate for a certain length of time before being mixed with the clay. It is then stirred or beaten for an hour before being fed into a rotary oven such as is used making Portland coment.



If, in the near, or it may be far distant future, the Grand River is made navigable for freighting, history will credit "Art" Hollinrake and members of the Board of Trade who company the Grand River Imprise "The Grand River Im-provement Committee" with having had much to do with the complishment of this work. The committee, together with

Alds Harp and Baird, ex-Ald. Jennings, and City Engineer Jones and County Engineer Lee made a trip in automobiles along the Grand River, as far as Port Maitland yesterday, leaving the city at 7.30 in the morning.

The day was ideal for drive and the members of the party had an opportunity of not-ing the well-tilled Brant county farms, with their wonderful

The fact that the water in the Grand is unusually low for this time of the year gave an excellent idea of the amount of work and expenditure that would be necessary to accomplish a channel suitable for freighting service on the Grand. In many places long broad stretches of clear water could be seen, and one could almost imagine a boat swinging around a curve. In other places shallows that would defy a Mississipi flat boat were seen, and these shallows, filled with stumps and stones, caused the layman to hesitate in an opin ion as to the possibility ov ever making the Grand navigable. To the mind trained to engineering locks solved the problem and the opinion was expressed that by the building of a couple of dams for storage purposes, and the putting in of three or four locks, plus dredging, a channel could be made from Brantford to Lake Erie





PRISONERS VIETO FED_AND ABUSED

Escaped Rusians Tell of the Conditions — Practically Live on Turnips—Germans Feed Bread to Hogs

(By Capt. J. A. F. Ozanne.) Some interesting information has come to hand from Russian prisoners of war who succeeded in escaping from Germany before the signing of peace. From all accounts the food which received was very bad, both as regards quality and quantity. For breakfast they were given barley soup. Dinner consisted of a bowl of soup made with turnips, or with dry, wormy, turnip leaves, to which adhered dried up remains of worms. 
Give Hogs English Bread. In one camp soft bread used to arrive for the English prisoners. The doctor used to inspect it, and at the last appearance of mould on the surface of it he would condemn it and would give it to the hogs. About 200 hogs were kept at that camp, and they were fattened on the English soft bread, and on the Russian hard black biscuits. It was the custom of the Germans to damp these bisquits and to condemn them as soon as the mildew appeared.

Treatment Improving Sightly. As regards treatment of prisoners it appears that German civilians have recently shown a tendency to improve in this respect, but not the soldiers. In one camp, where the prisoners worked a plant manufacturing railroad cars, small army carts, etc., the prisoners were recuired to sign a paper made out in German with a Russian translation attached thereto. It was obligatian on the part of the prisoners to abstain from wilful damage of machinery tools, crops, etc., the penalty for which was death. 
