MINTO

Addresses the People in Response to a Memorial.

WILL MAKE SUGGESTIONS AT OTTAWA

Which Will Result in Great Good to the Yukon.

THE KEYNOTE OF HIS ADDRESS

Vast Audience Greets His Excellency and Listens to the Memorials and Speeches.

"As the constitutional representative of her majesty, you are well aware that I have no direct voice in the legislative affairs of the Dominion, but I must say that I believe I shall be able to make such suggestions as a result of this visit crue therefrom."

Thus, in substance, spoke his excellency the Earl of Minto before a vast audience which greeted him this afternoon at the grandstand erected on First avenue. The words when spoken brought forth an enthusiastic round of cheering from the multitude who had assembled every man of whom felt the earnestness of the speaker and received the conviction that in those few short sentences was an omen of better things for the

Lord Minto's speech was in reply to the address of the reception committee published elsewhere in this paper.

"I must thank your committee as well as the people of your city in genceptions ever since I entered the Yukon territory that in responding I am quite likely to repeat myself.

"As we came in sight of Dawson this morning the sight of your city built upon such substantial and permanent lines was a perfect revelation. You have had an up hill fight, but in spite of great obstacles of which I am well aware you have in the short space of less than three years accomplished wonders."

Then came the words which appear at the head of this column and which brought forth a series of ringing cheers from the audience. In conclusion his excellency again thanked the committee and the people for their welcome, and brought his address to a close with a further assurance of his good efforts in behalf of the Yukon territory.

Dawson is in many respects Canada's most cosmopolitan community. The day will prove, we believe, an auspicious one for Dawson and the ter ritory at large. The eyes of the people of Canada have followed the journeyings of the vice-regal party across the continent, and today, with renewed interest, they are fixed upon Dawson. It is a saying almost old enough to have passed into a proverb that the pioneers of a new country never reap the due reward of their labors. It is their lot ordinarily to undergo ceaseless toil and all manner of privations and the Chinese minister secure some report hardships only to see the fruits of their from Conger, some sort of an answer efforts gathered in by others.

The pioneer paves the way, makes the sailing smooth and those who come after him are enabled to avoid the rocks by merely following his course.

Such was the case with the colonists who first settled the eastern coast of America and later on the same was proven true of the hardy adventurers who tollowed Daniel Boone into the wilds of Kentucky. California furnished another example of the same character, hundreds of those who faced the terror of Indian foes and desert plains, scarcely surviving their terrible journey let alone realizing any material advantages therefrom.

The Yukon country has proven no exception to the rule. A generation and more has passed away since those who may be termed the actual pioneers of the country began the work of prospecting along the river bers of the Yukon. Their labors never resulted in the attainment of any striking success. A grubstake rocked out in the summer was spent in the fall, and that was about the sum and substance of the matter until the creeks adjacent to Circle City and Fortymile were opened.

Fortunes were not realized from these, however, nor indeed was the real wealth of the country ever suspected until the discovery of Bonanza creek, which event caused so great a stampede into the country that many a man who had spent years in prospecting up and down the Yukon found himself still looking for a good claim while enterprising chechakos all around him were locating on ground destined to yield its thousands, and possibly tens of thousands.

The civilized world will be compelled to admit that the Chinaman is at least a cunning, if not an honest, diplomat. pear that the hopes which were built up by the receipt of Conger's cable under the pretended date of July 18th was either a "fake" or was actually dispatched about July 4th, and is probably a mere duplication of the dispatch

Moreover, it is now apparent that the Chinese government is in possession of the "cipher code" formerly used by our government for the transmission of official business, and which always constitute state secrets-and therefore it was an easy thing for the Chinaman to duplicate Conger's cipher, or to send the same thing twice, using two or three different expressions in the dup-

In any event, only Secretary Hay, of all the state ministers in Christendom, has had any confidence in the truth of the Conger dispatch, it being apparent from the arrival of the governor general. to other nations that a "cipher dis-His excellency is thrice welcome in patch" would not be sent undated, nor would the Chinese government fail to secure and forward some statement concerning the members of other legations while sending so complete a report from the American minister.

The truth is gradually forcing itself upon the American people, even if it is not upon the mind of Secretary Hay, that the dispatch from Conger was either a "fake," or much delayed in the transmission, so that its contents is of no value, since very report indicated the impossibility of holding out beyond the 10th of July. Hence the impossibility of Conger's being alive on the 19th inst.

American Chinese Military Co.

Cap . Seid Beck, ir., of the Americanborn Chinese brigade, of Portland, the only Chinese military organization in America, president of the Americanborn Chinese Association, and an influential member in Chinese society on paign, with this difference, however, the Pacific coast, arrived in the city yesterday and is a guest of Wa Chong. He is en route to Victoria, B. C., where fore his wife's relatives reside. Capt. Beck is an American educated Chinaman. He is 24 years of age and speaks English almost without an accent. Like all others of his countrymen, he is taking an active interest in the present troubles in China and vouches the intormation that should the United States be willing to accept the services of his company against the rebels in China, a large number of them would enlist.

"I am very proud of my uniform," he said yesterday. "I have always had a military spirit. I graduated from the Bishop Scott academy in Portland just previous to the breaking out of the Spanish-American war. Thinking that I might be of service to my country when troops were called for in May, 1898, I sought to enlist in the engineers' corps or as interpreter. I passed a good examination on everything but my eyesight, which caused my rejection.

"I then conceived the idea of organizing a Chinese military of native sons. We have now a membership of over 80, but some of our number are only 8 years of age. We equipped ourselves and our uniforms are the same as those of the

United States army. "In the event of war in China I can say that a large number of the adult members of my brigade would be willing to enlist against the rebels. We would not want to fight against China,

"The American Chinese are not in possession of any more information regardng the conditions in China than are the American people. In tact, we get very little news from China other than that published. It is my opionion that the legations are safe under the protection of the imperial government and that they are not held as hostages. The only other way to look at it is, if they are held as hostages, then the empress dowager and Prince Tung are manipulating affairs to suit themselves and without any sanction or authority from Emperor Kwang Hsu.

"The American Chinese deplore the present conditions in China and are doing all in their power to assist in a speedy settlement and hope for the best. "-P.-I.
